Plans to Continue Orderly March of Business in the U. S.

President Hoover Will Set the Machinery in Motion Tomorrow—Will Be Modelled on Principle of War-Time Food Administration—Railway Executives to Meet President This Week.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

WASHINGTON, November 18—Machinery set up by President Hoover to ensure the continued orderly march of business will be put into motion tomorrow.

Modelled on the principle which made Hoover's food administration during the war notable for its success without government compulsion, the President's plan of dealing with the current economic situation is that of voluntary co-operation with the government.

To Meet Railway Men.

Railway executives representing most of the large eastern lines will meet with the President tomorrow. Chamber of Commerce officials and leaders in the manufacturing and distribution trades will confer at the White House Wednesday, and Thursday a round table conference of the nation's farming interest is scheduled.

SAYS DR. BYRNE DISAPPOINTED OFFICE SEEKER

D. Leo Dolan, Liberal Organizer of Nova Scotia, Issues a Reply to Halifax Man.

Halifax, Nov. 16—Emphatically denying that there is any "clique" dominating the affairs of the Liberal Party in Nova Scotia, D. Leo Dolan, Liberal organizer for the Province, last night issued a statement contradicting allegations made by Dr. T. I. Byrne in the statement which he issued on Wednesday announcing his retirement from the post of President of the Halifax County Liberal Association and his intention to support the Rhodes Administration.

In denying this charge of Dr. Byrne's, Mr. Dolan says that, while he knows of no "clique" that is ruling the party in the Province, he has been aware for some time of a "Byrne Ring" in Halifax County and finds pleasure in the fact that that "ring" no longer exists, due to the "abdication of its self-appointed leader. Alleging that Dr. Byrne unsuccessfully sought a permanent appointment with the Immigration Department at Halifax, Mr. Dolan says that the doctor now a disappointed office-seeker, "raises himself to a lofty height and shouts 'ring rule.'"

DEATH CHEATED HOPE OF T. P. BY ONE YEAR

Veteran Was Anxious to Complete Fifty Years of Service in the House.

London, Nov. 18—Death cheated by a year the hope of Thomas Power O'Connor, "Father of the House of Commons" of attaining a record of a half century's continuous service in Parliament. Eased by the last good wishes of his King and Pope Pius the eighty-one year old veteran of politics and journalism succumbed at 3.10 a. m. today to a septic condition of one leg, from which he had suffered for two years.

CITIZENS OF FREDERICTON SINCERELY MOURN THE DEATH OF MR. CHARLES A. SAMPSON

A Grand Old Man Laid to Rest This Afternoon in the Rural Cemetery—Funeral Very Largely Attended—Pastor Holmes of the Wilmot United Church Pays Eloquent Tribute to the Deceased.

The citizens of Fredericton this afternoon paid their last sad tribute to the mortal remains of the late Charles A. Sampson, who passed to his Heavenly reward on Friday last at the ripe old age of eighty nine years. The funeral took place from his late home in St. John street at two o'clock and was one of the largest seen here in a number of years. After a short service at the house, the body followed by a large concourse of citizens was taken to the Wilmot United Church, where an impressive service was conducted by the pastor Rev. F. H. Holmes. Other clergymen in attendance were Rev. George Telford of St. Paul's United Church, Rev. J. M. Rice of Marysville, Rev. J. H. Shortland, Rev. H. C. Rice and Rev. H. E. Thomas of St. John, all assisted in the service.

The full choir was in attendance with Prof. W. F. Harrison at the organ and rendered the beautiful hymns, "Abide With Me", "Lead Kindly Light" and "The Homeland."

The Pastor's Tribute

The pastor Rev. F. H. Holmes, in paying a tribute to the life and character of the deceased, said:

"While the feet of those who carry away the dead tarry for a moment let us pause long enough to pay our tribute to the character of our departed brother, Charles A. Sampson. Now that God has called him, we are glad for his sake that after many a hard fought battle, he is at peace, and we believe happy in the fuller light.

THE DIRIGIBLE HAS FINISHED TURNING TRIALS

New British Machine is Now en Route to Dublin.

MADE FLIGHT YESTERDAY

M. P.'s Abandoned the Trip on Account of a Storm.

London, Nov. 18—The British dirigible R-101 making an extended experimental flight, reported by wireless to the Air Ministry today that it had finished its turning trials and was proceeding to Dublin.

The dirigible left Cardington yesterday, followed a course over Howden, where its sister ship the R-100 is housed, and flew later over Glasgow and Belfast. It was not expected to return to Caerdydd before late this afternoon or tonight.

Members of Parliament scheduled as passengers did not make the trip because of storm conditions.

The Battle of Ballots in Mexico Was a Bloody One

Pascual Ortiz Rubio, National Revolutionary and Administrative Candidate Was the Winner—A Check Up of the Death List Not Yet Possible—Total May Reach 26.

MEXICO CITY, November 18—In an election marked by nation-wide rioting bloodshed and charges of fraud, Pascual Ortiz Rubio, National Revolutionary and Administration candidate, has obtained a triumphant majority for the presidency of Mexico.

An accurate check of the dead was impossible. Many deaths were confirmed and those together with semi-official reports indicated the number killed throughout the states would reach eighteen with scores injured. Unconfirmed reports placed the dead at twenty-six.

HEROIC CONDUCT OF NURSES SAVED MANY LIVES

Cleveland Clinic Disaster Came Near Being Repeated in University of California Hospital.

San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 18—Heroism of 120 nurses, doctors and volunteers prevented another disaster such as the Cleveland clinic disaster, today in the University of California hospital when fire, originating in the X-Ray room swept the structure early today.

The rescuers, dodging shooting flames, carried every terrified patient from the building and shortly thereafter the fire was brought under control. No one was injured seriously.

CARELESSNESS COSTLY TO THE PEOPLE OF U. S.

Washington, Nov. 18—The postoffice department lost approximately \$5,000,000 last year on carelessly addressed mail, a large part being the direct result of business firms having an exaggerated idea of their own prominence.

Many firms doing a large advertising business have labored under the impression that, not having a street address indicated great importance in the home town and impressed customers with the fact that "even in New York and Chicago we are so well known the postman needs no help in finding us."

The result has been millions of letters delayed for "directory service."

Last year approximately 200,000,000 letters had to be especially handled by clerks hired to fill out inadequate addresses. The service in New York City alone costs \$500 a day. Of the 200,000,000 inadequately addressed letters 25,000,000 found a final resting place in the dead letter office.

ACTION ON THE AIRPORT SCHEME IS DEFERRED

Cost of Project at Halifax Will Greatly Exceed the Sum Voted by the Ratepayers.

Halifax, Nov. 16—Figures indicating the probable cost of an airport to Halifax so far exceed the amount of \$150,000, endorsed by the plebiscite vote of some months ago, that the CCity Council last night deferred definite action on this project and once again sent the matter back to the Board of Works for "further consideration and enquiry."

The airport cost, according to figures made available through a report tabled by City Engineer Johnston, approximates \$234,000 and when Aldermen were last night asked to voice their opinion as to the advisability of proceeding with the construction, even though the expenditures would be greater than \$150,000, there was no member at the Board ready to commit himself to that extent.

The City Engineer's report stated that the assessed property in the Bluehill airport site was \$40,000 whereas the owners of these properties, in communications to the civic authorities, were asking \$112,000 for the land. The report further pointed out that expenditures in the way of compensation, through arbitration proceedings, might entail an amount of \$62,000.

The discussion on the airport matter was not lengthy but brought out some interesting comment from the aldermen. Ald. Cragg said he was astounded at the figures and declared the cost of the airport would probably reach \$234,000 on the basis of such figures. He claimed the city resources were not sufficient to meet such an expenditure for an airport and declared that once arbitration proceedings were started by the city these proceedings would have to be carried to a conclusion regardless of cost.

Church Services
