Week-end Market.
There was a fairly large market this morning and a lot of country produce was disposed of at good prices. Beef was quite plentiful and sold at from 12 to 14 cents per pound by the quarter. Pork was plentiful at 21 and 22 cents. Eggs in crates brought 55 cents a dozen. Butter sold at 45 cents, potatoes at \$3.50, turnips at \$1, apples at \$2 and \$3, chickens at \$1.50 and \$2, ducks at \$2, country sausage at 20 cents, honey at 30 cents.

Mr. W. A. Ross Dead.
The death occurred at an early hour this morning at his home on Charlotte Street of Mr. W. Alexander Ross a well known and esteemed citizen. The deceased was a carpenter and builder by trade and had long been a resident of the city. He is survived by one son, Mr. Marvin Ross of Moncton, one brother Mr. Hiram Ross of Pembroke, Mass and one sister Mrs. Alfred Burt of Temperance Vale. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon with service at the house at 2.30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. G. C. Warren.

W. A. CAMPBELL
PASSES AWAY
AT BOILESTOWN

Was a Prominent Merchant
and Former County Councillor for the Parish of Ludlow.

The death of one of Boilestown's most respected and successful business men took place this morning when Mr. William A. Campbell passed away.

The deceased was the oldest son of the late John and Margaret Campbell, having been born in Boilestown forty-six years ago, and having continuously remained a resident. Mr. Campbell conducted a general merchandise business, was postmaster, and farmed to some extent, though his principal attention was given to his store. He was prominent in municipal politics having among offices held that of Warden in the Council of Northumberland, he was a nephew of Mr. Jas. Robinson, ex-M.P. and had been spared it was generally thought that Mr. Campbell would have aspired to larger fields politically as he naturally possessed ability and was always an enthusiastic politician, and equally popular with both parties. Mr. Campbell married Miss Eliza Everett Kilburn, daughter of Charles Kilburn of Kingsclear, York Co., and had one child, Ellen, who died when a few months old. Mr. Campbell was a member of Northumberland Lodge F. A. & A. M. and after his marriage took considerable interest in the Methodist Church. Besides the widow, he is survived by the following brothers, Frank of San Francisco, Frederick of Boston, and Everett at home, and two sisters, Margaret and Blanche at home. The funeral will take place Monday at 2 P. M.

Expensive to Fight Tussock Moth.

Decrees in Steeves and Cosman Suits—Gerow Suit Begun—Motion to Amend Libel.

The suit of Gerow vs. Gerow was before the Divorce Court yesterday and this morning. Several witnesses were examined and evidence taken under commission in Montreal was heard. The witnesses examined were Mr. Harry Craig of St. John, Mr. R. W. L. Tibbits, deputy provincial secretary, Mrs. B. L. Gerow the plaintiff, her father and Mrs. Izetta Hoar. The evidence taken by commission was that of the co-respondent, now in Montreal. Mr. J. F. H. Teed of St. John, appears for the plaintiff.

Two Divorces Granted.
His Honor Judge Crocket yesterday afternoon granted decrees of divorce in two cases, those of Steeves vs. Steeves, and Cosman vs. Cosman. Judgment in the case of Hawkes vs. Hawkes will be given at the January sitting.

Applies to Amend Libel.
In the case of Ward vs. Ward the counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. D. Mullin, K. C., made application for leave to amend the libel so as to extend the charges of statutory offenses. Argument will be heard at the next sitting. The evidence of the defendant was completed.

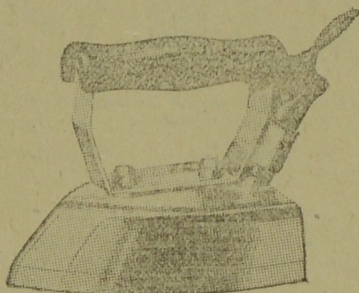
