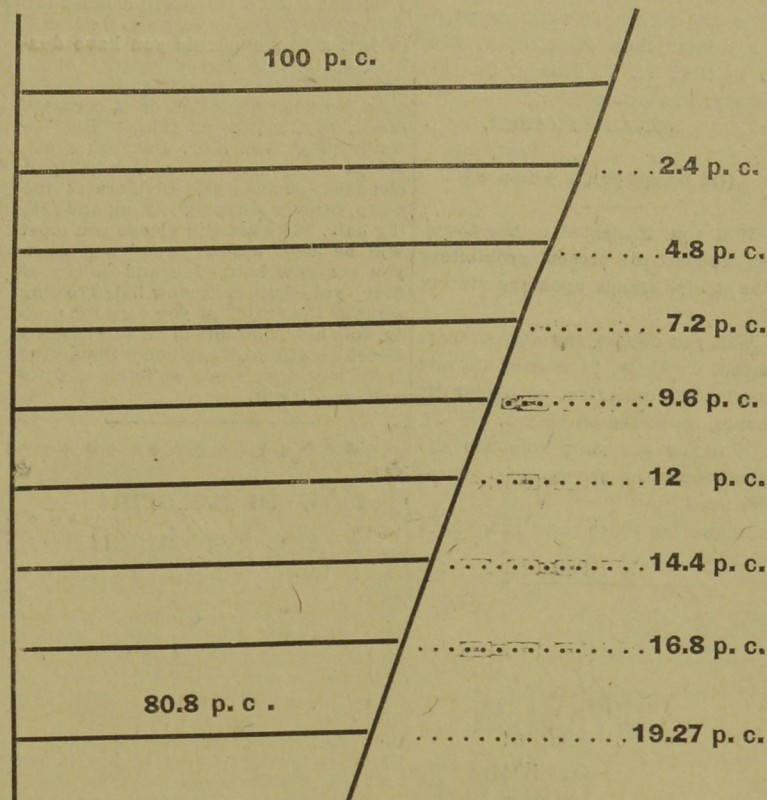

HOW OUR CROWN LANDS ARE BEING DEPLETED

Showing average over-cut on the Crown Lands of the Province in the past 8 years. This is not taking loss by fire into consideration.



About 30 years more at this rate the capital stock will be gone, because even today on the Crown Lands there has been an increase of over 75 per cent. in the number of pieces that it formerly took to make one thousand feet.

Average cut for 8 years prior to 1908 was 153,000,000.

Average cut for years since 1908 has been 269,000,000—an increase of 2.4 per cent. into the capital stock.

CAMPAIGN.....

Three good meetings in the Opposition interests were held last night. They were at Canterbury, at Upper Hainesville and at Nashwaak Village. At all there was a large and representative attendance. In the three places named it is expected that the Opposition will make heavy gains.

Canterbury Station.

At Canterbury Station Coun. W. P. Lawson, of the Opposition ticket, and Ald. R. W. McLellan were the speakers. Coun. Lawson is a native of Canterbury and his home town gave him a great reception. There is little doubt of Coun. Lawson and the rest of the Opposition ticket polling a great vote in the western parishes. Mr. G. D. Stevens was in the chair, and more than three hundred people were in the hall to hear the speaking. Both Coun. Lawson and Ald. McLellan were in good form and made excellent presentations of the issues of the campaign.

Nashwaak Village.

Mr. P. J. Hughes, another Opposition candidate, spoke at Nashwaak Village, the other speakers being Mayor Mitchell and ex-Coun. C. N. Goodspeed. The speakers were given an attentive hearing and were heartily applauded. The Opposition will take a good vote out of Nashwaak Village.

Messrs. Elwood Burr and A. B. Kitchen, the two other candidates, spoke at Upper Hainesville, and Ald. C. W. Burnett also delivered an address. Mr. Burr has a strong following in Hainesville and the Opposition ticket will run well there.

Chance for Gold Hunters.

The Standard intimates that Hon. A. R. Slipp is likely to formulate a new policy in connection with the mining industry. It says that he is likely to appoint an expert mineralogist to go over the province and prospect for minerals. In this connection the St. John Times quotes from a report of the Dominion Department of Mines to show that three miles of mining property at Lake George, York county, adjacent to the antimony mines, is controlled by A. R. Slipp, K. C., of Fredericton.

Slight Falling Off.

City Treasurer Perkins reports that tax collections during February amounted to \$9,791. This is \$394 less than similar collections last year.

Appeal Court Adjourned.

The Appeal Division, Supreme Court, met this morning. Hon. A. S. White and Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer were present, but no business was done by the Court and adjournment was made until March 13th.

Three Hundred Kilts.

A shipment of 300 kilts has been received by the quartermaster's stores of the 236th Highland Battalion. This lot of uniforms, which includes hose-tops and spats, was ordered last summer, but had been delayed. The 236th now has 500 kilts in store or on charge.

CARD TO THE ELECTORS OF SUNBURY

Gentlemen,—Having been nominated by a large gathering of the electors of Sunbury to run in opposition to the present Government, and having accepted the nomination, we are now appealing to the electors generally for support.

Since the last general election we have had three Premiers: The Hon. J. K. Flemming, who resigned after having been convicted of graft and extortion by a royal commission; the Hon. George J.
