Cases Dismissed.

The two cases against a local automobile dealer for driving his cars wearing dealers' tags for other than demonstration purposes, was brought up in police court this morning before Magistrate Limerick. The cases were thrown out as the evidence laid against the dealer was not sufficient for conviction.

Postponed for Judgment.

The assault case of Thomas and Joseph Romanus for committing a grievous assault upon Murray Abraham and attempting to throw him over the bridge, was resumed yesterday afternoon. Magistrate Limerick, on his own behalf, summoned a witness and the evidence given was about the same as that laid by Murray Abraham. The case was postponed until September 25th for judgment.

New Postage Stamp.

Some of the new issue of three cent postage stamps have made their appearance. The stamp is of khaki color as befits a time of war, and in allusion to the fiftieth anniversary of the birth of the Dominion, the engraving is a finely executed miniature of the celebrated picture so familiar to all Canadians under the title "The Fathers of Confederation." The stamp is about twice the width of the ordinary postage stamp.

Left Large Estate.

In the matter of the estate of Nelson Allen Cliff, late of Florida, deceased, the last will has been proved in common form at St. John, and letters testamentary granted to Griselda J. Price of St. John and Leander A. Cliff, M. D., of Boston, Mass., the executrix and executor named in the will. The value of the estate was placed at \$30,000; \$29,975 personal. The money is left to relatives.

George Beban at Gaiety.

George Beban, the famous character actor, who made such a hit in "The Sign of the Rose, or The Alien," which was shown at the Gaiety some time ago, will appear again today in "A Roadside Impresario," a special five-part Paramount photoplay which is said to be one of the finest photoplays in which Mr. Beban has appeared to date. A female witness in the Romanus assault case admitted before Magistrate Limerick in the police court yesterday afternoon that a promise was made to her that if she stayed away from court till after three o'clock she would never have to wait for anything in her life. When asked if she knew the name of the party who made the offer she stated that she did not know, but she would know the party when seen.

Tribunals Completed.

St. John Standard: J. J. McCaffrey of Fredericton was in the city yesterday in conference with M. G. Teed, K. C., relative to the appointment of the members of the tribunals to serve for the various constituencies under the Military Service Act. Mr. McCaffrey said that the list of names was completed at the conference. He expects to be in Ottawa on September 24th, in connection with the duties of his position. The gentlemen appointed by Messrs. Teed and McCaffrey will act with the appointees of the county court judges.

Death at Oromocto.

Mrs. Ann Elizabeth Kelly, seventy-eight years of age, passed away at her late home last evening at Oromocto. She was the widow of Richard Kelly and survived by three sons, James S. Kelly, Oromocto, William in France and Anson in Boston; four daughters, Mrs. Mary Jones, Oromocto; Mrs. James Barry, Fredericton; Mrs. William Gidley, Boston, and Mrs. A. Shaw, of Providence, R.I. The funeral will take place on Friday, leaving her late home at 10 a. m. High mass of requiem at St. Vincent de Paul church will be conducted by Rev. Father Carleton and interment will be made at Oromocto.

N. B. Telephone Company Car Goes Over 40-Foot Embankment—S. B. Ebbett Injured.

The Nashwaak Road twelve miles from the city, was the scene of a serious automobile collision last evening which resulted in the Ford runabout belonging to the New Brunswick Telephone Company being hurled over a fifty foot embankment with its occupants, Mr. S. B. Ebbett, local manager of the company, and Mr. John Turner, the wire chief. Mr. Ebbett was badly cut and bruised about the head but Mr. Turner escaped without a scratch. The Ford car was coming toward the city and while ascending a steep hill near the Frink place, collided with a Maine car driven by Mr. J. D. Perry of Houlton who was accompanied by his wife and daughter and Miss Miller of Houlton. The occupants of this car escaped injury.

A Bad Collision.

At the point where the accident occurred the road is very narrow and borders on an embankment fifty feet high. The Telephone Company's car had the side next to the river, and having only about three feet of the road was unable to avoid a collision with the big machine coming in the opposite direction. Both cars were moving at a fair rate of speed and came together with tremendous force. The Maine car remained on the road, but the force of the collision sent the other whirling over the embankment. It rolled down a distance of forty feet, turned over twice and brought up on its end against a birch tree. Mr. Turner managed to catch hold of a sapling and pulled himself clear of the car.

MANY TURNIPS
BEING SHIPPED
TO U. S. MARKET

W. W. Boyce & Co. Sending Them Forward at the Rate of a Carload a Day.

W. W. Boyce & Co. of this city, are shipping turnips to the American market at the rate of a car a day, and are giving sixty-cents a barrel for the same.

The demand for turnips in the American market is great and many are being shipped from New England points. Ontario's crop last year was a failure, but the crop this year is good and this will have a tendency to reduce the price. Turnips grown in New Brunswick are of the very highest quality and the demand is large.

The potato market is very quiet today as this is the Jewish holiday in the states. About twenty carloads from Maine arrived in Boston today and sold very slowly. Mr. Boyce, when asked as to the potato situation stated that the outlook was good and the supply was far greater than the demand.

Mid-week Market.

There was a fairly good market at Phoenix Square this morning and plenty of produce. Lamb sold from \$1.25 to \$1.75; apples, \$1.25 to \$1.75 per barrel; potatoes \$2.50 to \$3 per barrel; live chickens, \$1.50 per pair; chickens, 75c per pair; eggs, 47 to 50 cents a dozen; butter, 45 to 48 cents per pound; turnips, \$1 per barrel; mutton, 10 to 12 cents; onions, carrots and beets, 5 cents a bunch; squash, 2 cents per pound. The farmers stated this morning that the buckwheat is mighty slim as it has suffered greatly from frost.
