THE NASHWAAK RIVER

While the Nashwaak River has this season had the biggest run of salmon in years, due to the action of the fisheries authorities in raising the gates in the dam at Marysville, many people contend that it will never become an angling stream. It is contended that the salmon which head up this river are what are known as the late run fish and merely lodge in there to deposit their spawn and will get out at once and stay out until next fall. On the other hand we have the evidence of old residents that the Nashwaak in the days prior to the industrial development at Marysville was a splendid salmon stream, and they contend that it would again become such if there were no artificial obstructions to prevent the free passage of the fish. If further evidence were needed we have the statement of the late Capt. Richard L. Dashwood of H. M. 15th Regiment, once stationed in Fredericton, set forth in his book called Chiploquoguan, a work dealing with fishing and hunting in New Brunswick and published in the early seventies. Here is what he says: "With the exception of the Nashwaak, now blocked by a mill-dam, and the Tobique, I never heard of a salmon being taken on a fly in St. John waters. In the Nashwaak, which empties itself in the main stream at Fredericton, there are plenty of lamprey eels, but the natives will not touch them."

Capt. Dashwood was a keen sportsman and during his stay in New Brunswick made frequent trips to the Restigouche, the Nepisiquit, the Miramichi, St. Croix and other salmon streams, and it is to be presumed that he also tried the Nashwaak. The discovery that salmon would rise to a fly in the St. John River in the vicinity of Fredericton was made only twenty-five years ago by the late James S. Neill and Joseph Walker of this city. Capt. Dashwood tells about taking sturgeon and striped bass in this river, but it is unlikely that he ever gave it a trial for salmon. The St. John is now looked upon as one of the best salmon streams in the province, and it is to be hoped that this high class revenue producing sport can be developed on the Nashwaak. If it is possible to make the Nashwaak a salmon angling stream it should be done.

TAY PAY PASSES

T. P. O'Connor, statesman-journalist and known as the father of the British House of Commons passed away in London early this morning at the age of eighty-three years. He was an Irish Nationalist and had sat in the House of Commons since 1880. He was first elected for Galway, Ireland, but since 1884 has represented the Scottish division of Liverpool. Since the formation of the Irish Free State he has occupied an independent position in the House. "Tay Pay" as he was familiarly called was one of the world's leading journalists and enjoyed the respect of all classes of people. Up to a few years ago when failing health compelled him to retire from active work, articles from his pen, usually dealing with political subjects appeared regularly in most of the great papers of the United States and Canada and were always read with interest. On the occasion of his 75th birthday he was paid a wonderful tribute by two hundred members of the House of Commons representing all shades of politics. "Tay Pay" was long a world figure and the world will regret his passing.

The provincial election in Montcalm on Saturday resulted in the return of Hon. J. L. Perron, Minister of Agriculture with a majority of 997. At the general election Mr. Daniel the Liberal candidates had a majority of 1,626 votes. Hon. Mr. Perron recently resigned his seat in the Legislative Council in order to enter the popular branch of the Legislature.

necessity of becoming associated with the new company.

The conditions under which consolidation will take place is as follows, should the shareholders agree:

(1) That for each share of par value of \$25.00 of the Farmer's Dairy Co-operative Co., Ltd., two and one half shares of preference stock of Consolidated Farmer's Dairies, Ltd., shall be issued of the par value of \$10.00 bearing interest at the rate of six and one half percentum per annum payable half yearly.

(2) That each share of Farmer's Dairy Co-operative Co., Ltd., shall have option of:—(a) receiving the new shares for his present shares as set forth above, or (b) receiving one half cash and one half shares in exchange for his present shares (c) or receiving payment in cash at par value of his present shares.
