STALLIONS ACT IS PRODUCING GOOD RESULTS

Registration Proceeding Rapidly---Half of Stallions in the Province of the Highest Class---Grades Will be Eliminated by May 1919---Some of the Regulations.

Stallion
The steps taken by the Department of Agriculture of New Brunswick to put into effect the New Brunswick Stallions Act, 1915, is meeting with marked success. Mr. Thomas Hetherington, Live Stock Inspector, is in charge of this branch of the work, and states that the reports already forwarded to him indicate that the owners of stallions recognize that the Act will bring about a decided improvement in conditions in New Brunswick as far as horse breeding is concerned. In the Counties of Carleton, York, and Northumberland the registration of stallions has been particularly well done. Dr. McCoy of Fredericton, Dr. Fugsley of Woodstock and Mr. Jones of Chatham having filled in the blanks for practically every stallion in their respective districts.

Better than Expected.
One result of the registration has been the securing of the information that the number of grade stallions in the province is much smaller than has been thought. One half of the stallions of the province after inspection have been classed as No. 1, i.e., pure bred and sound in every particular. It is only in the northern counties that the grade stallion is in the majority.

To Eliminate Grades.
In January next the inspection for 1918 will be made, thus permitting the registration of all stallions before the season opens. The object of the Act is to eliminate the grade stallions and all stallions unsound or predisposed to unsoundness. According to the pro-

visions of the Act no certificate of enrollment shall be issued for a grade stallion after May 1st, 1919, and no person travelling an unenrolled stallion shall have route bills or breeding cards printed or posted. Any advertising matter used by the owner of the stallion must contain a copy of the certificate issued by the Government and owners of mares are advised to insist upon being shown the original certificate.

RECORD RECEIPTS FROM MOTOR CARS

Total to June 30th was \$45,000—Licensed Chauffeurs Number Five Hundred.

About 4,350 automobiles have been registered in New Brunswick up to June 30th, this year, according to the figures secured by The Mail at the Provincial Department of Public Works.

The present season has been the best from the automobile standpoint, in the history of the province. Up to June 30th, 4,350 cars had been registered in New Brunswick. Up to December 30th, 1916, there were over 3,000 cars. Up to date 1,300 new cars have been registered as against 569 up to June 10th last year. The receipts from licenses have also increased and nearly doubled that of last year. Upwards of \$45,000 has been paid in at the Department of Public Works to date, as compared with \$28,000 last year.

In New Brunswick there are 500 registered chauffeurs and 200 motorcycles. Local automobile dealers state that the present year has been the best as they have disposed of more cars in 1917 than during any one previous year.

Import Trade Buoyant.

The import trade of Fredericton is displaying a most remarkably buoyant condition according to the customs returns compiled by Collector L. C. Macnutt today. The month of June shows an increase in duty of \$3,050 compared with the same month of last year and the quarter shows an increase in duty collected of \$23,037. There also has been an increase in the value of imports which is accounted for by the increase in prices and also by improved business conditions in this vicinity.

Poor Run of Fish.

So far the catch of salmon in the river has not been up to the record of former seasons. This is due to the extraordinary high freshet. During the past five days there has been a slight improvement. Charles Pitcher, of Springhill, had fifteen salmon in the market this morning, which he disposed of at 20 cents a pound.

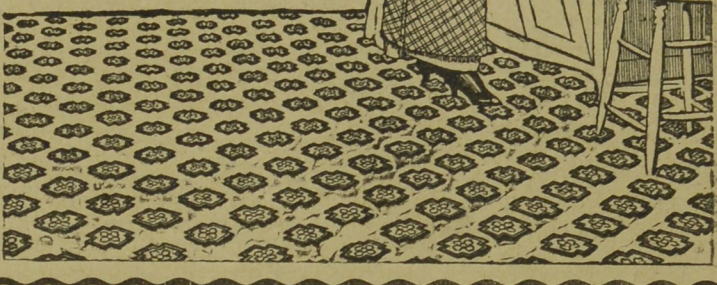
