Nomination Day.

Conservative Convention Today.
A large number of Conservatives of York and Sunbury arrived here this morning to attend the nominating convention which is being held in the County Court House this afternoon. It is generally believed that Col. H. F. McLeod will be selected although there are reports that other names may go before the convention.

District Palmaster.
Capt. M. A. Fiset, of a distinguished French-Canadian family, arrived in St. John yesterday to take over the important office of paymaster for Military District No. 7. Captain Fiset has been identified with the Canadian active militia nearly all his life and has seen service in the present war for eighteen months in France.

Chief of Police Notified.
Chief Finley of the local police force has been notified that the civil authorities are required to act in the matter of securing men of military age who have not registered under the Military Service Act. Those coming in voluntarily will be assigned to units and those not doing so will be classed as deserters.

Mr. Winter's Injuries.
Mr. H. G. Winter, Customs appraiser who sustained a bad fall on the post office steps, will be confined to his home for several days as a result of his injuries. He was badly cut about the head and several stitches had to be placed in the wound. As far as can be learned his injuries are entirely of an internal nature, although he was badly shaken up.

An Important Post.
Word was received on Tuesday that Major W. H. Laughlin of St. Stephen, who has been in France for some time, had received an important appointment to the staff of the 3rd Canadian Division wing at the Canadian Reinforcement camp in France. Major Laughlin's friends everywhere will be pleased to hear of this deserved recognition of his services and worth.

Many Want Exemption.
St. John Standard:—W. A. Ewing announced last night that 14,247 men have registered so far under the Military Service Act. Out of this number 1,255 have offered for service and 12,992 have applied for exemption. It is the opinion that there still remains a large number of men to hear from. Yesterday eighty-eight applied for service and 501 claimed exemption.

Docket Finished.

APPLIANCES TO BE PROVIDED BY THE M. H. C.

New System Introduced—Credit Allowed Each Wounded Man—Unused Balance to be Remitted.

It is announced, through the headquarters of "K" Unit, M.H.C.C., that the Board of Pension Commissioners for Canada in conjunction with the Military Hospitals Commission, has completed arrangements for the supplying of special boots and other similar appliances to men who have been so disabled on active service as to need such things.

For some time past the Military Hospitals Commission has been supplying boots and other minor orthopaedic appliances to men who have been discharged from the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, but no definite arrangements had been made with the continuance of such supply.

The new system of handling this matter is, that each man who is listed as needing appliances of this sort will have a credit of an agreed amount placed at his disposal with certain manufacturers or dealers, in the things that he needs. He will then be allowed to purchase to such amounts and render the account to the Board of Pension Commissioners. The only right reserved in this connection is, that the employment of goods of manufacturers whose appliances have been found unsatisfactory will not be permitted.

If at the end of a year the pensioner has managed to get through without using up his entire credit allowance, such balance will be remitted to the man himself.

The entire arrangement is a highly satisfactory one, as its provisions are sufficiently elastic to permit of the easy supply of special boots, leg supports or other surgical appliances to

Left with 140th Batt.—Gunner Green Wounded but Returned to Duty—Sgt. Rawlings at St. John.

His father, Mr. John Toner of this city, this morning received official word from Ottawa to the effect that Private John Albert Toner, infantry, was officially admitted to No. 1 Field Ambulance on November 6th, with a gunshot wound in the neck. Private Toner left Canada with the 140th Battalion and had seen several months' service in France.

Sergt. J. W. Rawlings, a member of the 26th, arrived home in St. John yesterday. He was in France for several months when he was taken ill with trench fever and as a result has been invalided home. He said that during his time in France he saw many changes and all were for the better for the Allies. Sergt. Rawlings formerly was stationed in Fredericton with the Royal Canadian Regt., and is well known here.

Returned to Duty.
Gunner J. M. Green of this city, serving with the artillery in France is reported wounded and returned to duty. He was a letter carrier here prior to enlistment.
