Church Dignitaries Issue Appeal to the Electors

People Advised to Support Only Candidates in British Election Who Favor International Peace Through Arbitration and Drastic Disarmament and a Solution of the Unemployment Problem.

LONDON, April 11—Dignitaries of the Church of England, including fifteen Bishops together with leaders of the free churches, have issued a combined appeal to the electorate to support those candidates in the general election who insist upon the achievement of international peace through arbitration and conciliation and drastic disarmament and who will grapple with the problem presented by the depressed coal industry, adopt a more aggressive policy in dealing with slum clearance, raise the age at which children may leave school and devote themselves to solving the unemployment crisis.

While the three political parties in Britain have policies covering these points, Labor is more advanced in its proposals than are the Conservatives or Liberals, with the exception of Lloyd George's ambitious unemployment scheme.

MISS EVA BOOTH HEARD ON THE AIR LAST EVENING

The U. S. Salvation Army Commissioner paid Eloquent Tribute to Her Late Father, General Wm. Booth.

Miss Evangeline Booth, Commissioner of the Salvation Army in the United States, was heard over the radio last night through station WJZ of New York at a celebration in honor of the 100th anniversary of the birth of her father, the late General William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army. She spoke fifteen minutes with her usual eloquence and precision and made every word tell. "My father," she said, "was the poor man's friend and his memory can never die. His death was mourned in many languages and practically every government in the world, adopted resolutions expressing admiration for his personal worth. It was his faith in God, his hope in man, his Christ likeness, his divine courage and his fortitude in persecution that inspired him in his noble work for humanity".

Another striking passage in her address was, "The flag of the Salvation Army today floats in many different countries and is heralded by the peoples of the earth as a message of hope and life. The world of my father was the under world."

Referring to a conference General Booth had with the late King Edward VII. shortly before his death, Miss Booth said that after discussing the passions of other men he concluded by declaring that, "My passion is man". She said that her father had laid his tired body down to rest at the age of 83 years. "The great Salvation Army my father created goes on and will go on, on and on", were her concluding words.

The singing of a hymn composed by Miss Booth, by Lieut. Col. Walter Maybee and a selection by the territorial band of the Army brought the very interesting broadcast to a close.

Augusta, Me., April 10—Governor Gardner has signed the Fish River bill which will become effective in 90 days unless a petition is filed for a referendum to the people which is not at all expected.

The Fish River bill has among its proposals the erection of a pulp mill at St. Leonard by the International Paper Company.

BOMBING RAID ON THE REBELS IN MOROCCO

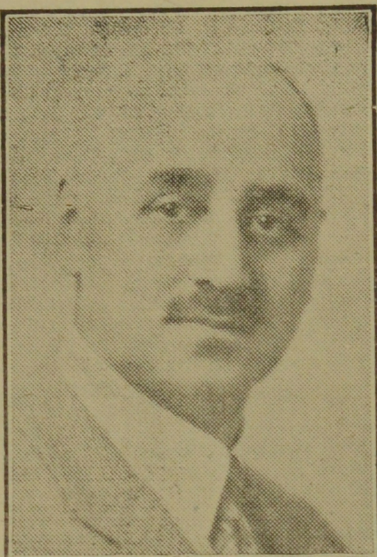

TOWN BURNS AS DONKEY FIRE BRIGADE BALKS

Kars, Turkey, April 11—This bleak town of northern Asia Minor has sent a petition to Mutapha Kemal for help in becoming modern.

The petition was prompted by the recent near destruction of the town by fire. With the temperature away below zero, the sole piece of apparatus of the Kars fire brigade, embodied in the person of one small gray donkey carrying water buckets on his back, balked. The shivering beast could not be induced to carry water to quench the flames, and Kars all but burned to the ground.

The townspeople have begged the Ghazi to help them replace the donkey with an up-to-date motor fire engine.

U.S. NOW IN SECOND PLACE

The death occurred at the Victoria Public Hospital yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Annie L. Baxter, widow of the late George Baxter following an illness which lasted for about a week. Deceased had suffered a paralytic stroke while on the street one day last week and since that time she had been confined to the hospital in a serious state. Her death ensued yesterday afternoon despite all efforts to bring about her recovery. She was a well known woman and held in the highest esteem by all who knew her. She is survived by four daughters, Mrs. C. D. Proctor, Somerville, Mass.; Mrs. C. E. Maiman, Prince Albert, Sask.; Mrs. W. W. O. Fenety, and Mrs. G. Duncan MacDougall, both of this city. Four sons survive, Richard, of Bear River, N. S.; Walter of New York; Frank of Somerville, Mass., and Henry of this city. The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon from the late home 176 Queen street and will be conducted by Rev. Dr. G. C. Warren. Interment will be made in the Rural cemetery.

A THREATENED STRIKE ON SHIPS IN SWEDEN

The Shipping Industry is Facing a Serious Situation.

SECOND MATES WANT MORE PAY

All Large Steamship Lines But One Are Affected.

Stockholm, April 11—Swedish shipping industry was facing a serious situation today due to the threatened strike of ships officers over the question of pay for second mates.

Only the government's intervention prevented an immediate strike when negotiations between the ships officers organization and ship owners collapsed yesterday.

All the larger Swedish lines except the Svenska-America were affected.

APPEAL COURT MAKE START ON APPEAL PAPER

Argument Over Right of Justice LeBlanc to Refer Question to Appeal Court — E. A. MacKay Cites Authority For Move—School Trustee Appeal.

Argument as to whether Mr. Justice LeBlanc had the right to refer the application in the case of King vs Carl C. Doull to the Appeal Court, delayed proceedings in this case yesterday at the appeal sitting when it was set aside by the court composed of Chief Justice Hazen and Justices White and Grimmer and taken up again this morning at the resumption of the April session. This final case on The Crown paper will probably be completed this afternoon.

Under Habeas Corpus

This case is an application for release under Habeas Corpus on behalf of the defendant, Carl C. Doull, convicted under the Intoxicating Liquor Act. E. Allison MacKay appeared for the prisoner and W. E. McMonagle for the crown. Mr. MacKay supported action to quash conviction. The question as to whether Justice LeBlanc had the right to refer the question rose. Mr. MacKay with leave of court cited authority as to power to refer the application on Habeas Corpus to full court. The court decided to hear the application. This morning, Mr. MacKay, was heard in support of motion to quash conviction against the prisoner.

Court Considers

The first case on the Appeal paper, from the County Court, that of Susan McDonald, an infant, vs The Trustees of School District No. 3, Parish of Eldon, County of Restigouche, was taken up this morning, having been commenced yesterday afternoon. P. J. Hughes, K. C., and A. P. N. McLaughlin appeared for the defendants to support appeal. E. McLatchey was heard contra.

Mr. McLatchey supported appeal from the Restigouche County court. P. J. Hughes, K. C., and E. McLatchey were heard this morning, with court considering in the case.

The defendant School board is appealing from a decision in favor of the plaintiff, a school teacher, who claimed that she had been engaged to teach the school and late the agreement was withdrawn and another teacher engaged.

May Make Intensive Drive Against Grain Hoarding Peasants

Significance is Attached to the Appointment of General Budenny to the High Council of the Soviet Commissariat of Agriculture—Was a Leader in Drives by Russian Red Cavalry.

LONDON, April 11—A Moscow dispatch to the London Daily News stated today that considerable significance was being attached to the appointment of General Budenny to the high council of the Soviet Commissariat of Agriculture.

It was believed that the appointment foreshadowed an intensive drive by the government on the grain hoarding peasants. It was recollected that Budenny was the leader of the red cavalry in their drive against Poland and the Russian white armies during the Civil wars following the revolution.

Italian Papers Banned.

Paris, April 11—The French Government issued an order today banning the sale in France of the Italian newspapers Impero and Il Tevere, published in Rome. Both newspapers are organs of the Fascist guard.

MAY PREVENT THE SPREAD OF PLANT DISEASES

Rome, April 11—Preventive methods to halt the spreading of plant diseases were discussed today by the International conference for the protection of plants.

This organization with representatives from thirty-eight countries of Europe and South America, gathered here to map a war on animal and vegetable parasites.

LONDON PRESS ON THE CASE OF I'M ALONE

London, April 10—The Daily Express, commenting on the I'm Alone case and the freeing of the officers and crew, says:—"Capt. Randall has been discharged by the New Orleans Court at the request of the district attorney. The Americans, by adopting this course, acted with becoming wisdom.

"When they have followed this with an equally appropriate compensatory offering to the master and crew of the vessel they illegally sank and also officially expressed their regrets to the British, Canadian and French governments, a singularly unpleasant incident of the sea will be more or less satisfactorily settled. The only completely satisfactory settlement, is of course, that nothing of the kind ever happens again."

Here On Friday

The engineering students of the University of New Brunswick will meet with the members of the Saint John branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada tomorrow evening, when the latter members arrive in this city for the annual conference which occurs at about this time yearly. The meeting will be an interesting one and will be beneficial to both factions. Papers will be read by various engineers and some fine lantern slide will be shown on bridge engineering in Newfoundland.

BUDGET DEBATE AT OTTAWA IS NEARING CLOSE

Division on the Amendment and Main Motion is Looked for This Evening.

Ottawa, April 10—The House of Commons failed once more today to reach a division on the budget and amendments. General expectation, until late in the afternoon, was that the House would dispose of at least one of the amendments today, but speakers multiplied, and six o'clock found the debate still in progress. Conservative ranks furnished the majority of today's speeches. Unless the debate, for some reason, takes on a new lease of life, the vote will come tomorrow.

Hon. A. W. Black (Conservative, Halifax) one of today's speakers, asserted that sugar refineries of the Maritime Provinces were threatened by the tariff policy of the Government. He also criticized the West Indies treaty, which, he said, was taking money out of the pockets of the Canadian people.

Resuming the debate today, W. G. Bock (Liberal, Maple Creek), said that the Minister of Finance, Hon. J. A. Robb, had produced another of his "financial miracles" with reductions in tariff and taxation, and a financial surplus. It recalled the time when the Minister of Finance had reduced the tariff on automobiles and despite the "blue ruin cry" of the opposition members, had achieved a complete success.

It was to be noted that the leader of the Opposition, while he preached high tariff in the east, said something quite different when he was in the west.

Hon. R. B. Bennett interjected that this was incorrect. He had made exactly the same observations in the west as in the east. Mr. Bock was in favor of a grant toward the Jack Miner bird sanctuary.
