## OPPOSITION PUTTING UP A SPIRITED CAMPAIGN

(Continued from page 2.)

Mr. Logan took a prominent part in the fight for decent government had been Conservative—Sir Charles Hibbert, however, and to his everlasting credit it could be said that party ties could not prevent him from doing his duty by the people. (Applause.)

### Magnificent Candidates.

Mr. Logan then drew attention to the magnificent class of men who were candidates in opposition to the Murray government in New Brunswick. In St. John there was W. H. Barnaby, a man with a long and honorable business career, a man against whom nothing could be said. There was Dr. Roberts, who repeatedly had declined nomination, but who had agreed to run in this election because he deemed it a public duty to aid in the restoration of good government to New Brunswick.

### The Ticket in York.

"It was with the greatest interest and pleasure," said Mr. Logan, "that I heard your Opposition candidates in York give their Nomination Day speeches this afternoon. I COULD NOT HELP BUT RECOGNIZE A TICKET MOST ADMIRABLY REPRESENTATIVE OF THE VARIOUS CLASSES OF THE POPULATION. There was Mr. Burt, a lumber operator and man of business. There was Mr. Hughes, who has one of the brightest legal minds in New Brunswick, and whose ability is known beyond the borders of his own province. There was Mr. Kitchen, representative of the solid business interests of your own city. There was Mr. Lawson, who spoke on behalf of that great section of the people, the working class, and who displayed those two sterling qualities, earnestness and sincerity. (Prolonged applause.)

"I have been agreeably surprised," continued the speaker, "with what I have found in York county. I came here almost regarding it a joke that an Opposition to the Murray government could make any kind of showing in such a government stronghold. I WILL LEAVE FREDERICTON ON MONDAY CONVINCED THAT YOU WILL ELECT THREE MEN AND PROBABLY FOUR." (Applause.)

### The Government Ticket.

"We can consider the Government ticket in York. If you want a really good description of Mr. Pinder, read the Gleaner. (Laughter.) Then there is Mr. Young. I have been acquainted with agricultural schools and technical schools in my own province, but I had to come here to find a school for graft with Mr. Young as principal. (Laughter and applause.) Dr. Crockett and Mr. Hunter I do not know, but I do know the four men against whom that Government ticket is running.

"I know Mr. Walter E. Foster, of St. John, who has been selected as the leader of the Opposition party—one of the brightest and cleanest young men in New Brunswick. HE HAS MADE GOOD IN BUSINESS AND HE WILL MAKE GOOD AS PREMIER OF THIS HIS NATIVE PROVINCE." (Applause.)

### Compensation Act.

Mr. Logan then proceeded to discuss the Workmen's Compensation Act. "You have a god act for the lawyers but it is not much good to you," was his summing up of the New Brunswick Compensation Act. He pointed out that under the acts in force in Ontario, Nova Scotia, Quebec and other provinces, an injured employee did not make a claim against his employer. A Compensation Board was appointed which assessed on all employers of labor in the province amounts sufficient to meet all probable claims for injuries. Every injury to an employee had to be reported at once to the Compensation Board in Nova Scotia, which had at its disposal a grant of \$25,000 from the province in addition to that assessed on employers. An injured workman could draw 55 per cent. of his wages while incapacitated by injuries. If killed, his widow received a pension and his children were provided for. Mr. Logan gave detailed information concerning the workings of the act in his own province. In New Brunswick the employee could only recover from the employer, who might become insolvent.

"Why," he asked, "has it been that other provinces have adopted admirable acts and New Brunswick lagged behind?"

"A provincial election," continued Mr. Logan, "is twice as important as a Federal election. A provincial legislature comes very close to your lives. It is of the utmost importance that a province have a good legislature. I ONLY ASK THAT BETWEEN NOW AND SATURDAY NEXT YOU THINK ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ELECTION. FOLLOW THE LEAD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND MANITOBA. The beauty of responsible government is that you can turn the gears out and can keep on doing that until good representatives are

secured.

"Half a million men are coming back to us, I hope, soon. The great problem of the next four or five years is to do the best for the boys who have fought for you and me. The frontier of the British Empire is the trenches in Flanders. Let us do our duty here for the men there. Let us purify the country. Let us punish wrongdoers. Let us have a good country to which our men can return. We have begun to realize what a heritage we have in Canada. Let us preserve it from the grafter and for the boys who will come back from the front." (Applause.)

On the motion of Mr. Alex. Gibson, ex-M.P., seconded by Mr. John Kilburn, a vote of thanks was given the two speakers, after which the national anthem was sung.

## CROWD AT GOVERNMENT MEETING CHEERED FOR BURTT

Cold Welcome For Government Spell-Binders at Burt's Corner.
