EXTORTED MONEY FROM LIQUOR LICENCEES

Mr. R. Sullivan Authority for Statement That \$6000, Was Collected.

As to the liquor charges Hon. Mr. Morrissey is a most impressive witness. He said Premier Clarke why the government refused the request of the Opposition to have Royal Commissioner Chandler investigate the collection of large sums of money from liquor licensees under our government while the Legislature was in session.

Mr. Morrissey continued: "Who prompted that refusal? Would not one word from you to Royal Commissioner Chandler appointed him, and encouraged him to investigate so important a matter as that?"

"In proof of Mr. Carter's charges, Mr. Richard Sullivan, a wholesale liquor merchant of St. John, told me a few days ago that \$6,000 or thereabouts was collected from the liquor licensees and paid over, and that \$2,000 more was demanded and they refused to pay such additional demand."

Paid over to whom? Demanded by whom? What became of the money? On what representations was it made?

Let these questions be answered by the gentlemen who are now telling the electors this movement has "nothing to fear or conceal."

If this investigation had been granted, if all hands had been called and sworn, the people of New Brunswick would have known who got the \$6,000 and tried to get \$2,000 more, and why the money was paid and what was its ultimate destination.

What is the use of members of the government and their supporters telling the public they have nothing to fear or conceal? The facts prove both fear and concealment.

SAYS THE GOVERNMENT FALSIFIED THE RECORDS

The following extract from the letter which Hon. John Morrissey, a former member of the business-like provincial Government addressed to Premier Clarke when he resigned his portfolio, makes interesting reading at this time:

"I speak plainly, Mr. Premier, for the time has gone by to deal with these matters in any other way."

"I know of other transactions that will detract greatly from the efforts you are making in 'insisting on the maintenance of high character in the public service.' I have another reference to make because of the statement in which you state 'you have displayed a disposition in many matters to act alone rather than in conjunction and harmony with the other members of the Government.' The latter part of that statement is, in a measure, and only in a measure, correct. When I felt that my department was not being used in the interests of the public, a feeling that became a certainty with me during last summer and fall, I did feel a certain reluctance in joining with my colleagues in pursuing such a course. That reluctance became intensified during this session, when I saw that a deliberate attempt was being made on the part of members of the Government to give false information to people in answer to Opposition inquiries."

False Information. "I am old fashioned enough to believe that the rights of the people are above everything; that we are only stewards of the public, and when I became sure from personal experience in my own department that the true an-

PINDER'S DEALINGS WITH THE PUBLIC TREASURY

(Editorial from Gleaner, February 13th, 1914.)

Mr. Pinder continued to pay his respects to the Gleaner and to its managing director. A man of susceptibilities like Mr. Pinder would much prefer after all that has been said with truth of his connection with the public business, to keep silent for some time to come; but not so with Mr. Pinder. He is a bold operator who works in absolute defiance of all recognized ethics having to do with honorable dealings in public affairs. He has already been charged with a deliberate breach of trust in his connection with his unfortunate Southampton Railway operations, a breach of trust that would bring a blush of shame to almost any other man when the facts and conditions were exposed as they have been. He has been charged with taking Government property for his own use and deliberately refusing to pay for it, trading upon his position as a member of the Legislature to avoid a process for enforcement of payment of a debt that any other would be subjected to. He stands charged with passing into the Government a cheque that is to this day valueless and worthless; he is further charged with abusing his position and influence as a member for York to take the personal advantage which continued non-payment of his stumpage dues gives him at the expense of the Province. He is charged with many other practices equally as grave, which go to make up probably by far the most compromising record of any man in the public life in this Province. His only reply is misrepresentation of others in their private capacity. Listen to this as an instance: The Gleaner, against which he now cherishes bitter enmity, is said by him to have withheld stock certificates of this business in his favor amounting to \$500. What an absurdity, and to what extremes is a man driven, when he is driven to seek refuge in such absurdities. If James K. Pinder has not the stock certificates and has not in his possession paid drafts representing \$500, is not that ample evidence that he is not entitled to the certificates and has no just claim to the possession of the stock? To all those who have ever had any dealings with Mr. Pinder, it will be unnecessary to say that he did not of course pay any cash down for any stock he ever agreed to purchase. His methods would admittedly be notes or drafts. Where are the paid drafts representing the stock? The drafts he gave are lying unpaid and dishonored in the office of the Gleaner. By what order of procedure, or on what business principle would Mr. Pinder be entitled to a stock certificate with unpaid and dishonored notes as the only security? And now therefore that he has been absurd enough to introduce personal matters into a discussion which had to do only with his record as a public man, he has himself by these personal references led it to be brought out that in his private dealings he is as unreliable, as untruthful and as indecent as he has been shown to be in his capacity as a representative of this county in his dealings with the public business. Yet this is the man who is asking the electors of York to endorse a candidate who he can use to back him up in any further dealings he may even yet fancy he can have with the public treasury.

How to Reform the Provincial Government

The following is taken from the Chatham World of April 27th last, and written by J. L. Stewart, one of the Government candidates in Northumberland county:

"In view of the revelations respecting rottenness in the Public Works Department, and of the charges and counter charges respecting other departments of the Government, it would be well to ask the Governor General of Canada to issue a Royal Commission to investigate the whole New Brunswick Government outfit, and to appoint some one to administer the public affairs of the province while the investigation into the charges against the present Government 'are in progress. The people of New Brunswick have necessarily no confidence in the honesty of the present Government, and of which ex-Premier Fleming was the chief. THE ONLY WAY TO REFORM THIS GOVERNMENT IS TO KICK IT OUT."

TRAFFIC CONGESTED AT ONTARIO POINTS

Toronto, Feb. 17.—That inroads are being made into the clogged conditions of the terminals at Fort Erie and Black Rock, where thousands of cars of hard and merchants coal are snowed in and congested, was apparent today by the number of cars which were delivered at the Toronto and Mimico terminals. Between twenty-five and thirty thousand tons of all kinds of coal was hauled. Over half of this amount was soft coal.

The coal arrivals during the past couple of days have relieved the local situation to some extent in manufacturing establishments. By the end of the coming week General Supt. Hittenbarger of the Grand Trunk expects the soft coal situation will again be normal.
