CARE OF GLOVES.

Gloves are a most important adjunct to the feminine toilet. As gloves are a rather expensive accessory some hints on the choice and care of them may not prove amiss. It is a wise policy to buy gloves of a good quality. An exact fit is also essential, and a point to remember is never to draw the gloves too tightly over the nails, as this will cause the tips to wear out. To clean light colored kid and suede gloves put them on glove trees and rub them over with cream of tartar applied with a clean piece of flannel. Allow it to remain a while, then follow with another application of equal parts of powdered alum and Fuller's earth. Leave this on all night, then rub the gloves free from all powder and rub with dry oatmeal mixed with a little whiting. If the gloves are not very soiled they can be cleaned on the hands by means of oatmeal mixed with benzine.

Every woman should own a pair of glove stretchers, especially if she uses the washable chamois gloves. These gloves are bound to shrink, even with the best of care. They should be washed on the hands with lukewarm water and Castile soap and then rinsed in warm, soapy water. After this they should be rolled in a clean

towel and allowed to remain for a short time. They should be pulled into shape and hung up to dry. And right here is where the glove stretcher should make its appearance on the scene.

Kid gloves that are ripped can be mended and made to do the service of new ones. A small, fine needle and cotton or silk the color of the gloves should be used. A buttonhole stitch should be worked all around the hole and the stitches then drawn together.

"About to Introduce."

For five or six years the local government has represented itself as "about to introduce" all sorts of reforms and beneficial measures. Now, on the eve of an election, ministers of the crown are again feeding the public lavishly upon promises. The Government is proclaiming its third road policy after eight years of waste and neglect and petty trafficking in patronage. It is still talking about the future of the Valley Railway, although its policy delayed the completion of that railway by two or three years, wasted hundreds of thousands of dollars in connection with the job, and finally shut off the Valley road from any connection with the Transcontinental such as would insure a share of the through traffic.

The Minister of Agriculture is still talking about a policy of settlement of the vacant lands of New Brunswick, although year after year his government's failure in that respect has been written in conspicuous letters before the eyes of the people. The Legislature has not yet had a detailed report of the operations of the famous Farm Settlement Board, but the public now knows that members of the Legislature and their political associates have trafficked in abandoned farms through that board. We do not find the government producing a long list of successful and contented farmers, brought to New Brunswick through the Department of Agriculture, but Hon. Mr. Murray goes on discussing indefinite schemes for settling returned soldiers on the land, avoiding details, but not succeeding in hiding the fact that nothing actually has been accomplished. A vast expenditure of breath and a tremendous output of generalities has been a strong characteristic of the Murray brand of statesmanship for years. He talks, and talks, and talks, but always he avoids telling the people why he cast his vote for and assisted in passing through the Legislature, that whitewashing resolution for the comfort and exculpation of the Hon. Jas. K. Flemming, who is now announced as one of the principal advocates of Mr. Murray and his associ-

To the Men of York.

Gentlemen,—Having been unanimously chosen at a large convention to oppose the candidates of the present government in this county, we submit ourselves to the electorate and ask for support. The convention at which we were chosen did not represent one political party only, but was composed in large measure of men who in the past supported the present administration, but who have resolved to follow in this election the dictates of conscience rather than party and who have made up their minds that they cannot, by supporting the candidates of the government approve of wrong doing.

The administration in charge of the affairs of this province since 1912 has been convicted of the gravest wrong doing. The Hon. J. K. Flemming while Premier was found guilty of stamping with his approval the collecting of large sums for grossly improper purposes from the holders of Crown land licenses. The Hon. J. A. Murray, the Premier, supported in the Legislature a resolution expressing approval of this conduct of Mr. Flemming after a Royal Commission appointed by this government had found him guilty; and now the same Mr. Murray, in the manifesto which he has issued to the people of the Province, brazenly states that he will, if elected, attempt to follow in the same footsteps.

WE APPEAL TO YOU TO VOTE AGAINST SUCH GROSS DISHONEST PRACTICES. We also appeal to you upon the platform of reform adopted by the Opposition in provincial convention in January, 1916. The present government has since the adoption and publication of that platform, attempted to follow to some extent a few of its provisions. One of the planks of this platform was the adoption of province-wide prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors; another was that the taxes levied on automobiles should be used for the construction of permanent roads.

The Hon. B. F. Smith has lately appropriated to his own use part of this plank concerning the use of automobile taxes and the Legislature has since the adoption of the Opposition platform passed a Prohibition Act. That statute was therefore passed with the approval of both the Government and the Opposition. There is now nothing required to be done except the enforcing of the act, and we assure you that if elected we will not lend support to any measure tending to weaken its effect, and we will provide for its proper administration.

It will be impossible for us to see personally a very large number of the electors between now and election day. The government has decided to hold the present elections on the shortest possible notice and in the dead of winter, when the roads are blocked with snow and many of the men are away from their homes. There is only one explanation for this, namely, that the Government fears to have the light of public discussion thrown upon its nefarious transactions. Although we cannot see you all, we assure you that if elected we will devote our best energies to the best interests of the county and the province. We are Yours very truly,
