THIRTY-FOUR YEARS' RECORD IN PRIZE RING; FITZSIMMONS HAD WONDERFUL CAREER AS BOXER

First Match in New Zealand, When He was Aged Eighteen—
Cornishman Fought in Antipodes and United States—His
Last Match Only Three Years Ago.

Born June 4, 1862, Helston, Cornwall, England. Height, 5 feet 11½ inches. Weight, 165 pounds. Heavyweight. Color, white. Nationality, Cornishman.

Made his first appearance at Timaru, New Zealand, in 1880, at which he defeated four men, winning the amateur championship of New Zealand. FITZSIMMONS STARTED IN NEW ZEALAND

In Early Days Hammer Thrower and Distance Runner—
Made Fortune in Ring and Lost It.

Chicago, Oct. 22. — "Fighting Bob" lived up to his nickname and ring reputation almost to the end. He refused to admit defeat even after physicians had given up hope.

Naturally athletic, Fitzsimmons engaged in all kinds of sport. Before taking up boxing he was a hammer-thrower and long distance runner. His speed and endurance were so marvelous that he was given to hunting kangaroo on foot. The former champion's ring career began as the winner of a lightweight competition promoted by Jem. Mace, at that time in Timaru, N. Z., in 1880. He defeated four men, knocking out three of them and thus became the amateur champion of that country. The next year he defended his honors, defeating five opponents in one night.

Fitzsimmons won the world's heavyweight title on March 17, 1897, when he defeated Jim Corbett in the fourteenth round of their memorable battle at Carson City, Nevada. He stopped Corbett with his famous solar plexus punch, of which he was the originator. For two years Fitzsimmons held the honor, losing it to James Jeffries, when he was knocked out in the eleventh round, June 8, 1899, at Coney Island, N. Y. In 1902 he met Jeffries again, hoping to regain the crown, but after having the better of the Californian giant on points, Fitzsimmons went down to defeat in the eighth round. Old timers of the ring say the last knockout at the hands of Jeffries started Fitzsimmons on the downward path.

Fitzsimmons made a fortune in the ring but his earnings soon vanished.
