

# SOME PLAIN TALK AT TORONTO TORY MEETING

(Toronto Globe.)

Toronto Conservatives cut loose on war-profiteering and uncontrolled food controllers at a meeting held in St. George's Hall last night to reorganize the Young Conservative Club. Captain D'Arcy Hinds, who was the chief speaker, intimated that he had been asked to stand as a candidate for South Toronto. He launched out immediately in an attack upon Sir Joseph Flavelle.

"If there are no men willing to fight such profiteers, you can consider myself in the field," said Captain Hinds. "We have to protect the people from these plutocrats who have put their domineering hand upon them. When we see such figures as Sir Joseph Flavelle, we must rise up in our might and wipe them from Canadian politics. I regret that I cannot allow my name to come up as a candidate in the Conservative interests."

**Looting the Larder.**

Mr. E. W. J. Owens, M.P.P., who was introduced as a prospective candidate for South Toronto, said that the club was not organized to "bat any man on the head. We must see to it that we get a man to represent us who will do his duty toward putting down these plunderers and pil-

ferers of the people. This looting of the people's larder must stop — not three months hence, but now. (Cheers.) We have got a Food Controller. (A laugh.) He is a decent fellow, but he hasn't reduced the price of anything. Is there no possibility of checking this till we are all dead? Milk is going up. This is the food of the children and the babies of this country, who are to be the men of the future. They must have milk at the lowest possible price."

**Dr. Marlow's Grievance.**

Dr. F. W. Marlow said he had come to the meeting looking for light. He said he had always voted for the Conservative party, but he was not prepared to say whether he would do so now. He was not a politician, and unless the stigma that was attached to the name politician was removed, he did not want to become a politician. He did not desire to enter into the difference he had had with the Government, but they had done things they ought not to have done, and left undone things that they ought to have done. They had taken no steps to keep down the cost of living, and this had entailed a hardship upon the dependents of the soldiers. The pensions would have been sufficient if the cost of foodstuffs had been controlled.

**Couldn't Have Been Worse.**

Controller Foster, while condemning the profiteers, put in a plea for the present Government. "The Government may deserve criticism, but would it have been any better if the Opposition had been in power?" he asked.

"Could it have been worse?" replied a member of the audience.

"The Government is not perfect and some of the members may need changing," continued the Controller. "But give it another trial. Our leader is a conscientious and honest man."





