

Says that Britain Is Now Undergoing A Quiet Revolution

Right Hon. George Lansbury Comments on the Labor Conference at Brighton—Says People Scarcely Realize What is Going on—Gives Credit to the Labor Government.

LONDON, October 3—"Britain is undergoing a quiet and remarkable revolution without anybody apparently realizing it."

This statement was made to British United Press today by Right Hon. George Lansbury, Minister of Works, in commenting on the Labor party conference at Brighton.

This he said was certainly true and best demonstrated in the field of foreign affairs. The evacuation of the Rhineland, the signing of the optional clause in the Hague covenant, the resumption of relations with the Soviets, the settlement of the vexing reparations question and the attempt to reach an agreement with Egypt, he pointed out, has all been achieved since the Labor Government got into power, and now efforts are being directed to secure satisfaction for Indian aspirations.

WOMAN HOLDS HOME, SNIFFS AT \$25,000,000

New York, Oct. 3—Mrs. Tillie Hart today sat on the front porch of her home, located on an island in a great sea of excavations, and sniffed at \$25,000,000.

Steam shovels on the right and concrete mixers on the left volleyed and thundered; the foundation of her home quivered. But Mrs. Hart fingered her lease, which expires May 1, 1930, and defied Henry Mandel Associates to proceed with the construction of \$25,000,000 worth of hotel apartments on West Twenty-third street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.

The Hart home is the only building left in the block. Disposition proceedings have been filed against Mrs. Hart, but she isn't worried about that so much as she is over the fact that she had to shout down the din of the steam shovels whenever friends drop in for a chat.

WESTMINSTER TAX SHOWS AN INCREASE

London, Oct. 3—The new taxable value of the city of Westminster, a mile square in metropolitan London, is \$47,093,400, making it second only to Glasgow, Scotland, among British cities. In Westminster are Buckingham and St. James palaces, the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey and St. James Park.

BACHELORS TO BE TRAINED FOR FARM WORK

London, Oct. 3—Three thousand bachelors are to be trained in England this winter for farm work in Canada. Each will receive four shillings a week pocket money and on graduation will get one shilling for each week of training, with free passage to Canada.

NOTED GERMAN STATESMAN PASSES AWAY

Berlin, Oct. 3—Foreign Minister Gustav Stresemann died suddenly early today.

Dr. Stresemann had been in ill health for months, but recently he had so far recovered as to be able to participate in the arduous conference at The Hague on reparations and the session of the Assembly of the League of Nations at Geneva.

Dr. Stresemann was one of the foremost statesmen of post-war Europe and with Aristide Briand, French Premier and Foreign Minister, generally was considered one of the most active of the world's peace workers.

He was president of the German People's party, a member of the Reichstag, a former Chancellor of the German republic, and the most widely-known member of the present cabinet headed by Chancellor Mueller.

DR. J. T. LEWIS PASSES AWAY AT HILLSBORO

Hillsboro, Oct. 2—Dr. John T. Lewis one of the best known medical practitioners in eastern New Brunswick, dropped dead at his home here at 6 o'clock this evening as the result of a sudden heart attack. He had practised his profession at Hillsboro for 40 years and was 62 years of age.

Dr. Lewis, who was a nephew of the late Dr. W. J. Lewis, who for many years represented Albert county in the Provincial Legislature, and served one term in the Federal Parliament, leaves to mourn his wife, two sons, two daughters, four brothers and two sisters.

The late John L. Peck, M.L.A., was a cousin.

LLOYD GEORGE PAYS TRIBUTE TO STRESEMANN

Relationship of Banking and Industry to Be Studied.

STATEMENT BY SNOWDEN

The Chancellor Says the Hatry Case is Being Studied.

Brighton, Sussex, Oct. 3—Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced at the Labor party conference today that he was considering the appointment of a committee to study the relationship of banking to industry.

Snowden announced that the Board of Trade and the Treasury were studying closely the Hatry case and if necessary will unhesitatingly amend the present law governing companies in order to give greater security to the general investor.

Big Majority in Reichstag For Insurance Bill

Unemployment Measure Was Adopted Today by a Vote of 238 to 155—Under an Agreement Manipulated by Late Foreign Minister Many Members Refrained From Voting.

BERLIN, October 3—The Reichstag passed the government unemployment insurance bill today on its third reading by 238 votes to 155.

Under an agreement manipulated by Foreign Minister Gustav Stresemann a few hours before his death forty folks party members abstained from voting, communists and fascists remained away from the session, further increasing the government's majority.

Died From Apoplexy.

Berlin, October 3—Foreign Minister Stresemann, whose death has been announced, suffered an apoplectic stroke at 10.30 o'clock last night, and died seven hours later, without regaining consciousness, after a second stroke.

A HEAVY STORM SWEEPING UP FROM THE SOUTH

New York, Oct. 2—Accompanied by blinding sheets of rain, a high wind, sweeping up from the southern hurricane belt, moved across New York and points in New Jersey today caused the tide in the Hudson river to a high point for the year.

Three vessels off the coast of Massachusetts were reported in distress during the day due to the gale, but no serious damage was caused and with the aid of Coastguard cutters they were moved out of danger. Nearly all small craft stayed close to port throughout the day along the eastern seaboard.

Thousands of commuters were inconvenienced by the storm, especially those coming to Manhattan from New Jersey and Staten Island, where the high tide made it possible for some of the ferry boats to dock.

The storm was expected to reach its maximum intensity in New York sometime tonight and storm warnings have been ordered posted as far north as Boston. A 56-mile gale was reported at Atlantic City today.

The tide's force was evident at Coney Island where high waves swept over the board walk and storm sewers were choked.

THE BRITISH LAWYERS HAVE LEAN YEAR

London, Oct. 3—King's counsel are finding it hard to make a living in the law courts these days owing to an increasing tendency on the part of the public to avoid litigation.

It is declared that the legal year just closed has been the worst in the memory of the bar. Many experienced junior counsel did not earn \$4000 in a year and some of the rank and file were reduced to penury.

How bad is the situation can be seen from the fact that 300 applications from practising "silk" and juniors were sent in for a vacant country court judgeship.

THREE DEATHS IN LABOR WAR IN THE SOUTH

Marion, N. C., Oct. 2—Three dead, six believed dying and five others in the hospital here today brought state troops to Marion for the second time in two months to stop textile strike troubles.

Two men were killed outright and another died several hours later as a result of riots at the gates of the Marion Manufacturing Company's cotton mill in East Marion this morning.

Who fired the first shot is a question of dispute. Leaders of the United Textile Workers' Union asserted it was fired by sheriff's forces and the sheriff himself asserted a striker fired first, after officers had used tear gas guns.

The mill was the scene of a strike of nine weeks' duration, which was ended on Sept. 11 in an agreement whereby the East Marion mill and the Clinchfield Manufacturing Company's mill were re-opened on a non-union basis. Members of the Textile Union recently claimed the agreement was not being lived up to by the East Marion mill management and at 1 o'clock this morning several scores of worker of the night shift walked out in an unexpected strike.

THE USURPER KING'S FORCES WERE ROUTED
