

## WINDSOR, CONN., HAVING A GOOD OVERCOAT MEET

**Fred Russell Won 2.09 Pace with Battle King the Main Contender—Thirteen Heats Raced.**

Windsor, Conn., Oct. 23. — With one unfinished race and four events on the regular program scheduled for today, only three of the regular events were started, two of these being unfinished. Thirteen heats were raced altogether. Fred Russell, who won the two heats of the unfinished 2.09 pace yesterday, ran up against a snag in the third and fourth heats today when Battle King proved a real contender.

In the fifth heat, with these two horses battling neck and neck, Fred Russell led at the wire by a scant couple of inches.

In the 2.24 trot, after Colin Campbell had won two heats, Frederick B. freshened up and won three straight heats.

### TRIBUTE PAID TO MEMORY OF FITZSIMMONS

**Clergyman Says Bob's Greatest Victory was When He was Baptized—Great Number at Funeral.**

Chicago, Oct. 24. — Robert Fitzsimmons, who died here last Monday, after a week's illness of pneumonia, was buried today at Graceland cemetery. Funeral services for the former champion heavyweight pugilist were held in the Moody Tabernacle, conducted by the Rev. Paul Racer, himself an athlete in his college days on the Pacific coast.

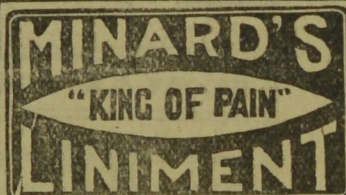
More than 3,000 persons from all walks of life attended the service and filed by the bier at the close of the services. A large proportion of those in attendance made up the cortege, which followed the flower laden casket to the cemetery.

"This man fought many battles," Mr. Racer said, "and tasted the sweets of victory more often than he did the acid of defeat. But he never fought a greater fight than the one with himself which led to renunciation of the old for the new man."

"It took courage to face the contemptuous laugh, the sneer, the doubt cast on his sincerity when the big athlete submitted to baptism by the little Baptist clergyman at Los Angeles. His baptism was the symbol of the casting off of the old man for the new."

"All the world despises a quitter; all the world admires a hero. Bob fought his final fight as he had fought his ring battles—with indomitable courage. The son of an Episcopal clergyman his early training was never wholly forgotten and helped him in his final victory—that over death."
