Nineteen Killed in Election Riots in State of Vera Cruz

The Casualties So Great That the Municipal Elections in Many Places Will Have to Be Held Over Again—Many People Injured at Tuxtla and Sanago.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

VERA CRUZ, MEXICO, September 24—Nineteen persons were killed in the riots which accompanied Sunday's municipal elections in the State of Vera Cruz, it was learned authentically today. Two rioters were killed in this city and a total of fifteen fell in Orizaba and Cordoba. One was slain in the disturbances at Minatitlan and another at Catemaco.

Many person were injured at Tuxtla and Sanago. The rioting was so fierce and the number of casualties so great that eighteen new elections in various points were announced owing to the confusion. Among the places where the elections will have to be held over are Vera Cruz, Cordoba, Catemaco, Minatitlan, Santiago and Tuxtla.

CANADIAN FISH WEEK NOV. 22-29

Montreal, Sept. 24—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Canadian Fisheries Association it was decided to hold "Fish Week" throughout the Dominion from Nov. 22 to Nov. 29.

"Fish will be spashed everywhere in hotels and restaurants and on the radio," declared R. W. Gould, secretary of the Association.

"We shall make special efforts to have fish featured in order to bring home to the people its great value as a food."

Discussion at the meeting also centred round the proposal to obtain \$100,000 from the Federal Government for publicity purposes.

In moving the motion in support of the proposal, which was carried, A. H. Brittain, chairman of the publicity committee, said:

"I believe firmly that there is no power and no agency in existence that can bring about and increase the demand for Canadian fish in Canadian homes in an equal degree with well considered and intelligent publicity. With a publicity campaign being carried out in the various daily and weekly newspapers, and other periodicals in Canada, the entire press of the country will get behind us and assist us in their news columns and through their editorial policies."

WILL PROBE SUNDAY RIOT IN VERA CRUZ

Mexico City, Sept. 25—Adalberto Tejeda, governor of Vera Cruz, informed the ministry of the interior today that he was appointing a committee of confidential agents to investigate the Sunday election day disturbances in which many persons were killed and numerous others were seriously injured.

BEES MAY BE THRIFTY, BUT NOT TOO HONEST

East Lansing, Sept. 25—Bees, which have always been literature's shining example of industry and thrift, are now accused by specialists in apiculture at Michigan State College of robbery.

As a further mark of criminal traits the specialists point out that the bees rob the weak and defenceless members of their species. Colonies which have too few members to defend their honey stores fall victims to insect highwaymen if the apiarist is not careful in handling his bees.

Owners of bees are advised to contract the entrances of hives occupied by weak colonies. This enables the few defenders within the hive to bar their door to predatory strangers. If the hives of weak colonies must be opened, the work should be done as rapidly as possible.

A BOW TIE FOR MORNING IS APPROVED

London, Sept. 25—Royal approval has been given the rare practice of wearing a bow tie with a morning coat.

Recently the King appeared at church wearing a bow tie with his morning coat, a style that the Prince of Wales recently adopted.

Except on formal evening occasions the King has not worn a bow tie in years. At one time he wore nothing else but flowing silk ties held together with a gold ring instead of tied.

PLAN HUGE ROSE BEDS IN NEWPORT

Newport, R. I., Sept. 25—Commodore and Mrs. Arthur Curtiss James are planning an elaborate series of rose gardens on their Ocean Drive estate. Two hundred men are dynamitting natural rock in preliminary work. The gardens will cover several square miles. Their cost is estimated at \$250,000.

COUNTY JAILS OF MARITIMES ARE CRITICIZED

Prof. Topping of the University of British Columbia is Rather Outspoken.

Toronto, Sept. 24—Criticism of the county jails of Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces was made here today in a paper written by Prof. C. W. Topping, of the University of British Columbia are read before the American Prison Association convention now in session.

The paper, read by Dr. Hastings H. Hart in Prof. Topping's absence, says the county jails are "vicious institutions controlled by degraded characters." complaints of "unwholesome conditions conducive to abominable vices" and declares that such institutions are "subject to the political spoils system."

"The county jail is dark damp and unwholesome," said Prof Topping's paper. "It is infested with vermin and, with two exceptions, having no segregation whatever, even of the crudest kind. Where there is an attempt made at classification, it rarely, if ever, apprehends more than separation of the sexes and the keeping away from physical contact with the men, boys whose apparent ages are from 18 to 20 down. With few exceptions, the well are kept in close contact with the sick, even when the latter are afflicted with the most loathsome diseases of an infectious or contagious nature."

The Kangaroo Court

"While 10 per cent. of the jails have matrons, the Kangaroo Court exists in perhaps the majority of the vicious institutions, which of course, ensures their control by the most degraded and dominating characters who are, in most cases, 'hard boiled.'"

"In Quebec jails idleness rather than industry is the order of the day." The paper added that the Canadian county jails were slightly superior to the county jails of the United States in six particulars, namely, in stricter classification and in the presence of less larkness, dampness, over-crowding, dirt and vermin. But they were "equally unwholesome in general atmosphere."

BLAMES GOLF FOR WEAKNESS OF THE EYES

Chicago, Sept. 25—Golf not work, gives the tired business man weak eyes and a headache, and the way Dr. B. T. Hoffman, an eye specialist arrived at that conclusion is this:

The average man works all week under poor or artificial light. Then he rushes to the links, often without a hat or sun glasses. His eyes can't stand the sun strain. Eye trouble and headaches follow.

Golf, Dr. Hoffman told the Chicago Optometric Society, for this reason ruins more eyes than office work.

Government Meeting.

PRINCE IS NOT LIKELY TO PILOT HIS NEW PLANE

Has Been Persuaded to Employ an Air Force Officer.

AN ACCIDENT IS FEARED

Edward F. Fielden Has Been Appointed His Personal Pilot.

London, Sept. 24—The Prince of Wales was reported today to have been persuaded not to pilot the two seated plane he recently purchased for fear of an accident might occur.

These reports were strengthened by the authoritative information that Edward Hedley Fielden, aerial air force reserve officer, has been appointed as personal pilot to the Prince of Wales and that henceforth he will fly the two seater.

CREATOR OF DIAMOND DICK PASSES AWAY

Owasco, N. Y., Sept. 25—George C. Jenks, the creator of "Diamond Dick," is dead.

A two-week illness resulted in his death at his home on Owasco Lake, where he still pecked at his typewriter. He left posterity more than 6,000,000 words of racy, bloody fiction.

About 26 years ago, Jenks shut himself up in a Brooklyn studio and soon the "Diamond Dick" stories began to engulf the bookstalls. The youth of the nation cheered the author on, and before long Jenks was writing two novelettes a week, recounting the amazing adventures of Dick who could shoot from the hip and wriggle out of the hangman's noose with a facility that equalled the exploit of Nick Carter.

It was somewhat daring to peruse a "Diamond Dick" book, and many were the boys at the turn of the century who propped a Jenks thriller up behind their arithmetic books, forgetting algebraic equations while they followed Dick's feats with pop-eyed interest.

Jenks was faithful to his public and as the demand increased his labors became more prodigious. Ten thousand, then 15,000 words a day flowed off his pen until the chronicle of "Diamond Dick" stretched to 250 novels, in which 5,180 redskins were consigned to the happy hunting ground by fire, bullet or sword.

HON. G. KEMP LEFT VERY LARGE ESTATE

Toronto, Sept. 25—Bequests totalling between \$150,000 and \$200,000 are devoted to religions, charitable and educational purposes under the will of the late Sir Edward Kemp, K. C., M. G.

Sir Edward died suddenly at his summer home near Bobcaygeon on the night of Aug. 12 last.

Details of his will were made public yesterday, the National Trust Company, Lady Kemp and A. B. Colville K. C., of Montreal having applied for probate.

The estate totals \$7,718,809.48. It is made up as follows: Real estate, \$125,000; stocks and bonds \$6,762,668.23; cash, \$792,997.24; miscellaneous \$27,350; life insurance \$10,965.

Clarenceville, Que., the birthplace of the late Sir Edward Kemp is remembered with a gift of \$5,000 to the Clarenceville United Church.

Would have Less Military Color Armistice Day

Agitation Being Carried on in Great Britain is Bearing Fruit — Home Secretary Clync Would Have Ceremony Emphasize the Universal Desire For Peace.

LONDON, Sept. 25—The agitation for less military ceremony suggesting war-like preparations and a more civilian character emphasizing the universal desire for peace at the annual armistice ceremony at the Cenotaph, is bearing fruit. Right Hon. J. R. Clync, the home secretary, says that "My own personal wish and that of the government is that the function, while retaining such necessary military features as will convey a public tribute to the men who fell in the war, should assume a more civilian aspect and less of the military display."

MEDICAL OFFICERS TO VISIT U. S. AND CANADA

Will Study the Place and Function of Medical Service in Connection With Railway.

Montreal, Sept. 25—To study the place and function of medical services in the railways of Canada and the U. S. A. two eminent French physicians will arrive in Montreal by Canadian National Railways on October 14th. They are Dr. Louis Bazy, Chief Medical Officer of the Paris and Orleans Railway, and Dr. P. Fredet, Chief Medical Officer of the Paris, Lyons, and Mediterranean Railway. They have expressed great interest in the Canadian National System, and on their arrival in Montreal, they will be welcomed by Dr. J. McCombe, Chief Medical Officer of this railway, as well as by other prominent medical men. The two distinguished visitors will be in Montreal a day or two before going to Quebec, and then to Rochester, Denver, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and other United States cities.

POLICE ARE CALLED OUT TO KILL CANARY

Pitman, Pa., Sept. 25—Chief of Police Oran W. Lloyd reports that the department received a request to gas a canary bird. The bird, a pet in the household of Postmaster S. P. Clark, was old and sick, and the Clark family decided it would be humane to put it out of misery.

The canary bird was placed in the lethal chamber by a police officer.

As the result of colliding with a Marysville taxi last night at the intersection of two streets in Devon, the Victoria Hospital ambulance met with damages, which had to be repaired this morning at a local garage. The accident occurred when the ambulance was rushing to take a patient to the hospital from Marysville, the two cars coming together as they came around the corner. No one was injured in the collision.
