Died This Morning.
Miss Elizabeth J. Phillips of this city, passed away this morning after an illness of long duration. One brother, Mr. Paul Phillips of this city, survives. The funeral will take place at 3:30 tomorrow afternoon from the late residence of the deceased, King street. Rev. G. C. Warren will conduct the service and interment will be made in the Old Protestant Burying Ground.

New Brunswickers Beaten.
In the Alberta elections yesterday in which the Liberal administration was sustained, several New Brunswickers who were candidates on the Conservative side met defeat. Among them were Mr. F. P. Layton in Camrose, Mr. Gordon Jonah in Acadia, Rev. Mr. Hillocks and Mr. T. M. Tweedie in Calgary. The latter city, considered a Conservative stronghold, went Liberal.

Died in British Columbia.
Mrs. Annie J. Burpee, widow of David H. Burpee, late of Sheffield, passed away yesterday at Penticton, B. C., at the age of sixty-seven years. The deceased is survived by three sons, Ernest, William D., and Douglas E., and two daughters, Mrs. C. S. Burpee of Sheffield, and Mrs. Eric Anderson of Butte, Mont. The remains will be brought to Sheffield for interment in the Congregational burying ground.

Registration Not Completed.
Complaints are being made from the office of the registrar of births, deaths and marriages in this city that the regulations with regard to registration are not being observed. The registration of all male citizens of the United States this week for military service caused a rush of inquiries to the local registration office, natives of Fredericton now living in the United States wishing to prove the dates of their births. In many cases no proof can be given as the registration never was made.

Apportionment Reduced.
The House of Assembly, in committee last night reduced the apportionment of the Town of Edmundston for assessment for the Patriotic Fund purposes from \$4,579 to \$1,685. With this amendment the bill was agreed to. During the discussion Mr. Baxter mentioned the fact that the apportionment of the City of Fredericton had been reduced \$3,000 in order to make it more equitable, the over-apportionment being very pronounced when compared with that of Moncton.

REV. T. MARSHALL IS HONORED BY METHODIST DIST.

Resolution of Appreciation of Services as Chairman — Lay Delegates to the Conference.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton District of the Methodist church was held Wednesday evening and Thursday at Marysville. Every charge on the District was represented by its minister with the exception of Grand Lake, Rev. A. Whiteside, and Nashwaak, Rev. F. H. M. Holmes, M. A., both of whom were in ill health. Considering the busy season there was a fair representation of laymen. Rev. Thomas Marshall presided for the last time in this district. Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Oromocto, was appointed Journal secretary; Rev. O. H. Peters, Sheffield, assistant secretary and Rev. B. W. Turner, statistical secretary.

Resolution of Appreciation.
By a standing vote the following resolution was unanimously passed: "Resolved that this district meeting record its appreciation of the work of the Rev. Thomas Marshall as chairman of the district since he came amongst us three years ago. His unflinching business sagacity, thorough acquaintance with Methodist procedure, complete impartiality in the administration of 'discipline' and, withal, kindly sympathy have combined to give us in him a chairman of whom we are proud. Without doubt, the present prosperous condition of the district is, at least partially, due to his leadership. Lovingly, prayerfully, we trust that his probable return to labor in the city of St. John may be blessedly successful and that he may long be spared to give the New Brunswick and general conferences still many more years of equal service."

Rev. William Wass, who had ministered thirty-five years in New Brunswick, died during the year in England and a suitable obituary notice was read by Rev. Dr. Harrison.

After a year's work at Boiestown and after various examinations, Mr. H. C. Upton was unanimously accepted as a candidate for the ministry.

A resolution of sympathy was ordered to be sent to the Rev. A. Whiteside, Grand Lake, who has recently returned from a three months' confinement in Moncton hospital and who is not yet fully recovered.

PTE. C. TAPLEY WOUNDED IN THE LEFT LEG

Now in Hospital at Boulogne--Pte. Harry Delong, Nashwaaksis, Has Arrived at Halifax.

Mr. David Tapley of this city this morning was notified officially from Ottawa that his son, Private Chester David Tapley had been admitted to the 13th General Hospital at Boulogne, France, with a gunshot wound in the left leg.

Private Tapley enlisted early in 1915 with the 55th Battalion. He remained in England for some time with that unit and upon it being called upon to furnish drafts for battalions in France he volunteered. He had been in France for some months.

His wife and three little children reside in this city.

Landed at Halifax.
Private Harry Delong of Nashwaaksis, was one of a party of eight hundred returned soldiers who landed at Halifax yesterday. He was originally a member of the 55th Battalion and was wounded some months ago. Company Sergt.-Major W. E. Hunter of Harvey Station, son of ex-Warden S. B. Hunter, M. P. P., was also in the party.

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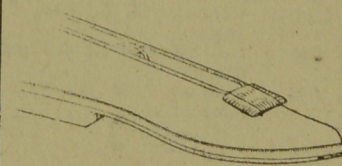
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
