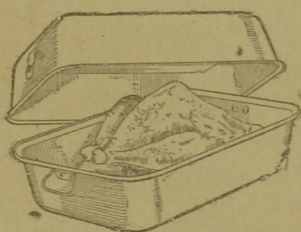

## CARLETON-VICTORIA TORIES WILL NOT OPPOSE MR. CARVELL

Large Convention at Woodstock so Decides--Mr. J. K. Flemming Resigns as a Tory Candidate--Mr. B. Frank Smith Also Waives His Claim--Strong Letter in Favor of Hon. Mr. Carvell Read From Premier Borden.

Woodstock, Nov. 16. — The Conservative convention today was a striking and notable instance that Carleton county, where politics always loom up large has true patriots who deeply appreciate the seriousness of the present war situation and will not allow partisanship to strike a blow at national unity. When the convention was called to order in the big Hayden-Gibson theatre at 2.10 the place was packed with an audience whose interest was characterized by intense earnestness. J. L. White, chairman of the Conservative Association of Victoria-Carleton in opening spoke briefly and said the meeting had been called to discuss whether a candidate of the party should be put in the field. He expressed his personal attitude which did not seem to meet with much favor.

### Premier Borden's Letter.

He had received a telegram from Sir Robert Borden asking him to read to the convention an important letter which he was sending. The following letter was then read:

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 14, 1917.

Dear Mr. White — It has been brought to my attention that the Conservatives of Carleton-Victoria have called a convention with the purpose of selecting a candidate to oppose the minister of public works.

I can hardly believe such is their intention unless they desire to express their absolute want of confidence in myself as leader of the government. The steps which I have taken to form the present administration are well known to the people. My course was dictated by the absolute necessity of uniting as far as possible in this terrible crisis all the elements of our population who support Canada's effort in this war. Mr. Carvell was reluctant to enter the government as he had to break ties and associations of very long standing, and as you know, he was attached very strongly to his party and to his political associates.

His entering the government was dictated by a strong sense of public duty and he has worked most cordially and loyally with myself and with his other colleagues in the government since he has assumed the duties of office. If there ever was a time in the history of Canada when party controversy should be dropped and Liberals and Conservatives should come together with the most earnest and intense desire to serve country and not party the present is that hour.

If a candidate is nominated against Mr. Carvell you can realize that it will be one of my first duties to speak in the constituency and explain definitely at greater length to the electorate the consideration which I have summarized in this letter. It will also be my duty to ask them with all the earnestness of which I am capable, to return Mr. Carvell as the member for the constituency. I must ask that you

At the conclusion of the reading of the letter there was cheering that could be heard blocks away.

Mr. J. K. Flemming who was nominated several years ago as the Conservative candidate, declared himself as a supporter of Union government and resigned as a candidate.

Mr. B. F. Smith moved, seconded by Mr. E. R. Teed a resolution which declared against contesting the election. It was carried unanimously.

A resolution moved by Mr. Fred Squires expressing the hope that Mr. Flemming would soon resume his place in public life was also adopted.

A meeting called by Mr. J. C. Porter of Andover, was held in the Hayden-Gibson theatre at the close of the convention. Mr. Porter tried to speak but was interrupted so frequently that he was compelled to give it up.
