GAME WARDENS WERE KEPT BUSY

The Auditor General's report for 1916 shows that game wardens in the county of York had a fairly busy time during the year looking after the game. They drew from the Provincial Treasury the sum of \$2,994.59.

Mr. H. N. Grant, of Canterbury, succeeded in getting in 123 days up to September 30th, and was paid \$246.00. Mr. John Hurley, of Stanley, toiled 109 days for \$218. Mr. Lawrence Nason, of Queensbury, a warden who has no further use for his snowshoes and moccasins, was paid \$258 for his services. Mr. George Stack, of Harvey, worked 38 days for \$76. Others who served the province in the capacity of game wardens, and the amounts paid them, were:

McNabb, of Covered Bridge, \$252; Rainsfor Allen, of Keswick, \$298; William McMullin, of Blaney Ridge, \$447; Lorenzo Yerxa, of Keswick, \$50; Robert Low, Kingsclear, \$8.38; W. A. Lindsay, of Fredericton, \$99.99; Amos Bates, Southampton, \$100; Samuel H. Orr, North Lake, \$410, besides \$77.27 for expenses.

Late Mrs. Annie Ducey

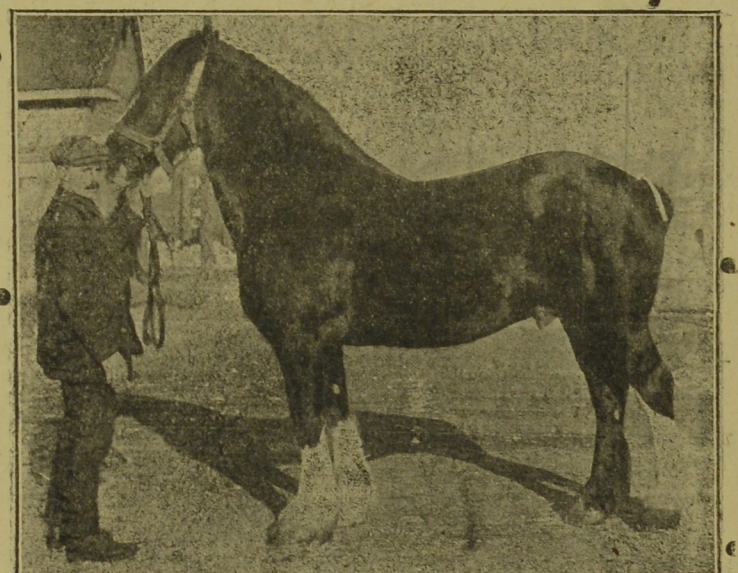
The funeral of the late Mrs. Annie Ducey took place at Upper Maugerville Sunday afternoon and was largely attended.
