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LOOKING FOR THE GOAT.

The little scheme which was hatched at Ottawa to divide the Liberals of the western province having miserably failed, the Tory newspapers are now looking around with a view of locating the goat. Some are pointing in the direction of Hon. Bob Rogers, while others are inclined to lay the blame at the door of Sir Clifford Sifton. The Winnipeg correspondent of the Montreal Gazette takes a crack at both Sifton and Rogers in a despatch to his paper. He says:

"A remarkable change has taken place in the West within the past ten days, and two men have contributed to make that change. Sir Clifford Sifton's visit west was a grievous tactical blunder. His presence and advocacy of union government aroused the animosity of the Liberals, who attribute their defeat in 1911 to his change of party. Another contributory cause has been the fear that Hon. Robert Rogers would have a place in the union government. The McLeod-Tellier report, the testimonial of Conservative members, followed by press reports that he would be in the union government, set the heather on fire and the Liberals of the West will fight Borden to destroy Rogers."

Having a strong pull with Sir Robert Borden and a certificate of character from seventy-one Tory members of Parliament, it is scarcely likely that the chief exponent of Tammany politics in Canada feels his position as a member of the government to be in any immediate danger. When he does eventually get his walking ticket it will be from the people and not from Sir R. L. Borden. As for Sifton, his missionary tour of the west having been a failure, it is scarcely likely that he will be recommended for a baronetcy in the near future.

A WESTERN APPOINTMENT.

Prof. E. Brydone-Jack, a native of Fredericton and former professor of engineering at the U. N. B., has been appointed inspector of engineers in Western Canada. The appointment was made by the Federal government on the recommendation of Hon. Bob Rogers, and has provoked a good deal of adverse criticism in the past. It will be remembered that Prof. Brydone-Jack was one of the engineers employed by the late Tory government of Manitoba in connection with the Parliament buildings. A scandal which developed was the means of driving the Roblin government from office. An investigation was afterwards conducted by a royal commission, and the Winnipeg Free Press, in the course of an article criticizing Prof. Brydone-Jack's recent appointment, quotes the following paragraph from the commission's report:

"Mr. Horwood, Prof. Brydone-Jack and Mr. Shankland, when before the Public Accounts Committee, attempted to create the impression that in making their respective steel estimates the deduction had been made, but in the case of the first two at least their verbal evidence was at variance with what they had written. Prof. Brydone-Jack and Mr. Shankland were called as witnesses by the government to justify contracts entered into several months before, and we regret to observe that they yielded to a weakness too common amongst professional experts, viz., to make their evidence suit the purpose of the party by whom they are called."

In commenting on the above extract, the Toronto Globe says:

"Other significant references are made in the report to Prof. Brydone-Jack. Following the reorganization of the Manitoba University, Prof. Brydone-Jack ceased to be professor. It is now reported from Ottawa that the Hon. Robert Rogers has found a position for him as Superintendent of Engineering for Western Canada. Is this a new office specially created by Hon. Robert Rogers for Mr. Brydone-Jack? This appointment, if fully confirmed, is evidence, were any required, of the hopeless breach between Sir Robert Borden and the advocates of national government. As the Winnipeg Free Press states, 'Unfaithfulness to the people of Manitoba in the interests of a dishonest government, has been rewarded by an appointment to the public service of the Dominion.' What

possible chance is there of getting the country behind a "win-the-war" policy for which a Rogers-ruled administration is responsible? The thing is impossible."

The passing over of Sheriff Hawthorn and the appointment of Mr. C. D. Richards as returning officer for the Fredericton Scott Act election has disclosed the fact that the Federal patronage for York is now in new hands. During Col. McLeod's absence overseas, the patronage was dispensed by a committee of three. The committee was anti-Pinder, which means that Mr. J. K. Pinder, M. P., and his friends did not get a look-in when favors were to be handed out. Colonel McLeod is now at home wearing civilian clothes, and as the representative of the county should be looking after the patronage himself. If this is so, he must be responsible for the appointment of Mr. Pinder's solicitor as returning officer for the Scott Act election, but the relations which have existed for some time between the M.P. and the M. P. P. scarcely warrant such a belief. Nevertheless, if Col. McLeod did make the appointment, he is certainly to be commended for having returned good for evil.

Conservative politicians at Ottawa who have been making long speeches against the principle of a referendum seem to have undergone a change of opinion in regard to the matter in recent years. In 1910, when the bill to create a Canadian navy was before the Senate, Sir James Loughheed, the Conservative leader of that body, moved an amendment which set forth that "this House is not justified in giving its assent to this Bill until it is submitted to the judgment of the people." In the House of Commons a similar amendment was moved by the late Hon. F. D. Monk, who afterwards became Minister of Public Works in the Borden government.

As economy is now the order of the day, how would it do for the patronage dispensers of York to get together and endeavor to effect an arrangement by which the new town of Devon would be able to worry along with one post office and one postmaster?

So long as that prince of political freebooters, Hon. Bob Rogers, remains in the Borden government, there will never be much difficulty in consolidating the Liberal vote west of the Great Lakes.
