SIX HEATS IN 2.06 RACE AT DETROIT MEET

Jack Leonard, With General
Todd, Got the Flag in the
Third Heat—A Hard
Fought Race.

Detroit, July 24. — The 1917 renewal of the Board of Commerce stake, one of the pacing classics of the Grand Circuit, was one of the hardest fought in its history, although the stake record was not equalled in today's contest. Six heats were required before the winner's share of the \$5,000 purse was captured by the Eastern horse, Ben Ali, driven by C. E. Pittman of Trenton, N. J. All three heat winners stepped very fast miles and the first four heats furnished exciting brushes at the finish. H. S. Smith, of Newark, N. J., is Ben Ali's owner.

Adios Guy set the pace throughout the first mile and stepped the final quarter in 29½ seconds to stall off The Savoy by a few feet. The Savoy pushed into the lead after passing the half in the second heat and won the heat with quite a bit to spare. The Savoy also led into the home stretch in the third, but Ben Ali shot by him at the end, making the extension of the race to six heats certain, as three horses had each won a heat.

Peter G led almost all the way in the fourth heat, when Ben Ali broke slightly at the start, but The Savoy took the heat by a short distance. Ben Ali led all the way in the last two heats, showing more stamina than the others and jogging home in the last mile.

The 212 trot was easy for The Woodman. He came from behind in the final heat and showed the way to all the others.

Prince Rupert showed a lot of stretch speed in the 212 pace, in which fifteen entered, winning two heats in the last eight. Haley C. made the pace in the third and in a tight finish won by inches, but Prince Rupert came back and won the deciding heat.

Eleven horses, and possibly twelve are to start in the \$10,000 M. and M. stake for 2.08 trotters tomorrow, one of the chief events of the Grand Circuit season. City police restrictions prevented any betting today.

The event went through five heats, the first two going to Al Mack, but then Ready Busby's Lassie disposed of him and the rest of them rather handily.

Mussell Shell beat Edward P. a nose in the first heat of the 2.08 pace, but after that Edward P. won about as his driver pleased. Don F. took the opener in the 217 pace, but Ben Billings had no trouble showing the way in the other heats.

KILBANE HAD NO SHOW WITH BEN LEONARD

Champion Outclassed Challenger,
Whose Seconds Threw
Towel Into Ring in the
Third Round.

Philadelphia, July 25. — Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, stopped Johnny Kilbane, featherweight title-holder, in the third round of a six-round bout at Shibe Park tonight. Jimmy Dunn, Kilbane's manager, tossed a towel into the ring when two minutes and fifty-nine seconds of the third round was over.

At no time during the three rounds did Kilbane class with Leonard. Leonard won the first by a good margin, the second by even greater odds, and in the third beat Kilbane helpless to the floor. Kilbane weighed 127 pounds and Leonard exactly 133, the lightweight limit. The six pounds difference aided Leonard. But he won because he completely outboxed the featherweight champion and outthit him during every minute of the fight.

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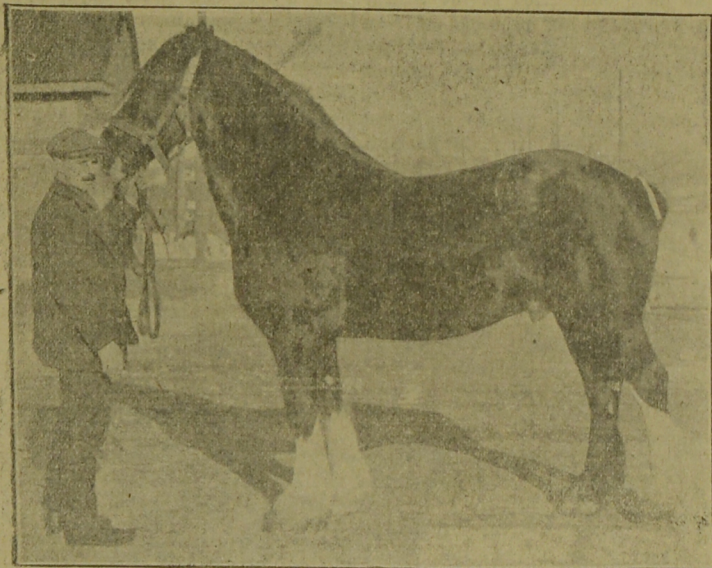
