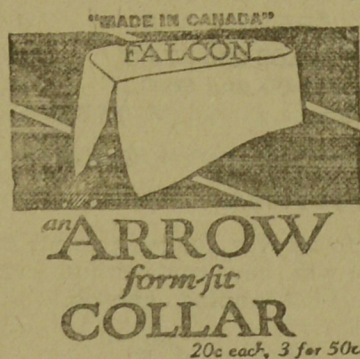

DO NOT KILL
THE PULLETS

Thrifty young hens and pullets should not be marketed at this time or during the winter months. They should be kept for stock next year, when there must be a very large increase in poultry and egg supplies as an essential part of the food production campaign which must be called out if we are to win the war.

Already this year the poultry stock of the country has been dangerously reduced by sales of pullets and young hens during the late summer and fall. These have been eaten, or at least killed. Each of these fowls represented a potential egg production of from five to twelve dozen eggs next year, and each young hen marketed for food this winter may mean a reduction of next year's possible egg supply to that extent. 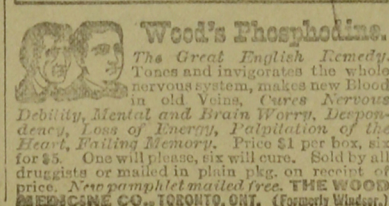

farmers, dealers, shippers and all who are interested in poultry affairs, to save fowls of producing qualities so they may be on hand for stock in the early spring.

Next year it will be necessary for poultry to be produced on every farm and in every backyard in town where

conditions permit. Farmers who have not been producing poultry must do so next year, and those who have been producing must increase the number of fowls in their flocks. By this general increase and the putting away of eggs for winter use, there will be millions of pounds of beef and pork released for use in Europe. No meat supply can be raised as rapidly and economically as poultry, and its increase, so far as food reserves for the war are concerned, will be almost as valuable as though a proportionate quantity of animal meat stuffs had been quickly obtained.

It is really possible to double poultry production in one year.

EVOLUTIONISTS
EXPLAIN ORIGIN
OF TEETH

Anatomists tell us that teeth are a development of the skin and not of the bone. How teeth originated—if we accept the evolutionists' theory that every animal is the result of progressive development from creatures lower in the scale — was suggested by William K. Gregory in an address on the evolution of the human face, delivered before the Linnaean Society of New York and published in the American Museum Journal.

The first suggestion of the typical face of a vertebrate animal is seen in the shark, which has eyes, mouth,

tongue, lips and nostrils. No animal lower than the shark can be said to have a real nose. The whole face of the shark is covered with tough skin.

"In the frilled shark," said Mr. Gregory, "we see a suggestion of how teeth were formed in the higher vertebrates. The tough skin covering the head and body is everywhere thickly studded with minute teeth or denticles. The whole forms the 'shagreen' of commerce. Now the teeth in the shark's mouth are nothing but enlarged shagreen denticles gradually becoming larger and the skin that bears them becomes drawn over the margins and on to the inner side of the jaws. I need hardly say that the evolution of the teeth of vertebrates has a great influence upon the evolution of the face."

But Mr. Gregory confessed that there is a very great gap in the record of evolution, one of the greatest, in

fact, and it consists in this: "That in spite of the relative abundance of living relics that preserve successive stages in the evolution of skull itself, there is no animal known which has an intermediate type of face between immobile non-muscular face of reptiles and the mobile muscular face of mammals."

This is one of the many wide gaps that will have to be filled in before the theory of evolution can be accepted as more than a good writing hypothesis.

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
