German Consumers Fear an Increase In the Price of Coal

Some Talk of an Understanding Between European Producers to Fix Exports—An Increase of From \$1.25 to \$2 Per Ton is Estimated.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

BERLIN, October 19—Fear of a considerable increase in the price of coal was raised here today by talk of an understanding between European producers to fix coal exports.

It is not expected that an export-fixing agreement will be reached in the near future, but business circles expressed the belief such an arrangement would inevitably raise prices here because the importation of British coal would be reduced or even eliminated.

An increase of from \$1.25 to \$2 per ton was estimated and the outlook has alarmed German consumers who point out that British competition in the past has benefitted Germany.

REDUCTION IN CABLE RATES WITH JAPAN

Tokio, Oct. 19—Announcement by the cable and radio communication companies of a reduction in the deferred press rate between the United States and Japan to nine cents American currency per word was received with enthusiasm today by the Japanese press. The new rate will become effective on October 212. The press rate question has been an acute issue between a section of the Japanese and American press and the Japanese Government for nearly four years.

NEARLY LOST CASE AS THE LAWYER SLEPT

YORK COUNTY BIRD
IN THE CONTEST MAY
PASS 300 EGG MARK.

It now looks as if the New Brunswick egg laying contest at the Experimental Station which closes on October 31st is going to produce another three hundred egg hen. A Plymouth Rock bird owned by W. A. Sansom of Durham Bridge, York County, had produced 287 eggs at the close of the fiftieth week and seems to be good for at least 300. It is understood that this bird will be kept on at the contest until it completes a full year of 365 days. Last year a pen owned by Mrs. Edward Hart of Grand Bay produced 332 eggs in twelve months.

Bangor, Me., Oct. 18—Arsene Ouellette of St. Perpetue, P. Q., Peter H. LeBlanc, of Edmundston, N. B., Emile Jean, of St. Pamphile, P. Q., and George H. MacFawn of Fredericton, N. B., are held here on charges of illegal entry. MacFawn furnished bail and the others were sent to the jail at Belfast to await the Federal Court sitting next month.

President to Speak.

President Hoover will be heard over the radio three times in as many days next week. On Monday night he will speak at Dearborn, Mich., at a function in honor of Thomas A. Edison. The President will go on the air between 7.30 and 8.30 E. S. T. At Cincinnati he will speak Tuesday morning at the dedication of a monument. On Wednesday evening between 9.30 and 10.30 o'clock he will dedicate a bridge at Louisville, Kentucky.

Still Coming

LORD ARNOLD GIVES DENIAL TO A REPORT

Story of His Engagement to Miss MacDonald is Untrue.

Is Now Visiting Ottawa With Premier MacDonald's Party.

London, Oct. 19—The rumor of the engagement of Miss Ishbel MacDonald daughter of Prime Minister Ramsey MacDonald of Great Britain, and Lord Arnold, fifty-one year old bachelor already denied by Miss MacDonald and her father, has further weakened today by a third denial, that of Lord Arnold himself.

Lord Arnold, at present with the MacDonald's in Canada, cabled the following statement to the Daily Mail from Ottawa: "The statement that I am engaged to Miss Ishbel MacDonald has no foundation. Please deny."

ELECTRICITY SHORTENS CLOCK WINDING JOB

London, Oct. 18—When a worker undertakes the task of cleaning the four faces of his big, famous English clock, he knows he's in for a big job. Climbing high up to the tower which houses the clock, he must put in a full day's work on each of the faces. It formerly took two men three afternoons a week to wind this clock, but the operation is now done by electricity in 20 minutes.

Mexican States to Elect Governors In Near Future

Provisionally Appointed Chief Executives Will Be Replaced By Governors Elected By the People—Some Contests Likely to Have Radio Service With U. S.

MEXICO CITY, October 19—Provisional governors of the States of Sonora, Durango, and Nayarit, appointed at the close of the rebellion last March, will be replaced within a few weeks by newly elected governors, the Department of the Interior announced.

In the State of Sonora, Provisional Governor Francisco Elias seeking to succeed himself, is opposed by Rodolfo Elias Calles, nephew of the former President, and Francisco Rodriguez, brother of General Abelardo Rodriguez, the Governor of the North district of Lower California.

Radio Service With U. S.

Mexico City, October 19—President Portes Gil has authorized minister of Communications, Javier Sanchez Mejorada to sign a contract between the government and the Tropical Radio Corporation for radio service between the United States and Mexico. The contract calls for immediate installation of service between Merida, Yucatan, and New Orleans.

ONE DAY STRIKE IS STAGED BY TRAFFIC MEN

Berlin, Oct. 19—Street car and omnibus traffic in Riga, Latvia, was completely suspended today while eight per cent of the factory workers joined in a one-day general strike against the proposed reform of sick and insurance organizations.

THE RED MEN RELY ON THE HERBS STILL

Milwaukee, Oct. Herbs and plants and strange potions that legend tells were used by Indians for curing all manner of ills still are used by the remaining redmen in this country.

For three months Huron H. Smith, botanist and Indian authority here, lived with the Oneida Indians in northern Wisconsin to learn firsthand the cure-alls and "good medicine," used by them.

It's milk from the milkweed for warts; ground cherries for eye trouble; and smoke of the tansty plant for a headache, Smith reported on his return here.

To Present "L'Aiglon"

"L'Aiglon," Edmond Rostand's six act romantic tragedy on the life of the Duke of Reichstadt, son of Napoleon I and the Archduchess Maria Louisa of Austria, will be presented by the Radio Guild through the NBC System, Saturday evening, October 19, at 11.00 o'clock. The melancholy and imaginative son of Napoleon was first portrayed in 1900 by Sarah Barnhardt and later in the same year at the Knickerbocker Theatre, New York, by Maude Adams. The play tells of the attempts of the boy to emulate his father, overthrow the discreet control of Prince Metternich, Chancellor of Austria, and regain the throne of France.

ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH A PLOT

Paris, Oct. 19—Further investigations of an alleged plot against the state, in connection with which one hundred persons have been arrested, including the communist, Andre Marty led to the issuance of warrants for the arrest of sixty more persons today. The alleged plot was discovered August 1.

DOES BABY SUCK THUMB? THEN GET A MIRROR

Washington, Oct. 19—Children addicted to sucking their thumbs dislike to watch themselves do it.

That is the conclusion Dr. Samuel J. Lewis, of Detroit, reported to the American Dental Association after five years spent in developing the first scientific evidence that definitely blames the habit for deformation of a child's early teeth.

He saw in psychology, rather than aluminum mits or other mechanical methods, the best cure for thumb-sucking. Children taken from play twice a day and forced to perform the habit in front of a mirror for 10 minutes were successfully cured. Malformation of teeth will correct itself, he said, if the thumb-sucking is stopped before a child is five years of age.

Prize Symphony.
