BEER LICENSES
MUST BE TAKEN
OUT AT ONCE

Prohibition Measure Different from C. T. A. in That Regard—Question of Percentage.

The proclamation of the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in the city of Fredericton and the coming into force of the provincial prohibition measure affects a large number of persons who have been selling soft drinks. Under the provincial measure shops selling hop beer, ginger beer, root beer and similar beverages must have a license. Application for such license must be made to Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson of this city, who if he sees fit can issue a license.

Under the Canada Temperance Act there were no beer licenses and any beer which was not proven to be intoxicating could be sold.

Question of Percentage.
The alcoholic percentage allowed under the prohibitory legislation is two per cent. It is well known that in the past beers of various kinds were sold under the Canada Temperance Act which possessed a higher percentage of alcohol. A change must be made in the process of manufacture if they are to be sold under prohibition. Several local men who make hop beer have had their product analyzed and have the percentage within the law. Others are waiting for the decision of the analyst. Weiss beer, so-called, also is said to be over the required percentage and must be made weaker.

Enforcement.
It is not expected that Inspector Finley will proceed at once with a strict enforcement of the law as far as beer is concerned, the intention being to give those engaged in the sale an opportunity to comply with the provisions of the measure.

POISONING OF
CATTLE OCCURS
IN QUEENSBURY

Fishery Overseer A. McNally Meets With Heavy Loss—Seven Head Poisoned in Pasture.

Cattle poisoning on an extensive scale is reported from the parish of Queensbury Mr. Alex. McNally having lost seven head within the past few days by malicious poisoning by persons unknown.

Mr. McNally is a fishery overseer and it is believed in some quarters that the killing of his cattle has been the result of activity within the past few weeks on the part of other officers of the Department of Fisheries to prevent the illegal netting of salmon. Several prosecutions of persons residing in Kingsclear resulted in penalties being imposed in the police court in this city. This is not the first occasion on which an attempt has been made to kill the cattle of Overseer McNally Paris green mixed with feed being spread about the pasture.

It is probable that the matter will be investigated. Public opinion is strongly against the perpetrators of the outrage.

Aiding in Food Control.
Mr. A. G. Turney of this city, provincial horticulturist for New Brunswick, is a member of the fruit and vegetable committee of the Food Controller's office, which was in session at Ottawa yesterday. Mr. G. C. Cunningham of Fredericton, Dominion plant pathologist, also was present. Distribution of the potato crop was the subject discussed.

Rumor re Medical Board.
It is rumored that the medical board for Fredericton under the Military Service Act is to be composed of Dr. S. F. A. Wainwright and Dr. C. P. Holden. No definite announcement has yet been made.
