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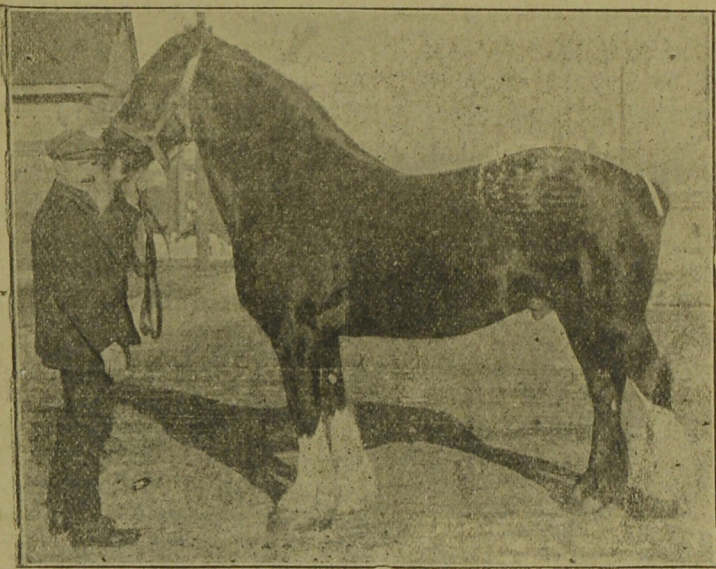

WORLD'S SERIES BASEBALL GAMES ARE NOT LIKELY

United States Draft Has Hit Big League Clubs Hard—Will Go Into Effect Sept. 1st.

Chicago, July 30. — There is likely to be no world's series this year as a result of the drain on major league baseball players by the draft, President Johnson of the American League said here tonight on his return from New York.

He said that tabulation of draft numbers held by players showed that probably 25 men would be taken from the American League and that the American League would not play the series if handicapped by so serious a loss.

The league president also stated that he had learned that the military drilling installed by the league early in the season would not cause the War Department to extend exemptions to ball players until the end of the season. His information, Mr. Johnson declared, was that the ball players would be drafted about Sept. 1.

An interview by the American League president in New York urging ball players not to claim exemptions, gave rise to suggestions by baseball experts here that the draft would result in recalling to the major leagues many men now playing in the minors who once were stars in the majors, but are now past the age of the draft.

The second division clubs and smaller leagues will suffer more from the draft, it was pointed out, than the big leagues, owing to the larger percentage of older men in the first division clubs. The younger players now being tried out in the small and the second divisions will show a larger percentage taken by the draft.

"I sincerely hope that ball players in both major and minor leagues who have been drafted will go to the colors without claiming exemption," Mr. Johnson said.

PALZER SHOT BY HIS FATHER

Fergus Falls, Minn., July 27. — Al Palzer, a heavyweight pugilist, is near death in a hospital here today suffering from bullet wounds inflicted by his father. Palzer sought to protect his mother, who was shot through the arms, when his father turned a rifle on him, shooting him through the abdomen. The shooting was the result of a quarrel between the boxer's parents.

BENNY LEONARD PAID HIS FINE

New York, July 28. — Benny Leonard had to pay twenty-five Philadelphia dollars from the \$11,000 roll he earned in his bout with Johnny Kilbane Wednesday night in a Brooklyn magistrate's court yesterday, when Magistrate Reynolds fined him for violating the "eight foot" law. The world's lightweight champion drove his auto past a car which had stopped to let off passengers.

CHURCHILL RE-ELECTED

London, July 30.—Winston Spencer Churchill was re-elected today member of the House of Commons for Dundee, the by-election being made necessary by his recent appointment to a cabinet position. Mr. Churchill polled 7,302 votes. His opponent, Edmund Seryngeour, prohibitionist and laborite, received 2,036 votes.

HORSE RACING IS BOOMING IN NEW ENGLAND

Kind Words for Dave Warman and His Free-for-All Victory—Medford Had a Great Meet.

Boston, July 31. — Harness horse racing on the half-mile tracks is booming, to date having enjoyed the most prosperous season known. From every section the story is the same—excellent sport, fast time and increased attendance.

Last week Boston had the best meeting. Judged from every angle, that New England has seen in ten years. The stay of the Short Ship horses at Combination carried the older followers of the sport back to the days when Medford was the most popular racing point in the east.

While racing has flourished the country over there had come a bit of feeling that because Readville and the other Greater Boston tracks have failed to put on successful meetings in recent years we were never to have any. Combination marked the turn in the road and Boston is in line again.

The sport all along the New England Circuit has been excellent and to the week at Combination stand out from a purely racing viewpoint a contest such as the free-for-allers put on was needed. The books show only one faster eight-heat race, and that was over a mile track the battle put on by Major Woolworth, Judge Ormonde, Roan Hal and Earl Jr., deserves the place of honor.

From beginning to end it was a clean contest, every horse for himself, and trying all the time. As the horses were last Thursday and Friday Major Woolworth was the best.
