A Crisis in Poland Over Financial Difficulties

The Cabinet of Premier Bartela Has Resigned—An Open Warfare With Parliament Brought It About—Religious Controversy in Sweden Has Been Revived—New Religious Restrictions in Russia to Be Imposed.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

WARSAW, April 13—The resignation of Premier Kazimierz Bartela's cabinet was announced today.

The crisis arose over the country's financial difficulties and was brought to a head by Marshall Joseph Pilsudski's open warfare with the Sejm or Parliament, over financial matters.

Want Catechism Restored.

Stockholm, Sweden, April 13—The long standing controversy over the question of religious instruction in public schools was revived today when a committee representing 900 Lutheran Church delegates decided to send a letter to the government, demanding the withdrawal of a ban imposed in 1919 prohibiting the use of the Catechism as a text book in the schools.

Religious Restrictions.

London, April 13—New religious restrictions will be imposed in Russia shortly affecting all sects and denominations, a Moscow despatch to The Daily News said today.

The new restrictions will be aimed at all Christian churches and will make a special effort to prevent Christian welfare work, the despatch said.

REV. D. K. GRANT WAS MADE THE VICTIM OF HOAX

Bogus Booze Vendor Filled Out a Return Form From Village of Canso.

Halifax, April 12—An "R. M. Gibbing" who styled himself "legal vendor" of Canso, but whose name and position are declined to be non-existent in that town, aroused quite a commotion by filling out a "return form" addressed to the "legal vendor N. S. T. A., town of Canso" by Rev. D. K. Grant, Inspector-in-chief under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act, who afterwards stated that he did not know whether or not there was a vendor there, but had forwarded the statement as a matter of course. A citizen of Canso noted an item in Grant's annual report, tabled in the House of Assembly recently to the effect that the "legal vendor" in the town had received \$42,636.14 for the sale of liquor during the year 1927-28 with profits of \$6,500 and an investigation revealed neither a Mr. Gibbing nor a legal vendor while the only authorized liquor sales made by a druggist were said to have totalled less than \$200 for the year.

The House of Assembly heard a recollection of the affair when Hon. William Chisholm demanded an investigation and Hon. W. L. Hall, attorney-general, said he would inquire into the matter.

Mr. Grant declared today that if the perpetrator of the hoax were apprehended he would face a charge of forgery.

COASTGUARDS IN ROW BOATS SAVED 9 LIVES

Giant Seas Swept Over Boulevard at Hampton Beach, New Hampshire.

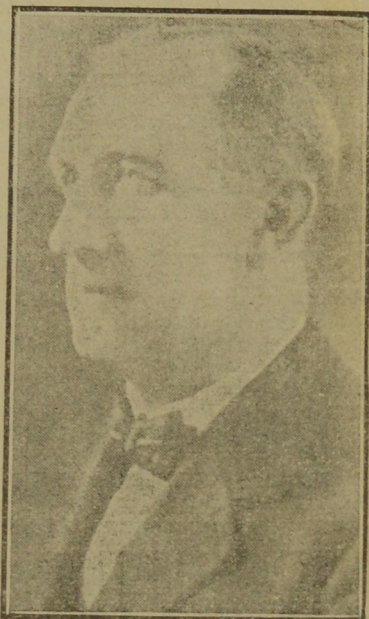
Hampton Beach, N. H., April 13—Coast guards in row boats rescued nine persons, including four children, and nearly a score of others escaped unassisted early today when giant seas swept over the Boulevard here and battered their cottages.

A small garage and several piazzas were washed out to sea, and for a time the white island section of the beach near Hampton river bridge was cut off.

HIS MAJESTY MAY LEAVE FOR WINDSOR SOON

London, April 12—According to an authoritative statement here today, The King will probably leave Craigwell House for Windsor about the third week in May. This statement effectively disposes of the numerous reports regarding the appointment of the Prince of Wales as regent to act for the King in duties connected with the approaching dissolution of parliament, the general election and possible formation of a new government.

From Windsor His Majesty could easily motor to London, which is only 25 miles away, to attend any necessary official business connected with a change in government or other affairs, and return to Windsor the same day.

S.S. LADY SOMERS IS OFF ON HER MAIDEN TRIP

Will Open the New Western Service of Canada West Indies Agreement.

(Special to the Daily Mail)

Halifax, N. S., April 13—With passengers from as far west as Jasper Park Alta., and as far east as Charlottetown, and with a full general cargo of Canadian products, the S. S. "Lady Somers" Captain H. O. Giffin, sailed from here at midnight, one hour after the arrival of the Ocean Limited of the Canadian National Railways from Montreal, on her maiden voyage to Bermuda, The Bahamas and Jamaica to open the new western service of the Canadian National steamships, between Canadian and West Indian ports. Among those travelling on the "Lady Somers" on her first regular sailing are an official party including E. R. Decary, Director Canadian National Steamships, Col. J. Carleton Brown, Assistant to the President Canadian National Steamships in charge of West Indian affairs, and Mrs. Brown, J. W. Ross, Chairman of the Executive Committee Canadian Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Ross, W. McL. Clarge Secretary Canadian Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Clarke, all of Montreal.

Public receptions have been arranged at Nassau in the Bahamas and at Kingston, Jamaica, to take place on the arrival of the vessel, marking the fulfilment of Canada's part of the Canada-West Indies agreement under which the Dominion undertook to furnish ships of ample fruit carrying capacity, both the "Lady Somers" and the "Lady Rodney" which is to follow on the western run on April 29th and which arrived here from England this morning are capable of carrying one hundred thousand bunches of bananas, which establishes them at the largest banana carriers afloat.

WILL HAVE THE TALLEST BUILDING

New York, April 13—The Bank of Manhattan building on Wall Street is to be the tallest in the world, 840 feet. The Woolworth is 792 feet. The Chrysler Building, under construction on Forty-second street, will be 809. The syndicate putting up the Bank of Manhattan Building is headed by George L. Christrom, 34-year-old banker.

Two men Shot Dead in a Sedan in Chicago Alley.

POLICEMEN MADE FIND

Two Men Seen Standing Near Car Made Get Away.

Chicago, Ill., April 13—Two men were found shot to death today in a sedan in an alley behind the Western Hotel Circero. The bodies, huddled on the floor of the rear seat were found by policeman George Price after he had pursued unsuccessfully two men who he had challenged as they stood beside the automobile.

LEAGUE COUNCIL MAY NEXT MEET IN MADRID

Indian Commission Set Out From India Today for England

Arrived at Bombay From Delhi Over a Well Guarded Route and There Were no Incidents—Was Sent to India to Study the Workings of Self Government.

LONDON, April 13—An Exchange Telegraph despatch from Bombay said the Indian commission headed by Sir John Simon sailed for England today. The commission arrived from Delhi over a well guarded route, but there were no incidents. The commission was sent to India last fall to study the workings of the self government already granted India and to determine whether the country is ready for an extension of self rule.

Anti-Japanese Congress.

Manila, P. I., April 13—Representatives of Chinese mercantile groups from all parts of the Phillipin Islands were gathering here today for the opening of the general congress of the anti-Japanese Association tomorrow.

During the past month the association has had several influential Chinese travelling throughout the various provinces to strengthen the anti-Japanese boycott movement.

INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITY IN NEW ENGLAND

New England Power Association Had Big Increase in the Output of Electrical Energy.

Boston, April 13—New England Power Association, controlled by International Hydro-Electric System, a subsidiary of International Paper and Power Company, produced 123,960,000 kilowatt hours of electric energy in March, an increase of 14 per cent. over the output of the Association in March 1928, and 34 per cent over that of March 1927. In the first three months of this year, the production of New England Power Association was 376,924,000 kilowatt hours, 14 per cent greater than in the corresponding period of 1928, and 44 per cent greater than in the first three months of 1927.

Industrial activity in the New England States during the first quarter of this year was maintained at a higher level than in any other first quarter on record. Although complete data regarding activity in March are not yet available, the rate of business activity during January and February together with preliminary reports for March, make it apparent that the first quarter of 1929 was satisfactory. New peaks in production were made in steel, automobiles, automobile tires, in the manufacture of farm implements, radios, machine tools, and in a number of lesser lines.

HORSE WEARS TROUSERS, ILL

New York, April 13—Mrs. Evelyn Word Leigh, who lives in a glass bungalow and goes barefoot, is distressed. Her chestnut horse, which wears trousers when pulling her about in a phaeton, is ill. She describes herself as a private dancer and student of finance.

MORE BRIDGE CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN AWARDED

Fredericton Man to Rebuild the Notre Dame Bridge in Kent County at a Cost of \$21,000.

Two more contracts for highway bridges to be erected this season in New Brunswick were awarded today by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.

One is for Notre Dame Bridge over the Cocagne River on the highway between Notre Dame and Buctouche in the Parish of Dundas, Kent County, which was awarded to Ashley A. Colter at Fredericton the contract price being approximately \$21,000. The new structure will consist of three 112 feet 9 inches in the clear covered Howe truss spans on concrete substructure, foundation on ledge rock, earth and stone embankment approaches. The location of the new bridge is slightly to the east of the old structure and the grade of the roadway for the new bridge will be some 10 feet higher than at present.

The other contract awarded was for Duguay (Auxibe) Bridge over the Mattempeque River on the highway from Upper Pokemouche to Paquetville in the Parish of Inkerman, Gloucester County. This contract was awarded to L. Doyle of Douglastown, the approximate price being \$4,500. This new structure will consist of a system of stringer spans and cedar crib blocks with stone embankment approaches, covering a total length of 717 feet. This bridge is located on a bye-road, and inasmuch as the alignment of the highway is suitable the new bridge will be located on the same site as the present one.
