## STRIKE BREAKERS AT MONTREAL

Montreal, Sept. 27.—Charged with a violation of the alien labor law, eight men and one woman appeared before Judge St. Cyr this morning in connection with the strike of the telegraphers of the Great Northwestern Telegraph Co. They were allowed out on \$100 bail. All claimed to be from the United States.

The woman detained is Miss A. J. Knuff and is believed to come from Chicago. The police are searching for three more men.

## WHOLE CREW MAY HAVE BEEN LOST

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 27.—The Associated Press today carries the following: "A report that all persons on board the British steamship Wentworth were lost when that vessel was sunk by a German submarine was brought here by passengers on a British steamship which arrived here today."

"The Wentworth of 2,381 tons, was on a voyage from New York to Bordeaux when, as reported last week, she was destroyed on September 8, presumably off the French coast. The British vessel which arrived here today was at the time eastbound in the vicinity of the Wentworth."

"Records at the British shipping commissioner's office here show that there were 38 persons on board the Wentworth, including Captain A. MacKenna, all British citizens. The vessel carried no passengers. She cleared on August 17th."

## HYPHENS ARE UNDER ARREST

New York, Sept. 27.—About one hundred Germans and German sympathizers, arrested in New York city, in near by Long Island and New Jersey points last night by city detectives acting under the direction of the Department of Justice and officers of the Navy Department, spent the night in the drill hall and in cells at police headquarters. Some were arrested, it was said, the headquarters of the I. W. W., but the majority were taken from their homes.

## These Men Will Help You Decide

Are you liable to be selected for service under the Military Service Act?

The answer to this question is being made readily available for you. Remember that the first class to be called includes only men between the ages of 20 and 34, both inclusive, who are unmarried or widowers without children, those married after July 6, 1917, being deemed single for the purposes of the Act.

Medical Boards are now being established throughout Canada. These Boards will examine, free of charge and obligation, all men who wish to be examined as to their physical fitness for military service. They will tell you in a very short time whether your physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.

It is important that you obtain this information as soon as possible. A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.

In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.
