Against Lavergne

Montreal, April 19.—An Ottawa despatch to the Star says: A rumor was current today that Major General Mewburn, director general of the Canadian defence force, intends to resign because the scheme is not progressing satisfactorily and particularly because of the proposed appointment of Lieut. Col. Armand Lavergne as a recruiting officer in Quebec.

"I am not resigning," said General Mewburn, "but I am doing this to dissociate myself from French Canadians. I want them to recruit and will do everything in my power to assist, but I do object to the proposed engagement of Lieut. Col. Lavergne and intend to take no responsibility in the campaign in which he is engaged."

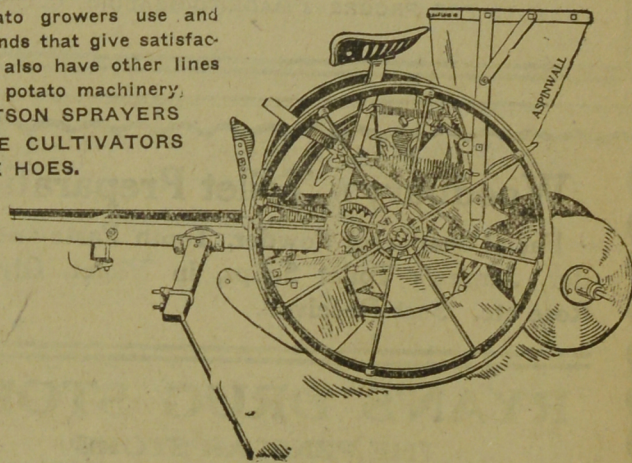
