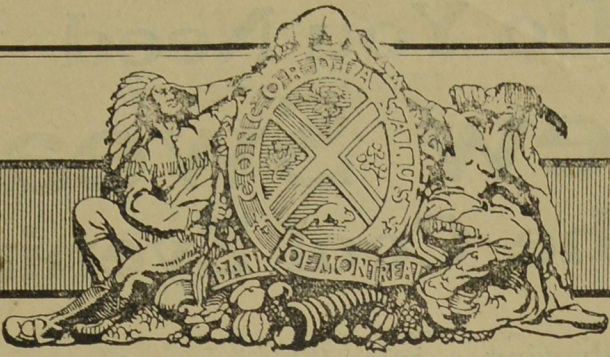

ITALY PLANS TO PRODUCE
OPERA SOON IN THE TALKIES
FAMOUS MELODIES ON SCREEN

Washington, Aug. 10—No one ever has figured out precisely why it is that grand opera has always flourished more luxuriantly in Italy than anywhere else. The climate has been cited as a cause, the brilliant sunshine being credited with keeping the people so intensely happy that they burst into song at the slightest provocation.

Prefer Opera

Whatever the cause, the fact remains that the Italian will sing—end preferably opera. So it is with considerable interest that the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce at Washington learns that there is a scheme afoot to make sound motion picture operas in Italy. The development, it would seem, was inevitable.

Italy first heard sound pictures in April of this year. April is decidedly a spring month in Milan, where the initial presentation of a sound picture (American by the way) was made. Those who heard it were immediately captivated, the bureau here is advised. But Italian national pride was roused in a curious fashion.

Italy has for years enjoyed motion pictures. Indeed, that country has sent us not a few splendid screen actors of whom the greatest was the late Rudolph Valentino. Italians, however, seemed to remain content with American films and only the most half-hearted efforts ever made to produce films in the ancient Roman state. Such efforts as were made were failures.

Home Of Opera

But the advent of the sound pictures stirred deep feelings. The visual picture was all very well as a product of America or any other foreign country. Indeed, La Scala, the most famous opera house in the world, lent its stage to the presentation of films, although for generations it had refused the privilege to legitimate stage plays. Every opera of any importance ever written has been presented at La Scala and the career of no opera singer is capped until an appearance on the stage of La Scala is arranged. It was a triumph, indeed, for American films to be given the La Scala presentation.

But when it comes to sound pictures, pictures in which the actors sing audibly from the silver screen, the Italian realm is being upstartedly invaded. Sound especially in musical form, is the peculiar prerogative of Italians. Why, the very first operas ever written were composed by Italians, who turned them out by the hundreds! Furthermore, all subsequent operas have followed to greater or less extent the model first laid down for the operatic form by Italians.

Italy's chief expert has always been grand opera. Of course, when Italy was Rome it exported legions to conquer the world, but now that those days have passed long since, the European boot is most notably represented in other occidental lands by operas, opera singers, and organ grinders. Did any one ever see an organ grinder of any but Italian nationality or at least descent or extraction? No part of the world, in the opinion of the Italians, has a clear right to produce real grand opera but Italy.

During the six months' season at La Scala Opera House in Milan opera is performed practically every day. Every year sees the presentation of new operas, but the mainstays are the old ones, which are sung over and over again. The children in the streets of Milano, Firenze, Roma and many another Italian city can sing the entire scores of the operas of Italian composers—Verdi, Donizetti, Leoncavallo, Mascagni, Puccini, Scarlatti and many another. Other cities besides Milano have noted opera houses. Their clientele is unlike that of, say, the Metropolitan Grand Opera House of New York, where as many persons go to see what jewels their neighbors are wearing as to hear the music. Prices are much lower and the very poorest people attend, not to compare each other's rags, but to listen and learn. An Italian street beggar will spend his alms on a seat at the opera.

On Singing Screen

So it is regarded by the Italians

as the natural thing for them to make the world opera-conscious by putting their great works on the singing screens. There are so many trained singers in Italy that this will provide a new and welcome source of employment. Hundreds of singers, with entire roles and scores well learned and rehearsed, are always ready at a nod to spring to the boards to take any part in any operatic production. They are equally ready to spring before a recording machine.

The Italians do not lay claim to being in advance of Americans in the actual production of sound pictures from the technical and mechanical point of view. What they are ready to furnish is the talent. The bureau of foreign and domestic commerce here, therefore, sees an excellent trade opportunity for American producing companies to avail themselves of the ready-made grand opera companies of the Italian cities.

CARRIERS ARE
PERSISTENT
IN BAZAAR

Outside the bazaar in Calcutta, writes a contributor in The Ocean Ferry, you observe as you pass in, certain lean little men in loin clothes, each having a large circular basket with two handles. One of them promptly follows you, padding along noiselessly with bare feet, and you are half way through the first alley before you become conscious of his presence.

You tell him to go away. He does not go. You try to shoo him, as you would an over-affectionate dog. Nothing doing. He is there to carry parcels for buyers in the bazaar, and it is not within the range of his understanding to conceive of a foreign sahib, all done up in white clothes and shoes and pit helmet to be anything else than a prodigal buyer.

So he abides with you, and when you have bought one small brass tea caddy and a carved box 3 by 4 inches, he insists on putting them into his basket, to be taken home with you. After trotting around with you for an hour or so, and padding along with you to your hotel, where the packages are delivered to a house boy, he receives four annas—about ten cents and he is content.

This system prevails throughout India where no white man is expected to carry a bundle, however small. The carrying of burdens is the duty of the menial classes, hence the firmness with which the carriers of the bazaars maintain their particular kind of special delivery.

SUMMER TRAIN SERVICES
BETWEEN NEW YORK, BOSTON, AND THE MARITIMES

For the Summer season 1929, exceptionally attractive schedules will be placed in effect between New York and Boston, and the Maritime Provinces, and will prove of much interest to the regular and tourist traffic.

This train will carry standard sleepers in which parlor car accommodation may be obtained from Saint John to Boston, also through day coaches and will give a two train a day service for five days a week.

The New York services will be maintained by the DOWN EASTER which will operate one day a week each way leaving New York, Grand Central Station, every Friday, June 28th to August 30th, at 9.02 mornings. On the return leave Saint John at 7.45 P. M. Daylight time Sundays, arriving in New York at 5.07 P. M. following afternoon. The car will not be operated on Sunday September 1st, but will leave Saint John on Monday, September 2nd instead arriving New York afternoon of September 3rd.

It is anticipated that this excellent service will be patronized by even a greater number of Tourists than in previous years and it is expected to be very popular with the other travelers as well.

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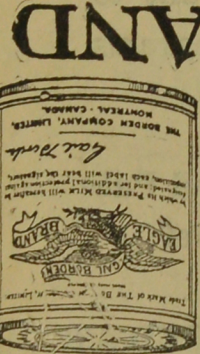
