Labor Determined To Purge Ranks Of the Communists

Red Attempt to Produce Discord in the Trades' Union Congress at Belfast Has Failed Lamentably—People Want No Dealings With Communists—Have Been Cleared Out of Official Positions.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

LONDON, September 6—Labor's determination to purge its ranks of Communists has been so effective that every Red attempt to produce discord in the Trades' Union Congress at Belfast has failed lamentably.

By overwhelming majorities motions designed by Communists to throw doubt and suspicion on the sincerity and ability of the present Trade Union leaders have been defeated, and the rout of all Communists is now nearly complete.

No Truck With Communists.

The election showed that the people want no dealings with Communists and the Red Sunday newspaper, the Sunday Worker, has been cut eight pages because of a shortage of funds from Moscow. Trade Union leaders moreover, have cleared Communists out of official positions where they strove to get the dismissal of the right wingers and bring discord throughout the labor movement.

BEAVERBROOK SCHOLARSHIPS ARE AWARDED

John Hunter, a High School Graduate Wins Out for the Fredericton District.

The award of the annual scholarships at the University of New Brunswick made on behalf of Lord Beaverbrook by the committee which is named to execute his wishes in this particular was made yesterday morning at a meeting of the committee held here. The scholars are as follows:

Fredericton District—John Hunter, Jr., Fredericton, arts.

Saint John District—Donald C. Jones, Saint John, arts.

Rest of Province—Harry P. Clavette, Edmundston, engineering; Stuart L. Morris, Chatham, engineering; Belle Esther L. Steeves, Gungahville, Albert County, arts.

This is the tenth year that the scholarships have been awarded in this native province by Lord Beaverbrook. In all 51 have been given. This year is the second during which they have been confined to the University of New Brunswick. During the coming academic year 20 undergraduates will be attending that university as Beaverbrook scholars will be held at the university. The scholarships are tenable for four years. There were 19 applicants. A change in the personnel of the committee which makes the awards, has been made. Colonel Murray MacLarsen, M. P., of Saint John, N. B., retired from membership, and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., died within a few weeks.

Vacancies have been filled by the naming of Hon. C. D. Richards, and Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, K. C., of Saint John. Mr. Justice Crockett, of Fredericton continues as a chairman of the committee.

THE NIGHOWLS CAN'T COME HOME WITH MILKMAN

RUSSIANS SAY BRITISH LABOR HAS GONE WRONG

Soviets Cannot Understand What Has Happened to It.

A NOVELIST'S IMPRESSIONS

Arnold Bennett, Back From Russia Has a Strange Story.

LONDON, Sept. 6—Arnold Bennett, the well known British novelist, who has just returned from Moscow, which he visited with Lord Beaverbrook, explains today that the Russians cannot understand what has happened to British Labor. They believe, he asserts, that the cabinet ministers are bribed by capitalists and are betraying the workers, who they think yearn for a resumption of diplomatic relations with the Union of Soviet Socialist republics at any price.

Premier Ramsay MacDonald is a traitor, Foreign Minister Henderson is a Tory and Right Hon. J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal, is a capitalist, according to the Soviets, who even accuse the fiery A. J. Cook of being a backslider for daring to praise the Prince of Wales.

SILVER DOLLARS ABOUT GONE FROM CIRCULATION

Washington, Sept. 6—The silver dollar has joined the horse and buggy and other remnants of the past and has faded from circulation, while the silver half dollar is still used in the west, but is going out of use in the East, because quarters are favored for tipping, according to Treasury officials.

At the present time there are about 500,000,000 silver dollars tied up in the Treasury to back up silver certificates, although they could easily be placed in circulation if there were a demand for them.

VANDERBILT TO HUNT IN N. B.

Charlottetown, Sept. 5—The American yacht Ara, returning from a world cruise, arrived in port this afternoon with her owner, William K. Vanderbilt, of New York, and a party of friends on board. They sail to-morrow for Saint John, and will go on a hunting trip through New Brunswick.

May Incorporate Kellogg Pact in League Covenant

Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson Submits Important Resolution to the League Assembly Today—Says Britain is Ready to Sign Convention Assisting States That Are Victims of Aggression.

GENEVA, September 6—Right Hon. Arthur Henderson, British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, submitted a resolution to the League assembly here today proposing incorporation of the Kellogg Peace Pact in the League of Nations Covenant.

Mr. Henderson also announced Great Britain was ready to sign immediately the general convention whereby the members of the League of Nations have agreed to provide financial assistance to States that were victims of aggression.

NEXT MEETING OF CONFERENCE AT OTTAWA

LONDON, Sept. 6—It has been decided to hold the next meeting of the Imperial economic conference in Ottawa about the middle of next year. It is doubtful whether Premier MacDonald or Rt. Hon. Phillip Snowden, the Chancellor of the Exchequer could attend, but it is likely that William Graham who made such a good impression at the Hague reparations conference when he dealt with the coal situation, will be one of the British delegates.

LINDBERGH ASKS TO HAVE PICTURE TAKEN

Cleveland, Sept. 5—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has made friends with the newspaper photographers. He astounded an observation tower full of them at the national air races recently by walking the length of the dusty field and asking a "photog" if he wanted to make a picture.

"I promised to pose yesterday, but I was so busy I forgot about it," Lindbergh explained. "I'm sorry; if you want to make some pictures today, go ahead."

The dumfounded cameraman recovered, grabbed their bags and made off across the field after climbing over each other getting down the ladder. Then Lindbergh posed before a navy fighting plane before taking the air to stunt for the spectators as ladder of a "V" formation of the famous "High Hats."
