Paris Papers Comment On Hindenberg's Manifesto

Echo De Paris Sees in it First Effect on International Affairs of Labor Victory in England—Urges French Governments to Unite Against Those Who Would Overthrow Conservative Forces.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PARIS, June 28—Commenting on President Hindenberg's manifesto to the German people on the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Versailles, Echo De Paris today said that the manifesto was the first effect on international affairs of the coming into power of the Labor Government in Great Britain.

"The French Government of today and the French Government's to follow", the newspaper declared, would be obliged to unite against those who wish to overthrow all the Conservative forces on the continent".

Petit Parisien contended that the German demonstration, in view of the impending liquidation of the war problems was ill timed.

ANOTHER JEWEL ROBBERY ON LONG ISLAND

A \$25,000 Necklace and Other Jewels of Value Taken From a Bedroom.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., June 28—Nashua County Police were confronted today with another of the jewel robberies, which a few years ago, frequently plagued their guardianship of the exclusive and wealthy Long Island summer colony, a \$25,000 pearl necklace and other jewels to a total value of \$46,620 have disappeared from the bedroom of Mrs. Norman D. R. Whitehouse and it appeared that only the keenest of detective work would solve the case.

BODY FOUND DRIFTING IN MINAS BASIN

Parrsboro, N. S., June 27—The body of Lloyd Best, 17-year-old resident of Riverside, was found at 7 o'clock drifting about three miles from the pier at Riverside, where was last seen at 11.30 o'clock Monday morning. He had been ailing for some time and it is thought that he became dizzy while watching the Minas Basin steamer, the Kipawo, and fell into the water. His disappearance had been a mystery, and search was being made for him in the woods, and the rivers were being dragged. The body was found by Hugh Taggart on Green Hill Beach. The coroner, Dr. C. S. Henderson, was called and announced that he would hold an inquest tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. Young Best was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Best of Riverside and is survived by four brothers and one sister, all younger than he.

CANDIDATES ARE NAMED IN WESTMORLAND

Moncton, June 27—The first Liberal ticket to enter the field in the coming election was announced when Austin C. Taylor of Salisbury; Reid McManus, ex-M. L. A., of Moncton; A. T. LeBlanc, of Shediac, warden of Westmorland county, and Bill C. Raworth, of Sackville, were today unanimously chosen as standard bearers of the Liberal party in Westmorland in the next provincial campaign. The choice was made at a convention of the Westmorland County Liberal Association held in the city hall here this afternoon at which 200 delegates from all parts of the county were present.

Prior to this selection of representatives being taken up, the convention, upon opening, proceeded with the business of election of officers for the ensuing year, the following being chosen: President, C. C. Avar; vice-president Ferdinand Bourgeois; secretary R. M. Palmer, and treasurer Reid McManus.

BY-ELECTIONS ON JULY 22

Ottawa, June 28—Election writs were today issued for the constituencies of Frontenac-Addington, Vaudreuil-Soulanges, and Laprairie-Napierville, it was announced by Jules Castonguay, chief electoral officer for the Dominion. Nominations will be held on July 22, and elections on July 29.

8 KILLED BY EXPLOSION IN CHILIAN MINE

Thirteen Others Were More or Less Seriously Injured.

REPORTS ARE
CONFLICTING

Mine Owners Deny Report That Victims Number 200.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

Santiago, Chile, June 28—Eight persons were killed in a premature explosion in a mine near Tocopalla, Antofagasta Province, dispatches from that district said today. Five laborers were seriously injured and thirteen were slightly injured.

Conflicting reports earlier here and in Buenos Aires had put the loss at around two hundred in dead, but officials of the Chile Exploration Company operators of the mine, stated that only eight had been killed.

An Early Report

(Special cable to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

Buenos Aires, June 28—Two hundred persons were killed by a mine explosion near Chuquicamata, Chile, a Santiago despatch to La Prensa said today.

The mine belonged to the Chile exploration company. The explosion was felt as far as the town of Calama, ten miles away.

DAWES AND GIBSON WERE IN CONFERENCE

London, June 27—Ambassador Charles G. Dawes and Ambassador Hugh Gibson, discussed methods of approach on the naval disarmament problem with Premier Ramsey MacDonald on Tuesday, but reached no definite form, Ambassador Dawes announced this afternoon.

Announcements regarding matters of procedure in attacking the naval problem, must be made by those in authority in the countries concerned and not by ambassadors, who are merely agents, he said.

WAS A VISITOR TO FREDERICTON ON TWO OCCASIONS

Late Rt. Hon. W. S. Fielding Once Addressed a Political Meeting in the City Opera House.

Right Hon. W. S. Fielding, who died at Ottawa on Sunday, made two trips to Fredericton, once when he was Premier of Nova Scotia and afterwards when he was the Federal Minister of Finance. In the late fall of 1895 he came here in company with the late Sir Louis H. Davies and addressed a political meeting in the City Opera House. The late Hon. A. G. Blair, the then premier, spoke from the same platform. The late Mr. F. H. Risteen, who made a short hand report of Hon. Mr. Fielding's speech, afterwards remarked that he was a very rapid speaker "but" he added, "I got him all right" and so he did.

Hon. Mr. Fielding visited Fredericton again in the year 1909. He travelled in a private car and a Mail reporter who undertook to interview him did not have much success. "I never talk for publication," he said in a kindly manner, and immediately turned the tables on the reporter by doing the interviewing himself. One of the things he found out after some questioning was that the reporter was a native of the constituency which he then represented in Parliament. After that he loosened up considerably but declined to hand out anything for publication.

Outlaw Soldiers in A Chinese Province Are Making Trouble

Have Plundered Towns and Destroyed Jails—The Problems of the Government Are Further Complicated—Governor Yen Threatens to Leave and General Feng Would Quit Politics.

SHANGHAI, June 28—A sudden uprising of outlaw soldiers in Hupeh province where towns were plundered and jails destroyed, further complicated the government's problems today, while leaders sought to prevent the disbandment of three hundred thousand soldiers under General Feng Yu Hsiang and Governor Yen Hsi Shan of Shan Ghas. Yen has threatened to leave his province and live abroad if the government insists on his taking over Feng's troops. Feng likewise insists on retiring from the political field. Withdrawal of the two leaders would leave a vast army practically uncontrolled.

TEXAS JUDGE GIVES WARNING TO BOOTLEGGERS

Thornton, Texas, June 28—The "boys" in Thornton now refer to Nat Hudson as "the most considerate justice of the peace in the world."

In a paid advertisement in the Thornton Rustler, Hudson warned his "bootlegger friends" as follows: "Beginning with July 1, I am going to make it hard for any man to make or sell home brew or whiskey."

"Boys, don't let us catch you, for we will bind you over to the grand jury with enough evidence to convict you. I'm not on the water wagon. My great grandfather took a drink in our war with England. Grandpa had a drink in our war with Mexico. I was more or less drunk in three different armies. I will take a drink. Boys, stay out of our way, we are your friends but have to do our duty."

RADIO MUSIC PUTS PEP INTO LAZY INDIANS

Tahola, Wash., June 28—Strains of music from the radio, piercing the quiet and solitude of this Tahola Indian reservation hamlet, miles from civilization, has put pep into the Indians.

It seems that the Indians are very slow about pulling in their nets, during the fishing season.

G. P. Halferty, salmon packer, has a fish house. He buys fish from the Indians.

But Halferty couldn't get action out of the redskin fishermen. He found their laziness annoying and costly, entailing much delay.

So he installed a radio.

Now when the strains of "She's My Baby" and "That's My Weakness Now," or some other popular jazz piece go roaring out of the fish house and out on the waters, the Indians leap frantically in their canoes pull in their nets and catch and head for the fish house.

Halferty has no trouble getting his fish when he wants 'em as long as the radio tubes hold out.
