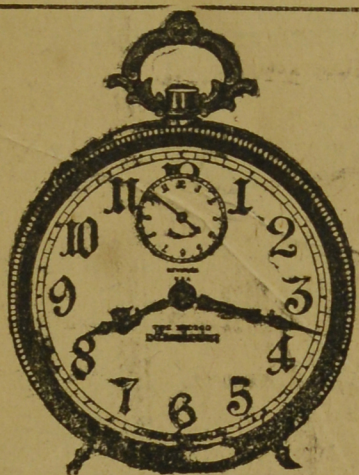

## ANOTHER INDICISIVE DAY AT THE FEDERAL CAPITAL

### Premier Borden is Still Negotiating With the Western Liberals for a Union Government--Many Difficulties are Being Encountered--Tory Partizans Continue to Scramble After Vacant Jobs--Sir Wilfrid at Toronto.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The consummation of union government depends upon the sincerity, patriotism and firmness of Sir Robert Borden. That seems to be the conclusion to be drawn from the result of the second indecisive day of conference of the western Liberals with Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Arthur Meighen. The invitation to reconsider union proposals extended by Sir Robert Borden week before last through Hon. J. A. Calder to the western Liberals was understood to mean reconsideration only on a basis of real union, representing eastern as well as western Liberalism. It was on this understanding Messrs. Calder and Crerar consented to resume the negotiations broken off abortively last August.

It was a real union that was contemplated by Sir Robert in his first overtures to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to Hon. George P. Graham, Mr. Carvell and other Liberal leaders in June and July last. But now when the crux of the whole question, namely, a real and not a pseudo union administration is being sought difficulties are being encountered. Sir Robert Borden, it is understood, is disposed to meet the fair requests of the western Liberals for an even deal and the inclusion of real Liberal leaders from eastern Canada in the union government so that it would be thoroughly representative of all win-the-war elements. But there is good reason to believe that Hon. Arthur Meighen is busily engaged in throwing sand into this machinery and there is undoubtedly also a strong pressure from the straight Tory partisans among Sir Robert's followers to block negotiations for a real union which would necessitate the cutting out of partisanship in patronage dispensing and the other perquisites of "the party in power."

Reliance on the war-time elections act, the soldiers' voting act and anti-Quebec prejudice is preferred to reliance on the even break of union government with its win-the-war benefits. That is in reality the main thing that is now holding back union government. Leading Liberal leaders both in the west and in the east, are ready to come in on patriotic grounds but only on the conditions outlined above.

This seems to be about as far as the negotiations have got thus far. Tonight none of the contracting parties were able to report any very definite progress. If Sir Robert Borden will have the courage of his convictions and resist the pressure of the partisans to win the election under the franchise act section of his party, and come out squarely for a real union then rapid progress is likely to be made. Other Liberal leaders from eastern Canada will then join in the negotiations. With this end in view there may be a demand tomorrow, that further negotiations be conducted only with Sir Robert Borden and that the test of sincerity be applied at once by the elimination of Hon. Arthur Meighen's "manoeuvring." There will be some further "conversations" tomorrow but little real progress is expected until the eastern Canada aspect of the situation is cleared up. Possibly definite decisions for or against union will not be reached until the end of the week.

#### Partisan Appointments.

Two further partisan appointments officially announced today forestalling action which might have well been left to a union government do not tend to help union along. The long forecasted appointment of Hon. Dr. Roche to the chairmanship of the civil service commission has been finally made. That makes another portfolio vacancy. The interior portfolio will be filled by Hon. J. A. Calder if the real union now being negotiated for is consummated. If it falls then the portfolio will probably go to another western Liberal from among Sir Robert's list of second choices as already mentioned in these despatches.

The other appointment today was that of Angus A. McLean, Conservative member for Queens, P.E.I., in the parliament just dissolved, to be comptroller for the Royal Northwest Mounted Police at a salary of \$5,000 a year. The appointment is one which should naturally have been left for the new western ministers if they were coming in.

#### Liberals Take Notice.

The appointment of Sir George Per-

ley as Canadian high commissioner has been decided upon. Sir Edward Kemp has been offered transfer to the overseas militia portfolio and General Mewburn has been tentatively selected for the home militia portfolio. This list of appointments or prospective appointments was called to Sir Robert Borden's attention by the Liberal conferees today.

N. W. Rowell, M.P.P., arrived in the capital from Toronto this morning. Seen by your correspondent tonight he denied a report sent out to Conservative papers this morning to the effect that he had come on a mission from Sir Wilfrid Laurier to block further union negotiations. Mr. Rowell came on a request of the western Liberals to talk over the development in the situation in regard to their proposals for a union government embracing really representative Liberals of eastern as well as of western Canada.

#### At Toronto

Toronto, Oct. 9.—Seated in a room of the King Edward Hotel, Sir Wilfrid Laurier is today feeling the political pulse of rural Ontario. That is really all that can be said about his visit, that is the full sum and substance of its significance, at least on the surface.

The Liberal chief passed through the rotunda of the hotel, crowded with little broken groups of talking Liberals, shortly before 11 o'clock and entered his room. A pilgrimage immediately began from the rotunda to the second floor, Liberal candidates from all over the province being admitted to the presence of their leader.

One fact does seem clear, namely that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, if he ever had any intention or resigning and this is denied by the corridor haunters has now given up any such idea. One prominent and well-informed Liberal told the Star today that he was not going to resign.

"It would not be merely a Liberal calamity; it would be a national calamity if Sir Wilfrid withdrew" remarked another enthusiastic follower.

#### Cut of Pulp Wood.

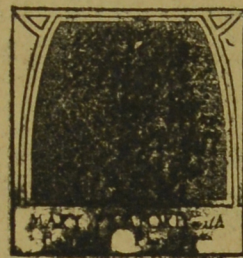
