"None of them over 18½. When they're 18½ they go into the army and go to France. From 16 to 18½ they were."


"What else are the young Englishmen doing?"

MAY LIMIT THE SALE OF CREAM

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

Ottawa, Sept. 27. — Investigation into matters relating to the supply of milk in urban centres throughout Canada, was commenced here today by a special committee appointed by the food controller. The inquiry will include such matters as costs and profits.

Among other questions which will be discussed will be provision of a regular supply of skim milk at reasonable rates for people in the cities and larger towns, producers, wholesalers and retail prices of selling in Canada. The desirability of prohibiting the sale of cream during the war or for any special period, and the feasibility of setting a price for cream at which the producer, the wholesaler and retailer shall sell. Particular attention will be given to the matter of the manufacture of ice cream.

Lieut.-Col. Nasmith, Toronto, is chairman of the committee. Other members include Dr. Boucher of Montreal, Commissioner Wigmore, St. John N. B., and Dr. N. C. McKay, Halifax, N. S. A preliminary session of the committee opened today. It will be continued for several days.


