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Nine Jews Killed And Many Injured In Arab Uprising

British Troops Speeding Towards Safed in Motor Cars to Quell the Disturbance—Much Property Destroyed by the Arabs—An American Among Those Injured—Tribes Concentrating on Bank of the Jordan.

JERUSALEM, August 31—Large detachments of British troops, travelling in requisitioned motor cars, were speeding toward Safed today to quell the latest Arab uprising in which nine Jews were slain, many seriously injured and much of their property burned to the ground. Samuel B. Grinstein, American director of the Orphanage of Safed, was among the seriously injured. He was taken to a hospital in a critical condition.

Tribes Concentrating.

Jerusalem, August 31—Nomad Bedouin tribes from Trans-Jordania were concentrating on the bank of the Jordan today, apparently for an attack upon the Jewish settlements situated on the Palestine side of the river.

The considerable British reinforcements which arrived from Malta early today were expected to be dispatched to this new danger zone attack as threats of attacks really have been made by the Arab forces it was reported.

THE C. N. R. IS HANDLING MORE GRAIN

Over Three Million Bushels Increase During the Last Week of August.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 31—More than three million bushels of grain were marketed along the lines of the Canadian National Railways during the week ending Thursday, August 29th, than were marketed for the corresponding period of last year, the total for the week was 3,985,000 bushels, as compared with 734,000. One thousand and six hundred and sixty three cars were loaded with 2,167,000 bushels, while the figure for last year was four hundred and twenty seven cars with 543,000 bushels. Since August first two thousand, two hundred and thirty nine cars have been loaded with 2,871,000 bushels, which is more than double the figure for last year of 995 cars with 1,196,000 bushels.

LAST AUGUST MARKET

With the first of September only a day away, with its implications of fall and cool the green stuffs are making a last brilliant stand, and the market is crowded with all manner of jostling vegetables uprooted in haste lest the fall winds, long held in leash, get loose among them.

The prices are mostly unchanged since Wednesday, except butter and eggs have jumped from 40 to 45 cents as the cows and the chickens take a rebellious glance at the calendar. Green peas are again 30 cts. qt., blackberries, 25 cts a qt., apples \$1.75-\$2.50 per barrel, potatoes per bushel 75 cts., 1.50 cauliflower 15 cts., veal 14-16 cts. lb., lamb 25-35 cts. lb.

A large number of chicken and fowl are going at 45 cts. and 35 cts. respectively.

M'DONALD TO MEET HOOVER IN OCTOBER

London, Aug. 31—Indications that Ramsey MacDonald the British Prime Minister and President Herbert Hoover intended to meet for their disarmament discussion early in October, were strengthened today by a report that Mr. MacDonald had reserved passage for himself and his daughter Isabel on the steamer Berengaria, leaving for New York September 23.

RESUMPTION OF FIGHTING IN JERUSALEM

Jews Killed While Resisting the Efforts of Troops to Disarm Them.

London, Aug. 31—Exchange Telegraph dispatches from Cairo today said three Jews were killed in a resumption of fighting in Jerusalem late last night and that several other Jews were killed and wounded while resisting a detachment of British troops who were trying to disarm them.

Jerusalem reports to the same news agency said fierce fighting had broken out in the Heisian neighborhood in the north where the Arabs were reported to be massing along the plains. A large contingent of troops was sent to the sector to quell the new disturbances.

ELECTRICAL STORM CAUSES GREAT DAMAGE

The Town of Bard, California, Has Been Hard Hit.

RESCUE WORK
NOW GOING ON
An Urgent Appeal For Aid Has Been Broadcast.

Yuma, Ariz., August 31—Rescue workers forced their way through miles of debris today near Bard, California, where an electrical storm of cyclonic proportions struck late last night, levelling houses, trees, and tearing down power and telephone lines.

Bard, which situated near Laguna Dam, has a population of about 2,500. Nearly every building was wrecked and hundreds of acres of farm lands laid low.

Reports received here before communication was restricted by the storm said that several persons were injured. An urgent appeal for aid was broadcast.

Cutler, brain specialist. Physicians at Emergency Clinic said part of her fractured jaw bone had been forced up to the base of her brain and there was a slight hope of saving her life.

Hospital attendants said her recovery is in doubt.

Waters of River Nile Are Likely To go on Rampage

Estimated That \$20,000,000 Worth of Cotton in Egypt is in Danger of Destruction—The Government Has Voted \$1,000,000 to Help Those in the Afflicted Area.

CAIRO, August 31—It was estimated today that twenty million dollars worth of cotton in upper Egypt was in danger of being destroyed by the rising waters of the Nile. Some of the banks already have begun to overflow, doing great damage to the summer maize crops. The government has voted a fund of \$1,000,000 to help in the afflicted area.

Thousands Homeless.

London, August 31—Tens of thousands of people were homeless today as a result of floods in Egypt, India and Jugo Slavia. Millions of acres were under water. The property damage was incalculable.

THE CANADIAN BAR ASSN. TO MEET IN QUEBEC

Quebec, Aug. 30—One of the largest and most notable gatherings of leading jurists from various countries ever assembled in Quebec will be held on September 5, 6 and 7, when Great Britain, France and the United States will be represented at the annual convention of the Canadian Bar Association, which is to open at the Chateau Frontenac.

Distinguished members of the Canadian bar who will attend the convention include Lieutenant-Governor H. G. Carroll, of Quebec; Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden, Premier L. A. Taschereau, Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative Opposition at Ottawa; Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, premier of New Brunswick and Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice.

Lord Hanworth, president of the Appeal Division of the High Court of England, will represent the British bench and bar, while Guernsey E. Newlin, president of the American Bar Association, and Lucien Baudelot of France, will represent the legal profession of their respective countries.

The announcement of the names of the delegates from the British and French bar associations was made by Louis St. Laurent, K. C., batonnier-general of the bar of the Province of Quebec.
