Conference on Post War Problems to be Held Soon

British Government in Reply to French Note is Said to Have Urged That it Be Held in London—Former Service Men of France Want Prudence Observed on the Question of Inter-Allied Debts.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

LONDON, July 6—It was reported authoritatively today that the British Government in its reply to the recent French note insisted that the impending international conference for the liquidation of the remaining post war problems be held in London, and expressed hope the conference will be held at the earliest possible date.

Should Exercise Prudence.

Lille, France, July 6—French war debts were discussed at the opening session of the Nord Department Federation of Former Service Men in convention here today.

After the discussion, the veterans passed the following resolution, "We ask the National Federation of Former Service Men, which is meeting shortly in Paris to observe the greatest prudence on the question of inter-allied debts.

ROBBERS GOT \$1,000 IN CASH AT CAMPBELLTON

Another Store Broken Into But no Damage Done—Prov. Police and Local Police at That Place Work on Case.

\$1000 in bills was taken from the garage of Lounsbury, Limited at Campbellton, N. B., last night by robbers, who escaped without detection, according to word received at Provincial Police headquarters here this morning and phoned in by Serg. Peters, of the northern staff. The Canadian Oil Company office nearby was also broken into by the daring bandits, though nothing of any value was secured investigation showed. The police force at Campbellton acting in conjunction with the Provincial officers are working on the case.

Two men are suspected of the robbery and efforts are being made to round them up. Both are from that district and have reputations for similar offenses.

The provincial police are active in other quarters during the past few days. Only yesterday fines were imposed on Wilfred Pelletier, of Madawaska county for violation of the Forest Fire Act, and also of the Game Act. In the former \$20 and costs was the conviction and in the other a fine of \$10 was imposed. The case was heard before Magistrate Hebert at Edmundston.

Under a Liquor Act violation, Edward Bonbilli, of Edmundston was fined \$1000 and costs for the illegal possession of liquor. The latter conviction was recorded yesterday afternoon.

INSPECTED AN AIR FLEET

TARIFF REFORM DECLARATION CAUSES A STIR

The Daily News Warns The Tories That The Slogan of Protection is a Hopeless One.

London, July 6—(By Herbert Bailley)—Neville Chamberlain's tariff reform has caused a great stir throughout the Conservative party but the Daily News today warns the Tories that if they accept the hopeless slogan of protection they will remain out of office for a generation. "All parties are now imperialists in the truest sense of the word" says the News, "and there are better ways of helping the Empire than by breaking it and by impoverishing our own people."

"The Paper emphasizes that thrice the Tories have invited disaster by going to the country on the protectionist issue and adds that any imperial system of tariffs must necessarily mean an import duty on wheat, which the public would never endorse."

MORE JERSEYS ARE COMING TO THE PROVINCE

Another carload of Jersey heifer calves, thirty-six in number, was shipped from Lennoxville, Quebec, to New Brunswick for distribution at Chatham and St. Stephen on June 27th, reports James Bremner, Eastern Jersey Fieldman.

This makes a total of 5 cars—162 head of high class Jerseys brought into New Brunswick during the last six weeks from Quebec and 13 head have come in from different parts of Nova Scotia, making a total of 175 head.

Mr. Bremner states that the demand for high class Jerseys all over Canada was never so great and that this demand has been further stimulated by the desire of southern United States for choice breeding stock and as further evidence of this says that the Jersey bull Estella's Volunteer has gone to Texas from Ontario for \$12,000.

QUEEN MARIE IS WRITING A ROMANCE

WARDEN DOUGLASS MADE RECIPIENT OF A TRAVELLING BAG AND A NICE SET OF PIPES

A Pleasant Incident Marked the Closing Session of the York County Council Today—Regret Expressed at the Removal From the County of Coun. Whipple.

The County Council adjourned at noon today after a rather strenuous session of five days. The proceedings this morning were marked by a very pleasant incident in the form of a presentation to Warden James G. Douglass who was made the recipient of a travelling bag and a set of pipes. The presentation was made by Coun. Gaynor of McAdam in a happy speech to which the Warden replied feelingly.

Coun. Whipple who has removed from McAdam to St. John and will not seek re-election was warmly complimented by several councillors on his splendid work at the board and a resolution adopted expressing regret at his removal from York County.

The Council met at ten o'clock with the Warden in the chair and all of the councillors in their places except Coun. Pond and Seymour, who had been granted leave of absence. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Public Accounts

Coun. McDonald reported for the committee on Public Accounts, recommending the payment of accounts totalling \$243.30. The report was adopted.

Coun. McDonald also reported for the committee on bye-laws. A petition from Myhrall Settlement, Kingsclear, recommending the abolition of the pound bye-law and a counter petition had been considered and the committee recommended that the bye-law be retained. The report was adopted.

Unmarried Mothers

Coun. McDonald from the committee appointed to look into the matter of making provision for the care of unmarried mothers submitted a verbal report. He said the committee had made enquiries concerning the Evangeline Home at St. John and also the home for girls. In the case of the former girls were only kept there a short time and as for the home at Coverdale girls were admitted only on an order of the court. The report of the committee was adopted.

Municipal Home Hots

Coun. Greenlaw reported for the committee appointed to confer with the authorities of the Children's Home.

KING AND QUEEN WERE MARRIED 36 YEARS AGO

The Anniversary of the Wedding Was Observed Today.

MESSAGES RECEIVED

Day of Tanksgiving to Be Observed Tomorrow.

London, July 6—King George and Queen Mary celebrated their 36th wedding anniversary today, only a day before the British Empire will give thanks that the King's life was preserved during his serious illness. Hundreds of messages congratulating the Royal Pair were received at Buckingham Palace.

The Tanksgiving for the King's recovery, originally set for June 15th but moved up when the King suffered a relapse, will be observed tomorrow.

Firemen and Police In New Orleans Were Repulsed with Bricks

Striking Street Car Men Commit Further Depredations—Seven Cars Destroyed in the Car Barns—A Stick of Dynamite Was Exploded.

NEW ORLEANS, LA., July 6—A mob of five thousand street car men and sympathizers fired seven street cars in the car barns today and then repulsed firemen and police with bricks and clubs. The street cars were destroyed.

While firemen and police were attempting to approach the fire at the canal barn, a stick of dynamite was hurled into the Poland car barns. The dynamite blast did little damage, however. Police attempted to disperse the crowd with tear bombs, but were unsuccessful.

TWENTY-EIGHT LIVES ARE LOST IN A TORNADO

London, July 5—Twenty-eight persons were killed and hundreds injured by a tornado and storm which swept through Central Europe last night and early today, causing widespread damage throughout Checho-Slovakia, Austria, Jugo-Slavia, Germany and Switzerland.

Growing crops were totally destroyed and many homes ruined in some districts. Telephone and telegraph wires were destroyed and communication interrupted hampering tabulation of the total of casualties and damage.

The storms, which started in Germany in the form of violent hail storms, tore down through Bohemia and Moravia. Then swinging westward they turned into Austria, raking the republic north, south, east and west.

Great Winds

Here the disturbance divided, one section sweeping down south through Jugo-Slovakia and another continuing westward into Switzerland.

The wind reached a velocity reported to be 100 miles an hour in Austria, where it interrupted shipping on lakes and in the Danube and maintained an average of 75 miles an hour.

Near Nuremberg, Germany, the storm was especially violent. One peasant was killed, thousands of windows were smashed by hail, crops were damaged and many homes partially destroyed.

Seven persons were killed in Bohemia and Moravia, 10 more in Austria and 10 in Jugo-Slovakia.

Hundreds were injured along the path of the storms by falling walls, uprooted trees and flying debris.

DIED FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

Roy F. Burgoyne, Who Was Seriously Injured in Auto Accident At Detroit Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon—Sad News Received Last Night By Mother Of Boy—Well Known Here.

The sad news was received here yesterday by Mrs. Levi Burgoyne, Woodstock Road, of the death of her son, Roy F., at the St. Joseph's Hospital, Pontiac, Mich., following an automobile accident in which the young man was in one day earlier last week. The young man was in an auto with some friends, when the car was struck by an electric car. Burgoyne received serious injuries to his back and little hopes were held out for his recovery at the time. He passed away yesterday afternoon. The remains will be brought to this city for burial.

C. N. R. TO SPEND A LARGE SUM IN MARITIMES

An Important Statement by W. U. Appleton the General Manager.

Pictou, N. S. July 5—"The fact that this year we are spending fifty million dollars in the Atlantic Region against a total earning power of twenty-seven millions, should show what determined efforts we are making to do something for the Maritime Provinces."

This was the declaration made by W. U. Appleton, General Manager Atlantic Region, C. N. R., when Sir Henry Thornton was received here this morning by the town council and representative citizens.

T. L. Scott, chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, conveyed to the Maritime of the National system expressions of the goodwill and co-operation of railway men. He said he saw throughout the road among the trainmen, ever-increasing desire to give better service and to effect economies which may come under their own observation.

Mr. Appleton said in reviewing what the system was doing for the Maritime Provinces, that this year alone over seven million dollars will be spent for track and structure improvement in the Atlantic Region. Over one million ties will be used, and one hundred and seventy-two miles of railway track were being replaced. "There has been substantial improvement in our property," said Mr. Appleton, "and consequent improvement in train schedules." All this was acknowledged by the public and compliments were constantly coming in to them at Moncton on the excellence of freight services.

Mayor Priest of Pictou, and J. E. McKenna, president of the Board of Trade, in welcoming Sir Henry, expressed the town's appreciation for the operation and the subsequent enlargement of Pictou Lodge and efficiency of Service given by the railway. Sir Henry visited the Lodge and received a delegation of Pictou citizens who were soliciting aid for a hotel.
