May Renew Conversations On Naval Disarmament

Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador to the U. S. Makes Important Pronouncement at Washington—Britain Anxious to Renew the Conversations But Has Found it Necessary to Proceed With Caution.

(Special to The Daily Mail by the British United Press.)

LONDON, Feb. 16—Sir Esme Howard's important pronouncement in Washington in which he indicated the desire of Britain to reopen discussion with the United States on naval disarmament, was the result of long and careful consideration on the part of the British government.

Ever since the breakdown of the Geneva conference, the British have been anxious to renew the conversations, but they had to proceed with the utmost caution because of misinterpretation of their motives in the United States. At one time this misinterpretation was so dangerous that officials here despaired of an opportunity for the conference arising before 1931. However, as Sir Esme has pointed out, now that the cruiser bill is out of the way, the time will soon be ripe for further discussions.

To Consult Dominions.

London, Feb. 16—Great Britain probably will be unable to make any further announcement on naval disarmament until she has consulted with her Dominions, the foreign office announced today.

NEW COMPANY CONTROLS THE ANTIMONY MINE

The Lake George Mines Co., Ltd., Will Operate the Property—Fredericton Man on the Directorate.

(Telegraph-Journal)

What is expected to be the first metal mine in actual production in New Brunswick, with extensive development already accomplished, is the antimony property at Lake George, owned by the Lake George Mines Co., Ltd., the stock of which is offered today by the Maritime Financial Underwriters, Ltd.

Further equipment is being ordered with the idea of getting into actual production by the first of August. Various geologists and mining engineers report that the company's properties contain over 80 per cent of the known deposits of antimony in the British Empire and that there is sufficient ore indicated of high quality to place New Brunswick among the foremost antimony countries in the world. Assays show an average value of \$36 a ton and expert reports state that the average cost of mining, concentrating and smelting at \$6 per ton initial operations on this property of 3,840 acres were undertaken by A. D. Taylor, M.L.A., of Minto, and Angus McLean, of Bathurst. A shaft was sunk 210 feet with cross-cutting and vein following on both the 100-foot and 200-foot levels. These gentlemen have sold their holdings in return for stock in the Lake George Mines, Ltd., of which Mr. Taylor is president; John Neill, of Fredericton, vice-president; directors being G. G. Murdock, M.L.S.; A. N. Burgess, and A. D. Holyoke. Mill machinery capable of treating 50 to 75 tons of ore a day is to be installed in the early spring, reaching the production point in mid-summer. Sufficient ore is in sight to keep the mill going a number of years.

Most of the world's supply of antimony comes from China but is of an inferior grade and expensive to bring to the sea coast, owing to the necessity for transport on the backs of coolies for long distance. The Lake George mines are located about 5 miles from Fredericton and three miles from the Saint John River, making transport a simple matter.

Antimony is a metal of many uses, chiefly as an alloy with various other metals as for instance type metal, babbitt metal solder, band lead for vulcanizing rubber, bearing steel, paints, brass, bronze, foil, enamels and enamelware, cable coverings, chemicals and as a poison similar to arsenic.

On their return they will reside in Hillsboro, N. B. Mr. Sherwood is well known in Fredericton having once filled the position of manager of the Fredericton and Grand Lake Railway Company. This is his fourth matrimonial venture.

FALLING OFF IN P. E. I. EXPORTS

Charlottetown, Feb. 15—The value of the exports from Prince Edward Island to the United States for 1928 was \$2,025,061, as compared with \$2,454,792 for 1927. Increases occurred in exports of live poultry, fresh frozen smelts, salted cod, beef, hides and turnips. There were slight decreases in both quantity and value of canned lobster, live silver foxes, seed and table potatoes and grass seed.

The Prince of Wales One of the Busiest Men in the Country

Heir to the Throne Has Had to Shoulder Increased Responsibilities as a Result of the King's Illness—Condition of His Majesty Continues Satisfactory it is Officially Announced.

LONDON, Feb. 16—The increased responsibilities which the Prince of Wales has had to shoulder as a result of the King's illness have made him one of the busiest men in the country.

It has been realized that such a long time must elapse before His Majesty will again be able to attend to any of his normal duties that the Prince will have to undertake much of the work which would ordinarily fall upon his father.

While the Prince has taken new tasks with much zest, he seems more preoccupied and less gay than before his father's illness.

His Majesty Improving.

Bogner, Sussex, Feb. 16—King George's condition continued satisfactory today, an official announcement at Craigwell House said.

It was learned that the King was able to walk to the scales yesterday to be weighed, but attaches at Craigwell House emphasized that he has not yet reached the stage of convalescence.

King George was brought here last Saturday for the beneficial sea air and climate after a long siege of serious illness at Buckingham Palace.

ELEVEN DEAD IN ASYLUM FIRE AT TOYAMA

Tokio, Feb. 16—Eleven persons were dead and eight missing after a fire destroyed in Toyama lunatic asylum and the artillery and engineering school near it today.

At least five lunatics were burned to death. It was believed about a score escaped.

FREDERICTON GIRL TAKES A PART IN COMEDY

Miss Minnie Black Made a Hit in a Musical Comedy at Halifax.

Halifax, Feb. 15—"Carrie Comes to College," a musical comedy in two acts, with Miss Minnie Black of Fredericton, taking the part of Carrie, and Fred Jennings, of Saint John, playing one of the leading masculine roles, was presented yesterday afternoon and evening at the Majestic theatre by the Dalhousie Glee and Dramatic Society. Packed houses greeted both performances.

The show was one of the most momentous staged by Dalhousie students, the cast, numbering almost 100, including the dancing and singing chorus and the Dalhousie symphony orchestra, started preparations about three months ago.

Miss Black is the daughter of R. L. Black of Fredericton, and is at present teaching at the Conservatory of Music here, having received her degree of licentiate of music last year from Dalhousie. Having the leading feminine part, Miss Black sang, acted and spoke in a manner that left nothing to be desired. She has been prominent in Halifax musical circles for several years but it is doubtful if she ever gave a better performance than as Carrie.

Fred Jennings was the hit of the show, along with Miss Black. His witty sayings and clear singing brought round after round of applause. His duet with Walter MacKenzie about prominent Dalhousie faculty members was greeted with howls of delight. MAN OF SECRETS DIES; THE WORLD LOSES DIPLOMAT

Paris, Feb. 16—Prof. G. Camerlynck, who knew as many international statesmen as the greatest of living statesmen, died today at the age of 60.

He was the official interpreter of English for the French government and the League of Nations and had participated in every international conference since the war, including the peace conference where he sometimes acted for President Wilson.

The French Premier and foreign ministers relied upon him for his discretion. He was often asked to write his memoirs but always refused with the remark, "know too much."
