

FEW CHANGES MADE LAST NIGHT IN CITY OFFICIALS

J. W. Millican Leaves City Employ---James Biggs Appointed Caretaker of City Hall Clock--Better bread Inspection desired--George Edney Street Supt.---Salary Increase at Pumping Station and Lighting Plant.

The appointments of city officials were made last night by the City Council. Few changes were made. The position of superintendent of the fire alarm system is open, J. W. Millican having resigned. James Biggs is the caretaker of the City Hall clock instead of Mr. Millican. George Edney was given the new appointment of superintendent of roads and streets and public works, in addition to the positions he held before. The appointment entails no increase in salary.

Several salary increases, all slight, were made in the cases of Supt. Davidson and Lineman Harvey, of the street lighting department, and the engineers of the pumping station.

With the changes named, the city officials all were reappointed.

By motion of Ald. Reid, all appointments of city officials are at the will of the Council.

Resignation Accepted.

The resignation of J. W. Millican as superintendent of the city fire alarm system was accepted. The position was left unfilled, Ald. Wilkinson saying that it had not been decided who would take the position.

James Biggs was appointed caretaker of the City Hall clock at an annual salary of \$50, in place of J. W. Millican. Mr. Biggs asked for an increase of \$100 in his salary as janitor of the City Hall. The other appointment was given in lieu of an increase in salary.

Gratuity Given.

George R. Perkins was appointed manager of the City Opera House in the place of the late J. W. McCready. For his services in that capacity during the illness of the former incumbent Mr. Perkins was voted a gratuity of \$25, on the motion of Ald. Shea, seconded by Ald. Lemont.

Better Bread Inspection.

James Roberts was appointed inspector of bread at an annual salary of \$20. It was decided to ask this official to submit regular reports. Ald. Lemont expressed the opinion that much bread sold in the city was under weight.

Roads and Streets.

George Edney was appointed foreman of water and sewerage, and super-

intendent of roads and streets and public works at a salary of \$800. Heretofore he has not been an official of the Department of Roads and Streets and Public Works, but it is believed that he will be able to give attention to those departments during the coming year, his duties in the Water and Sewerage Department being lighter. He also is inspector of plumbing at an annual salary of \$200.

Water Department.

John Malloy was appointed chief engineer at the pumping station at a monthly salary of \$85, an increase of \$10 per month.

Walter McGinn and William Lyons were appointed assistant engineers at a monthly salary of \$75 each, an increase of \$12.50. Charles Barker was appointed fireman at a monthly salary of \$50.

Street Lighting.

Alfred Davidson was appointed superintendent of street lighting at a monthly salary of \$95, an increase of \$10.

Harry C. Rutter was temporarily appointed tax collector and server of tax notices at a monthly salary of \$50.

Drivers Leo Ward and Melvin Bearisto, of the Fire Department, were given salaries of \$45 per month, an increase of \$10.

CANADIAN TROOPS WARMLY PRAISED BY GENERAL HORNE

(By Stewart Lyon, Canadian Press Correspondent in France)—Canadian army headquarters, April 19—Having heard somewhat of their achievements from the outside world, the Canadian troops have now had an opportunity of hearing, in an order of the day, the opinion of their army commander on the operations last week. The general commanding the first army, Sir Henry Horne, says that he desires to express his high appreciation of the splendid work carried out during the days im-

mediately preceding.

"By the troops of the first army," he adds, "The Vimy ridge has been regarded as a position of very great strength. The Germans have considered it impregnable. To have carried this position with so little loss testified to soundness of plan, thoroughness of preparation, dashing determination in execution and devotion to duty on the part of all concerned. The ninth of April will be a historic day in the annals of the British empire."

This statement read to the troops in orders has been even more welcome than congratulations from a non-military quarter, welcome as they are too. The order represents the mature judgement of the army commander on the operations on the Vimy ridge last week. It has produced in the ranks the smile that won't come off.

There is little change in the situation on the front today. In the region south of Arras, a superb of Lens, a detachment of the fifth Prussian Guards attacked an outpost during the night. The attack was repulsed and this morning the bodies of several members of this regiment were discovered in front of our positions.

RUSSIAN EXILES CAN PASS THROUGH GERMANY

Copenhagen, via London, April 19.—The German government has granted permission to a second delegation of Russian exiles to return to Russia from Switzerland. This time fifteen social revolutionists of the extreme radical type will be repatriated. The earlier delegation were social democrats of a milder persuasion. The fifteen exiles are headed by Nathanson, who next to Prince Kropotkin is the oldest Russian revolutionist of prominence.

Nathanson was one of the leaders in the original revolutionary party of "The People's Will," while Kropotkin was a Nihilist, Nathanson and his colleagues are extreme peace apostles.

The above regulation is published by order of the Board of Health of the City of Fredericton, District No. 1.

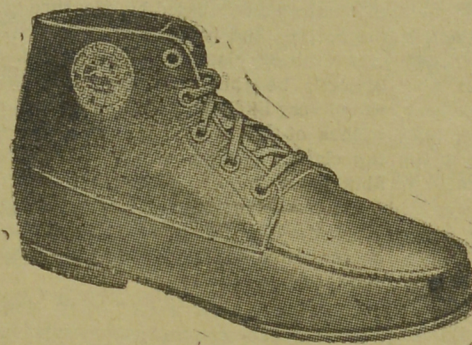

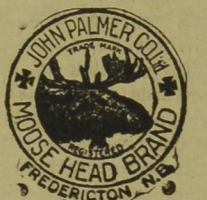
