Byrd Made Flight Over South Pole and Returned to Base

The Crowning Achievement of an Adventurous Career—The Long Trip From Little America and Back Made Without Mishap—News of Flight Received by Radio.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 30—The New York Times (the St. Louis Post Dispatch and newspapers affiliated with them in publishing reports from Commander Richard E. Byrd's Antarctic expedition announce that Commander Byrd has safely returned to his base, Little America, after a successful flight across the South Pole in which he surveyed much adjacent territory. The flight was without mishap and everything worked well.

A Wonderful Exploit.

The American nation from President Hoover down, and scientists and explorers throughout the world, joined today in hailing Byrd's flight to the South Pole as the greatest exploit of the career of adventure which he began at the age of twelve.

Byrd is the first man to have flown over the South Pole, he is the first to have flown over both the North and South Poles, for just three and a half years ago he flew from Spitzbergen to the North Pole and back. He is the second man to visit both poles. Capt. Roald Amundsen discovered the South Pole in December, 1911 and three days after Byrd flew over the North Pole, Amundsen crossed it by dirigible.

Amundsen's dash of 1,738 miles to the South Pole and back to his base required 97 days of tortuous travel by dog team. Byrd and his three companions accomplished approximately the same distance in less than 24 hours.

TORONTO GIRL SOPRANO TO BE HEARD SUNDAY

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 30—Although scarcely out of her teens Marguerite Nuttall the Toronto coloratura soprano, who will be heard as soloist during the Canadian National Railway "All Canada" symphony hour on Sunday, has won praise from music critics as is seldom accorded even the greatest singers. Miss Nuttall, who came to Canada from England at the age of four, began her studies under Maestro Carboni, and in 1923, gave her first recital in the Toronto Conservatory of music. This was followed by a highly successful western tour. The Toronto symphony will play on Sunday, among other numbers Beethoven's "Egmont" and the "Finale" from Tchaikowsky's sixth symphony. The concert will begin at 6.00 p. m. Atlantic Standard time and will be broadcast from the Canadian National stations extending from New Brunswick as far as the Rockies and including Detroit. On Tuesday, December 3rd, Sadah Schucart, violinist and pupils of Auer will appear before the microphone at Toronto as soloist during the Canadian National transcontinental hour, from 11.00 to 12.00 mid. night. E. Walter Brown, Canadian baritone, will be heard during the concert the following Thursday.

ALL PENS IN CONTEST NOW PRODUCING

Egg Production Last Week Totalled 284 — A Charlotte County Pen Has a Good Lead.

The fourth week of the 10th New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, which is conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, has just been concluded and production has now been recorded for all pens but four pens are very slow. The 200 birds laid 384 eggs during the week with 308.5 points. This brings the total eggs to date to 1117 with 890.7 points. The production for the week, namely, 27.4 per cent. is approximately 11 per cent. below the production for the same period in last year's contest.

The Barred Rocks owned by W. J. White, Moores Mills, led in production for the week with 46 eggs and 41.3 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Geo. Wood, R. R. No. 1 Bayswater, Kings Co., are in second position with 39 eggs and 31.3 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Clarence R. Searle, Centre Napan, are in third position for the week with 39 eggs and 29.2 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by the Experimental Station, Fredericton, are in fourth position for the week paper when mingled wats and yelp with 32 eggs and 27.7 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by J. E. Monahan, Elmsville, are in fifth position for the week with 27 eggs and 24.2 points.

TWO VICTIMS WERE CHILDREN

A Fire Captain One of Three Who Perished in Boston.

Prem. MacDonald Will Recommend Six Labor Peers

The Government Will Utilize the Upper House For the Initiation of Legislation—New Peers Will Be Appointed for Life—Only Confirmed Bachelors Have the Call.

London, Nov. 30—The Labor government's intention to use the House of Lords more in future for the initiation of legislation will be reflected in the New Year's honor list which is expected to contain the names of new Labor peers.

It is understood that Premier Ramsay MacDonald will recommend at least three and probably six names so as to ensure a better Labor representation in the Lords. All these new peerages will be life peerages only and the idea is to select confirmed bachelors or men who are unlikely to pass on their peerages to their descendants.

THE SIFTON ESTATE RUNS INTO MILLIONS

Toronto, Nov. 29—Sir Clifford Sifton, who died in New York April 17th, left an estate of \$3,287,221. The National Trust Company is applying for probate of the will. Four sons divide the residue of the estate after a number of legacies have been paid.

The will of the late Canadian financier and former Cabinet Minister provides for payment of the following legacies:

To his son, Wilfred Victor Sifton, \$35,000; to John A. Hambleton \$5,000, and to David Smy, \$1,000. Provisions is also made for annuities totalling \$7,800 to be paid to Miss Kate Molesworth, Douglas Murray and Miss Constance N. Woodward. Subject to the payment of these legacies and annuities the estate is to be equally divided among his four sons, John Clifford Sifton, Henry Arthur Sifton, Clifford Sifton and Wilfred Victor Sifton.

DELEGATES OFF FOR LONDON

New Month

Tomorrow will usher into time, the last month of 1929, with record of experiencing some of the coldest weather experienced in this vicinity for a number of years. Will Have Rough Trip

It is said that Lessage and Pacquin, the transcontinental canoeists, are making their way here from Edmonton in a canoe which they have, so it is said converted into an ice boat. They plan to arrive here this evening but if they do it will be by an overland route, as they will scarcely make the trip by canoe, even if it has runners attached. An attempt to negotiate Meductic rapids in an ice boat at this season of the year would prove interesting, to say the least.

SASKATCHEWAN BOOZE BARON UNDER ARREST

Harry Bronfman Now En Route to Regina in the Custody of Mounted Police.

Regina, Sask., Nov. 29—Westward bound, Harry Bronfman, millionaire liquor baron, is on a train speeding through Ontario en route to Regina tonight. In the Saskatchewan capital he will be arraigned on charges of attempting to bribe a customs inspector and with attempts to corrupt the administration of justice by trying to have witnesses refuse to testify in a liquor case trial.

Carefully planned by the Saskatchewan Attorney-General's department and officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Bronfman was arrested in Montreal last night and immediately placed aboard a train for the west. He is in the custody of Inspector Mercier, head of the Criminal Investigation Branch of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Saskatchewan and another officer of the department.

Old Charges

The charges are of long standing, dating back several years when Bronfman was interested in liquor pursuits in Saskatchewan and his arrest follows investigations by the Royal Customs Commission. The Federal government took no action on the recommendations nor did the then Gardiner government of Saskatchewan.

The Bronfman case was an issue in the recent Saskatchewan election in which the government of Hon. James Gardiner was defeated and the co-operative administration under Premier J. T. M. Anderson elected.

Today, Attorney-General M. A. MacPherson declared a pledge given electors of Saskatchewan that Bronfman would be brought to trial had been "successfully fulfilled in spite of all difficulties."

It is expected Bronfman will be arraigned in court here following his arrival on Monday morning.

Cars Collided

Two closed cars, owned and driven by local persons collided this morning in York street, with the result that one of the cars received damages to its radiator, and rear end. Repairs had to be made on the other machine. The matter was settled between the two parties satisfactorily.
