German Monarchists will Try to Defeat Young Plan

The "Steel Helmets" Are Gathering Their Forces
For a Concentrated Fight Against Plan For
Reparations Payments—Feel Stronger Since
Recent Defeat in the Reichstag.

(By ERIC KEYSER, British United Press Staff Correspondent.)

BERLIN, July 10—Echoes of pre-revolutionary days were heard through-out Germany today as the monarchistic societies known as the "Steel Helmets" gathered their forces for a concentrated fight against the Young plan for reparations plans payment and against certain paragraphs contained in the Treaty of Versailles.

Feeling much stronger since their recent defeat in the Reichstag of the continuation of the protection of the republic law, sponsored by the Liberals and opposed by the Nationalists, the extreme monarchistic societies have combined for a drive to defeat the Young plan for reparations payments when it comes up for national ratification.

GIRL UNDER ARREST ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

Body of a Newly Born
Infant Found in a Bag
in a Shed at Bartibog
Bridge.

Chatham, July 9—Discovery of the body of a newly-born infant in a bag in a shed adjoining the home of Mrs. George Murray, Bartibog Bridge, Northumberland county, this afternoon, with a blood-stained axe nearby, led to the arrest of Mary Savoy, 19-year-old maid in the Murray home. The girl, mother of the slaughtered babe, is now under guard of provincial police and owing to her condition cannot be moved from the Murray home for several days. She will be tried for murder.

Following the finding of the infant's corpse in the shed, Provincial Policeman H. McMahon, of Chatham, and Provincial Policeman Boby, in charge of the Chatham detachment, were summoned to the Murray home. Dr. J. B. McKenzie, of Loggieville, was summoned and found the infant dead. Dr. E. H. Freeman, of Chatham, and T. H. Whelan, of Newcastle, county clerk of the peace, were summoned later and an inquest was held by Dr. Freeman, as coroner. The jury returned a verdict to the effect that the child came to its death by a blow or blows from a blunt instrument in the hands of a person or persons unknown. The inquest was ordered by Dr. Freeman following his examination of the babe's corpse.

Both Mrs. Murray, and her son informed the police that they had heard the girl get up from her bed in the middle of last night and leave the house. It is presumed that the girl gave birth to the child in her room, carried it to the shed and committed the deed.

FOUR MINERS KILLED IN AN EXPLOSION

London, July 10—Four miners were reported killed and six badly burned in an explosion in a mine at Blaenavon today. Blaenavon is a city of ten thousand inhabitants situated in the coal and iron mine district south west of Abergavenny.

OLDEST BERLIN STREETS DOOMED BY PROGRESS

Berlin, July 10—Berlin's oldest street, the Koenig, a quiet backwater in the heart of the city, is doomed. Almost the only picturesque bit that is left of early Berlin, it has to make way for modern improvements.

When Berlin was a Wendish village in the 14th century, the Koenig was a landing place for river trade, and it was at this spot that the people used to take one of the two baths they had in their lives: one on birth and one on marriage. Their third bath they got when they were laid out for burial.

The nuptial bathing at which long robes were worn, was a great festivity. Wedding guests escorted the happy couple to the water's edge and the immersion took place. to the accompaniments of sackbuts and shawms.

FRONT AXLE MISSING ON FRENCH CAR

Paris, July 10—Elimination of the front axle, independent springing of each front wheel and a dual steering control are suggested as the solution of many automobile difficulties by D. Sausaud de Lavaud, an engineer famed for originality in design. Several of his inventions have been exhibited at Paris Auto Salon.

Independent springing of front wheels is found on a number of French cars and it is claimed for the system that it avoids the twisting motion of the chassis on rough roads. But the old steering system is in general use.

A mysterious letter was found by Mrs. Ford in her mail box. It was addressed in the scrawling handwriting of an aged person and read:

"Mrs. Ford: A long time ago my man took chickens three times from your place. Now he is gone and the children and I think he might rest better if you got some pay for them. Just a little each week maybe."

Each week, following receipt of the letter, one, two or three crisp one dollar bills have reached the Ford home by mail.

A child of five or six years had been playing with a very presentable looking tire when a "person" with a decidedly semitic cast of countenance, eagle eye ever alight for business, offered one dollar for the unusual play-top. Readily the child complied, his young brain dazzled with prospects of endless ice-cream cones and Tom Mix shows. The person, bundled the tire into his cart, dropped three black pennies into the child's bewildered hand and drove complacently away with an air of one who has done well indeed! With tears in his eyes the boy watched his castles of ice-cream melt tragically away. Business may be business but in this case it is reminiscent of the lawless exploits of those perfumed and lawless knights of the road Dick Turpin and Claude Duval—without the perfume.

HIS MAJESTY'S CONDITION UNCHANGED

Doctors Taking Every
Precaution to Safe-
guard His Health.

SINUS HAS
REOPENED

The Ex-Ray Photo-
graphs Being Care-
fully Examined.

London, July 10—His Majesty King George has passed a good night, and there is no change in his condition, although it is causing considerable public anxiety. His physicians again held several consultations because of the reopening of the sinus leading into the right chest cavity, are taking every precaution to safeguard His Majesty's health.

Numerous X-ray photographs, which were taken yesterday, have been carefully examined by the physicians, who, if they have reached any definite conclusions, have not made them public. A more careful examination of the photographs will be made tomorrow and possibly further X-rays will be taken to note, if possible, any change in the condition in the right lung and pleural cavity.

RUSSIAN YOUTH MUST AVOID CHURCH FEASTS

Moscow, July 10—The Russian Communist Youth's League has ruled that members must be consistent in their anti-religious struggle. Not only must they boycott religious holidays but they must also refrain from any preparation for religious celebrations.

League members are forbidden to eat Easter cake or Easter eggs or any other paschal dainties.

These don'ts were issued after the official newspaper of the league received a letter from a girl asking whether it would be proper if she helped her mother to make Easter cakes.

Los Angeles, July 9—Writing her husband that she can't stand expensive things, Mrs. Claude Derringer has forsaken the luxury he gave her and gone back to the old restaurant life. The Market

Owing to the inclemency of the weather a very small market huddled about Phoenix Square this morning displaying its wares nevertheless, at ambitious prices. St. John river salmon were offered in greater profusion than the Miramichi variety but the price 25 cents per lb., seemed to hold good to rail. Grilse went for 75 cents apiece, peas 40 cents per quart; eggs 40 cents a dozen; fowl 35 cents per lb.; butter 35 cents per lb.; wild strawberries were going at 30 cents a box.

Little Hope for the Victims of British Submarine Disaster

The Admiralty Has Thrown All of Its Resources
Into an Effort to Salvage the Sunken Craft—
Is Now Lying in Fifty Fathoms of Water.

LONDON, July 10—The British Admiralty threw all its resources today into the effort to salvage the submarine H-47 resting beneath fifty fathoms of water in St. George's Channel, but Admiralty officials admitted they had little hope that any of the twenty-one men believed in the boat were still alive.

Naval vessels were rushed to the spot on the New York-Liverpool ship lane where the H-47 sank after a collision with the L-12 while returning from manouevres in the Irish Sea, and sea-planes were instructed to scan the waters for possible survivors.

AN "INVERTED ROCKET" NEW AERIAL STUNT

London, July 10—When the Royal Air Force stages its display at Hendon airdrome this month, a pilot famed for his skill in "aerobatics" will demonstrate his latest maneuver.

It is called the "invertible rocket." This stunt can be performed only on high-powered single-seater airplanes of the newest type. It begins with an upside down flight close to the ground. The machine, traveling at a high speed shoots downward for more than 1,000 feet and it is then turned right side up.

The maneuver, according to the pilot cannot be performed on the machines at present used as standard in the R. A. F. It can, however, be done with the new Bristol "Bulldog" which is to be used for re-equipment.

"MISS SPAIN" HITS AMERICAN MEN

Teneriffe, Canary Islands, July 9—Senorita Rosario Velazquez, who was "Miss Spain" at the Galveston beauty pageant, dislikes American men. "They are wholly dominated by their women, who are extremely dominating," she explained here on the way home to her Madrid.

To Take a Cruise

A party composed of Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, Mr. H. C. Ramsay, Chief Draughtsman of the Department of Lands and Mines, Mr. George T. Pinder, and Mr. Clifford Davis of the Boston Post staff are leaving this evening on a ten days fishing trip to the Tobique and Nepisiquit waters. They go from here by the C. N. R. to Plaster Rock where they will embark by canoe. They will proceed up the Tobique to Nictau Lake and cross to the Nepisiquit and continue on to Bathurst.

Guide Not Necessary

A party of four Americans who have been trout fishing on the Nashwaak for the past week returned to the city yesterday with a complaint that they had been ordered off the stream by a man who claimed to be a registered guide. He gave them to understand that the law required them to employ a guide while fishing. Upon being assured here that such was not the case the party started out again to try their luck.

MRS. S. H. LOGAN A VICTIM OF AUTO SMASH

Wife of General Manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce Met Tragic Death at Newmarket, Ont.

Newmarket, Ont., July 9—Mrs. Frances May Logan, wife of S. H. Logan, General Manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce died here tonight from shock and injuries when the car in which she was riding was sideswiped in a collision.

Mrs. H. W. Burgess, Toronto, a passenger in the car with Mrs. Logan suffered minor injuries.

Neither John Illingworth, a Bank of Commerce chauffeur, nor E. D. Babcock, Barrie, Ont., driver of the other car, were injured.

Traffic Officer Thompson stated the accident occurred five miles north of Bradford. His investigation revealed he said, that the automobile carrying Mrs. Logan attempted to pass a truck and was forced into the ditch to avoid another car coming from the opposite direction. The cars came in contact, however.

Mrs. Logan and Mrs. Burgess were driven to a hospital by passing motorists. Doctors at the hospital said that Mrs. Logan died chiefly as the result of shock. She was cut about the head and slightly bruised.

Auto Smash-Up.

A large Hudson six, driven by Miss Ethel Rogers, miraculously escaped irreparable damage when, turning out to avoid an oncoming Ford, it smashed into the curbing in front of the Devon Bank of Commerce and, skidding wildly, collided with a horse owned by Williams Bros., knocking it from its feet. Strangely enough the horse scrambled to its feet having sustained a few minor injuries while the car with bent fenders and a badly wrenched steering gear, tottered to a local garage for repairs.

Called by Illness

Miss M. B. VanDine, matron of Allison Hall, Sackville, who was called to the city by the serious illness of her cousin Miss Minnie McCausland has returned to Sackville. Mrs. Brown of Ottawa, another cousin, has remained at the bedside, although Miss McCausland is now considered to be out of imminent danger.
