THE OPPOSITION CAMPAIGN GOING WITH A SWING

Government Had a Strenuous Time Securing Candidates in Westmorland---Opposition in Charlotte Displaying Activity---T. J. Carter Quits in Victoria---Good Work in Kings.

In Charlotte.
St. George, N.B., Feb. 9.—A very enthusiastic meeting of the local opposition was held here tonight. Mayor Lawrence presided and addresses were given by Dr. Alexander, E. A. Greason, Edward L. McGratton and others. Delegates were appointed to attend the convention to be held early next week. It is felt here that the chances in Charlotte county for the opposition ticket are very bright. Another big meeting of the opposition will be held here Monday night.

Desperation in Westmorland.
Sackville, Feb. 9.—The Conservative committee which met here this afternoon to settle the troublesome question of candidates had a long and gloomy session. At the opening it was known none of the proposed candidates were enthusiastic, and serious doubts were expressed over the possibility of getting Mr. Mahoney and Lieut. Colonel Black to run. These gentlemen had held up the Moncton convention to demand a portfolio in the new government before they would consent to accept nomination, and it was doubtful whether Col. Black would accept the nomination after his treatment in the convention for the Dominion nomination where Dr. Price's machine enabled him to win over the soldier candidate.

The meeting convened about two o'clock, but it was not until 6 that Mr. Mahoney had been pacified and consented to run. Col. Black still refused. In desperation the meeting gave it up

for a time and attempted to nominate Mayor Wood, son of Lieut. Gov. Wood. He refused, and pressure then returned to Colonel Black, and about 6.30 he consented to accept the nomination, practically forced upon him against his wishes.

Mr. A. E. Trites, of Salisbury, and Mr. Antoine Leger, of Moncton, are the other members of the ticket.

In Kings County.

Sussex, Feb. 9.—The Opposition party in Kings county has not been making a spectacular campaign, but it has been doing the kind of work that counts in many parishes.

The workers say all of their committees will be thoroughly organized by the first of next week and the work will go on merrily to the end.

There is a great change of sentiment in the county and the government forces realize it. They do not have to be told that many of their supporters have deserted them. The trouble with them is to know how many people will silently record their disapprobation on polling day.

Other Nominations.

Mr. J. L. White, of Grand Falls, and Mr. A. E. Kupkey, of Andover, were nominated yesterday as the government candidates in Victoria. Mr. T. J. Carter, the late member, retired for "business reasons."

Mr. Lewis Smith, of Coverdale, and Mr. J. L. Peck, of Hillsboro, are the Government candidates in Albert. Mr. Prescott retiring.




