Premier MacDonald Warmly Welcomed To New York Today

Steamer on Which He Travelled Was Escorted by American Warships — Brought a Message From His Majesty the King Wishing His Mission Success—The U. S. and Britain to Set An Example to All Nations.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 4—Premier Ramsay MacDonald of England set foot on American soil today bringing with him a message from His Majesty King George, wishing success for his mission, a mission which Premier MacDonald said he felt instinctively, "is to have benefits far beyond the boundaries of our two countries".

"The United States and England," he said, "are making an appeal by example to all nations to gather round a council board of peace."

The British Prime Minister, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Ishbel, arrived on the Berengaria which was escorted by the cruisers Memphis and Trenton.

At the Battery the distinguished visitors were met by Secretary of State Stimson, representing President Hoover, by Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador at Washington, and a group of the best known men of the nation, comprising Mayor Walker's reception committee.

A Civic Welcome.

Premier MacDonald rode through the Wall Street canyon under a shower of paper and was officially welcomed at City Hall. At 11 a. m. the official party left for Washington, where full military honors have been ordered.

This is the first visit of a British Prime Minister to the United States. It is designed to be a historic occasion. Prime Minister MacDonald hopes it will mark a turning point in the relations of the world's two leading sea powers, which had been growing more strained after the Geneva Arms Conference failure.

FRACTURED SKULL CAUSES BABY'S DEATH

Hartland, Oct. 3—A tragic auto accident occurred last evening near Bannon, about eight miles from Hartland, when a car driven by Alex Hawkes, of Beggar Ridge, engineer at the Flemming-Gibson mill at Juniper, failed to make a turn when coming down a hill. The car went over the bank and turned over three times, Capt. William McDougall, of the Soldier's Settlement Board, Saint John, happened to see the lights of the car as it started down the hill and when they suddenly disappeared he investigated and came upon the car overturned. The other occupants of the car were the wife of Mr. Hawkes and his five-months-old baby, who died from a fracture of the skull half an hour after reaching the office of Dr. W. O. Chestnut, at Hartland, where the victims were rushed after the accident. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hawkes received only minor injuries. The car was quite badly damaged.

Paid Visit

Mr. Ross Thorburn, of Fredericton Junction was a visitor to the capital yesterday, arriving here by automobile. Mr. Thorburn is a frequent visitor and is very well known in this city.

S. A. HEAD HANDS OUT MESSAGE TO CANADIANS

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 3—That Canada is a land of opportunity and a nation destined to glorious heritage in which prosperity optimism and true spirit of the Brotherhood of Man will march side by side, was the keynote of a message to the Canadian people given by General E. J. Higgins of the Salvation Army this evening upon the conclusion of his western tour and the dawn of his visit to Canada east as he sped over the Canadian National Railways to Toronto, where he will arrive this morning. General Higgins who is accompanied by Mrs. Higgins, Col. J. Pugmire, A. D. C., and Lieut. Col. Thomas R. Tudge, international Inspector for Immigration at Montreal spoke most appreciatively of the kindness of his reception throughout the west and of the great spirit of helpfulness, which imbued the country and said "The kindness shown me in every centre I have visited and the interest revealed in the Salvation Army by all classes of the community have still further proved how firmly the Army has rooted in every province visited."

IRONSIDES FORCES ARE STILL INTACT

London, Oct. 4—Reports from Nanjing describing the killing of 2,000 soldiers of the Revolutionary "Ironsides" forces of General Chang Kwei in an engagement with Government troops were denied today in a British naval wireless communication from Chang State, which asserts the report was propaganda.

The naval communication said the "Ironsides" still were in tact and were traversing Central Hunan.

FATAL STRIKE DISORDERS TO BE DEALT WITH

Sixty Murder Charges Follow, Textile Mill Riot in North Carolina.

Marion, N. C., Oct. 3—Marion today got sternly about the business of clearing up responsibility for its fatal strike disorders. Warrants charging murder, without specifying the degree were issued today against Sheriff Oscar Adkins, 10 of his deputies and four employees of the Marion mill. Each warrant had four counts—one for each of the four men killed.

The warrants were sworn by George Bradley, a union sympathizer, who witnessed the riot.

Peace officers on the other hand, swore 38 warrants against strikers, charging them with riot, rebellion, and resisting law officers. Additional warrants are expected.

All but one of the 15 named in the murder warrants came to the court house, surrendered voluntarily and were released in \$2,000 bond each. Bail was set at \$500 each for the strikers named in warrants. About half of them had surrendered early tonight.

Funeral Plans.

While the legal machinery got under way in the court room where the warrants were issued, arrangements were completed for the funeral of the four men who have died from their wounds. They will be buried at 9 a. m. tomorrow at a joint funeral. Two of the 12 injured were reported still in serious condition tonight and it seemed doubtful if they would recover.

Militia in Charge.

There was no disorder during the day. National Guardsmen set up their guard kitchens across the street from the mill and swarmed along the road, while their patrols—heavily armed, but with nothing to do—covered the mill village. At noon about 50 strikers were at union headquarters—tall, big-framed, then men, with blue eyes and little to say in their mountain drawl.

A Good Rainfall

The accumulated fall of rain hereabouts yesterday was 1.6 inches, according to report this morning from the Experimental Station. .23 inches fell here last night making a total of almost 2 inches of rainfall. This total is more than fell here during the entire month of September, and probably marks the beginning of the annual fall rains of October and November. This heavy fall of rain will be a big help to curbing forest fires, which though they have not been prevalent for the past few weeks have been in the embryo stage and only waiting for hot weather and wind. It is thought by officials that this rainfall will put an end to forest fires for the current year, from now on the weather will be cooler and with more moisture.

BEAVERBROOK EMBARKING ON NEW CAMPAIGN

Wants the Farmers to Support Empire Free Trade.

WILL ISSUE A MANIFESTO

Hopes the Conservative Party Will Endorse the Scheme.

London, Oct. 4—Lord Beaverbrook is embarking upon a new campaign for free trade within the Empire. In this connection he is writing three articles appealing to the farmers of Britain to endorse the idea and it is understood he will shortly issue a political manifesto on the eve of the Conservative party conference, at which he hopes empire free trade will be one of the liveliest issues and that the party will be forced to adopt the scheme.

TASCHEREAU GIVES DENIAL TO A REPORT

Quebec, Oct. 3—Premier Taschereau of the Province of Quebec, characterized as ridiculous, rumors reported in a Sherbrooke despatch that federal and not provincial voting lists, had been used in the recent by-election in Compton County.

The Premier pointed out that no women had voted in the Compton election, indicating that the provincial lists had been used, as women were not permitted to vote in Quebec elections, while they were allowed that privilege in Dominion elections.

WILL PRESENT PRIZE TO THE CANDIDATES

Toronto, Oct. 3—The Toronto Star today says:

"Following the decision of the County Orange Lodge last night to present a pledge to each candidate in Toronto, proposing to prohibit the use of the French and German languages in all public and separate schools in the province, not one Toronto Tory candidate could be found who would agree to sign it."

"Many told the Star today that they would not sign it; others indicated that they would deal with the matter at their conventions, intimating that they would then turn it down; and one emphatically declared that the only pledge he would make would be one to support the policies of the Conservative party."

SUN PARLOR CAR FOR PENN. R. R.

Pittsburgh, Oct. 4—A new type of Pullman car—a sun parlor lounge—will be installed on several of the long-distance trains of the Pennsylvania railroad by arrangement with the Pullman company, it has been announced here.

The cars are of the modern all-steel Pullman type. At one end there are eight sections, each convertible into the customary upper and lower berths. The remainder of the car will be given over to the lounge features, which include a buffet, the lounge, itself, and a sun room.

Kendal, Scotland, Oct. 4—Despite the law's disapproval, cock-fighting still remains a popular bootlegged sport in the wild country near here. Followers of the sport gather at night in the light of carefully shrouded lamps.

A Bloody Riot in Colorado Prison Ended Suddenly

Mutineers Who Held Guards in Hostages Killed Themselves Rather Than Surrender—The Death Toll Now Numbers Fourteen—Eight Bodies Found in Cell Block.

STATE PENITENTIARY, CANON CITY, COLORADO, October 4—A murderous riot which was flared yesterday in the Colorado state penitentiary died today as suddenly as it started, when the mutineers killed themselves rather than surrender.

Two guards who had been held captive by the prisoners, walked from cell number three and reported that the mutineers had killed themselves. This brought the toll of dead in the riot to fourteen. Troopers and prison Guards entered the cell block where the men had barricaded themselves and reported they found eight bodies—two guards and six prisoners.

More Murders Committed.

State Penitentiary, Canon City, Colorado, Oct. 4—Frenzied murder by inmates of the State Penitentiary who rebelled yesterday continued today. Three more hostage guards and one of their own number were killed by the mutineers, swelling the list of known dead to nine. Ten have been wounded.

Guards Released.

State Penitentiary, Canon City, Colorado, Oct. 4—Two guards who had been held as hostages in cell house number three of the State Penitentiary were freed today and reported that the five mutineers killed themselves rather than surrender.

With the deaths of the mutineers, the toll of the prison riot was increased to 14.

BISHOP DROPS ON THE ALTAR OF A CHURCH

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 3—The Rt. Rev. John Gardner Murray, Bishop of Maryland and executive head of the House of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church, dropped dead today on the altar of St. James Church, where the House of Bishops was in annual session.

Bishop Murray had risen to rule on a point of order and to announce a recess for lunch. He suddenly fell forward to the floor. A physician, who arrived within 10 minutes, pronounced him dead, a victim of an apoplectic stroke.

The House of Bishops has been in session in St. James' Church since Monday, and Bishop Murray had presided since then. He had not complained of being ill at any time.

Mrs. Murray was in a hotel a few blocks away from the church and was brought to the Bishop's side a short time after he dropped to the floor. He did not regain consciousness, however.
