**Strawberries Dear.**  
Cultivated strawberries were offered in the stores here today for thirty cents per box. Growers were selling them for twenty-seven cents per box.

**Good Season's Work.**  
Mr. Solomon Day, a truckman who lives in Charlotte street, plowed and harrowed no less than eighty-five city gardens during the season. In addition to this he prepared and cropped an acre of land on Burnt Hill which he has under lease.

**Begun Haying.**  
The work of cutting the hay on the Fredericton Experimental Station was begun yesterday. The hay crop in all sections this year is unusually heavy and the indications are that the yield will be fully a third greater than that of last year.

## HOSPITAL TO HAVE A NEW SUPERINTENDENT

Miss Elizabeth C. Sansom Appointed to Succeed Miss Grace Murray, Who is Going Overseas.

Hon. Judge Crocket presided at a meeting of the Trustees of Victoria Public Hospital yesterday when several matters engaged the attention of the board.

The secretary treasurer submitted a pretty big expenditure for the month of June, and while there was a rushing business in the hospital, the receipts, while satisfactory, failed to reach the level of the outgo.

Miss Murray Leaving.

In the superintendent's report it was shown that sixty patients received treatment in June, two thirds of the number being medical cases. Two deaths occurred. Miss Grace M. Murray has proved herself to be a most successful and efficient superintendent, and we believe possess the esteem and respect of the medical staff, the nursing staff, the patients, the public generally, as well as that of the trustees. Shortly after the war started Miss Murray offered her services for overseas duty and her call came a short time ago to report at Toronto on August 1st next. With very great regret the trustees yesterday, accepted her resignation. She will leave on Saturday.

New Superintendent.

The position has been offered to Miss Elizabeth C. Sansom, a native of York County, and a graduate of the Waltham Training School for Nurses, and registered nurse of Massachusetts. Miss Sansom is at present in the city on a vacation, and it is understood she will accept the position.

Insurance and Repairs.

At this meeting Vice President Hawkins was assigned the duty of readjustment of the insurance on the buildings and the valuable contents. It was deemed advisable to increase the amount of insurance. Mr. H. G. Ketchum was assigned the responsibility of having some temporary work done upon the old building, the roof especially being in need of attention.

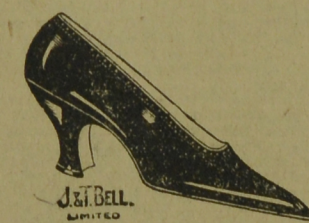
