Afghanistan King Reported to Have Been Assassinated

Rumors Not Yet Confirmed Say That the Assassin Were Tribesmen of the Rebellious Natives—New Ruler Only Recently Overthrew the Bandit King, Bacha Sakao, and Ordered His Execution.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PESHWAR, INDIA, November 20—Unconfirmed rumors were circulated here today saying that Nadir Khan, the ruler of Afghanistan, had been assassinated in Kabul.

The rumors said the assassins were tribesmen of the rebellious natives, either the Ghilzais or the Waziris.

Nadir Khan only recently overthrew the usurper and bandit, King Bacha Sakao, and after capturing the Afghan capital, ordered the execution of the former.

The former King Ammamah, who was driven from the throne by Sakao is now living in Paris.

French Troops in Germany.

Weisbaden, Germany, November 20—A battalion of French infantry has arrived here and taken over the barracks recently occupied by the British troops of occupation.

Despite statements to the contrary some quarters believed that the French intend to send detachments of troops to various places in Britain's former area of occupation.

WILLINGDONS ARE GOING TO WEST INDIES

Montreal, Que., Nov. 19—Their Excellencies the Governor General and Lady Willingdon will spend the forthcoming Christmas and New Year's holidays in the West Indies, accompanied by His Excellencies Secretary E. C. Melville, and by two aide de camps, Capt. Fiennes and Capt. Streetfield. They will sail south from Halifax on the Canadian National Steamship R. M. S. "Lady Hawkins", Nov. 29. After visiting the eastern group of islands, arriving at Trinidad on December 12th, they will return to Canada by way of Jamaica where they will spend both Christmas and New Year's day leaving Kingston on the Canadian National Steamer "Lady Somers" on the night of January 1st, they will arrive at Bermuda on Jan. 7th sailing from there on the "Lady Drake" Jan. 11 for St. John at which port they will debark on the 14th.

The Creator of Sherlock Holmes is Confined to Bed.

Kipling has been ordered abroad for his health, the British Boar Broadcast corporation announced in cancelling an address he was scheduled to broadcast. Sir Arthur is confined to his bed at his home in Crowborough, Sussex from overwork. He has cancelled engagements for several months.

Hordes of Hungry Wolves Terrorize Moscow Suburbs

Gruesome Story Reached the Daily News From the Soviet Capital—Adults and Children Have Been Attacked by the Fierce Brutes—The District is Overcrowded With Peasants.

LONDON, November 20—An invasion of hordes of hungry wolves in the crowded suburbs of Moscow was described in a Daily News dispatch from the soviet capital today.

The dispatch said that the wolves had attacked adults and children and had devoured a number of small children.

Moscow's suburbs recently have been overcrowded with peasants who have set up temporary homes while awaiting permission to migrate to the Dominion of Canada.

GERMAN TRADE IS SHOWING AN INCREASE

Berlin, Nov. 20—For the third successive month German foreign trade has shown a favourable balance, October's figures amounting to 58,000,000 marks (\$13,920,000) above the total for imports and exclusive of deliveries in kind. Total exports for October, including reparations deliveries amounted to 1,253,900,000 marks (\$300,936,000). Imports were 1,108,700,000 marks (\$265,608,000).

BROTHER ANDRE MIRACLE MAN IS HONORED

Montreal, Nov. 19—Brother Andre, now silver-haired and in his 84th year today knelt praying in a little wooden building beside the imposing crypt of St. Joseph's Oratory, which he founded a quarter of a century ago, while within the Crypt a Prince of the Church, His Eminence, Cardinal Rouleau, Bishop of Quebec, assisted by a distinguished retinue of Roman Catholic clergymen and in the presence of over 4,000 people, paid sacred tribute to the man who prayed alone and to his patron saint, Saint Joseph.

Today was the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Oratory, which has become one of the most famous shrines in the world. Brother Andre declined to be present at the pontifical high mass chanted in honor of Saint Joseph and himself retired to the confines of his modest priory, praying to Saint Joseph to relieve of this mental and physical distress the pilgrims who earlier in the morning had implored his aid.

The venerable brother was made the recipient of many messages of congratulations.

CARLETON CO. BOY KILLED IN AUTO SMASH

Car Overturned and Smothered Him—A Companion Was Seriously Injured.

Woodstock, Nov. 19—Harold Sewell, 17 years of age, son of Herbert Sewell, farmer, of Kilmarnock, Carleton Co. was almost instantly killed at 6 o'clock this evening when an old touring car he was travelling in overturned and pinned him underneath. It is thought that the boy was smothered to death. His companion, Kenneth Weeks, was thrown from the car and sustained serious injuries. He was immediately rushed to the local hospital.

Car Turns Over

The two boys were driving to town from Kilmarnock and about one mile below the river bridge the two right-hand wheels skidded into the ditch and before they could be brought back to the road they struck a rise of four feet. The jump caused the car to turn over on its top, holding Sewell underneath and throwing Weeks out onto the road. A car containing Mr. Hanson and Mr. Clark, of Upper Woodstock soon appeared on the scene and these men sent to town for doctors and notified the Provincial Police. The doctors immediately had Weeks rushed to the hospital, and Sewell's body was brought to Henderson's undertaking rooms.

Constable Pettigrew and Jones, of the Woodstock detachment of the provincial police, examined the scene very thoroughly and found the course of the car very plainly marked. The road was very slippery after the recent snowstorm and it is thought that the car was being driven at quite a fast rate of speed. It is not yet known which one of the boys was driving.

The coroner, John A. Lindsay, was notified and he has ordered an inquest to be held tomorrow morning.

TEN CABLES BROKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

New York, Nov. 20—Six cable repair ships were underway to the waters south of Newfoundland today to mend ten cables, broken by the earthquake that rocked the northeastern part of the United States and the Maritime Provinces of Canada.
