SAYS BRITISH COLUMBIA HAS FAITH IN LAURIER

Hon J. H. King of Cranbrook, Now on a Visit to the Province Gives out Interesting Interview--The Liberals are the Real Win the War Party--Sir Hibbert Tupper Distrusts the Borden Government

St. John, N. B., Sept. 28. — "Knowing his past record, cognizant of his long and honorable career in public life, the west is willing to trust Laurier."

"The west supports conscription but it is pretty generally realized that it was brought forward by the government simply to fit the occasion—as an election issue."

"We have given the vote to women in the west. We fail to understand why there should be discrimination in the federal franchise. As for men of enemy alien birth if they are disloyal to their adopted country there are means provided for their punishment rather than the disfranchisement of a large body of Canadian citizens and British subjects."

"Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper has spoken at Charlottetown supporting conscription but expressing his distrust of the Borden government."

These views from the west were given to the Telegraph yesterday by Hon. J. H. King, M. D., minister of public works for British Columbia, who was in the city on a visit to his native province. Hon. Dr. King was chosen as the Liberal member of the board of selection for British Columbia and was in Ottawa Monday to attend the meeting of the board. He was accompanied here from Ottawa by his father, Senator G. G. King, and both gentlemen leave for Chipman this morning, Dr. King hoping to get a moose in the Queens county woods before he returns to the Pacific coast.

Liberals' "Win-the-War" Party.

"It is true that in the west as in other parts of Canada the political situation has been somewhat disturbed," said Hon. Dr. King when the subject was broached, "but things are simmering down. The 'win-the-war' party has become a favorite expression but if there ever is to be a real win-the-war party in Canada I believe that party found the truest representation at the Winnipeg Liberal convention. The war policies took first place there and through it all there was a feeling that in view of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's long and honorable career and his loyal and unblemished record, that he could safely be trusted in the leadership. There was a very pronounced feeling that in the event of success at the polls the Liberals should form a real win-the-war cabinet and Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his enunciation of policy has since made it clear that his purpose is to form a truly national government, representative of all elements in our Canadian life."

Muddled Recruiting.

"As for conscription, the conversion of the government seems the most remarkable and mysterious feature. The military authorities muddled the recruiting in British Columbia when it was at its height and it was natural that men should not respond when official intimidation was given that more men were applying than were wanted. Sir George Foster came to see us in 1916 and a strong and representative delegation from Vancouver urged upon him the advisability of conscription."

COLLISION OFF HALIFAX

Halifax, Sept. 23.—Owing to the thick vapor off the harbor today an incoming steamer crashed into the tug Murray. The steamship cut right through the tug, which sank in a few minutes. Captain Sitland and four of the crew were struck by the steamer, all were thrown into the water, and John Brown, a deckhand, was unconscious when picked up. The tug registered about 75 tons, was owned by Hendricks, Limited, and was recently brought here from St. John, N. B.

tion with the object of securing equality of service. He told us plainly that conscription was not contemplated. Premier Borden himself and R. B. Bennett came along two months later and told us the same story.

Why the Delay?

"Now I cannot understand why, if the premier was converted in England to the necessity and urgency of conscription why we haven't got it. That was in May and we are still a long way from the formation of the new national army. At the meeting of the selection board in Ottawa we found the Ontario and Quebec tribunals far from completion. Yours in New Brunswick were ready and possibly those of Nova Scotia, while we in British Columbia have but one appointment to make, but the others are still incomplete. The government wasted no time on the C.N.R. measure and jammed the war time elections and act through under closure but did not consider such a course necessary with conscription. The whole conduct of the government seems to verify the suspicion that conscription has been adopted merely to fit the occasion and serve as a beclouding issue in a khaki election."

Weight-Scales Office
Complaint was made that the office of the city weigh-scales in Phoenix Square was unsanitary and that the lessee of the scales used the premises as a sleeping place. The proper authorities will be asked to have a change made.

Building Ordered Closed
The Board ordered the Mitchell Building in Phoenix Square closed on account of unsanitary conditions. The plumbing is particularly bad. It will be closed next week. Reports also were made concerning unsatisfactory conditions in connection with other premises.

Milk Supply Excellent
A report of the city analyst on the milk supply showed Fredericton is be-

ing furnished milk of the highest quality. Of ten samples tested, but one failed on the bacterial test and it is believed that the sample was not up to the average standard of the milk supplied generally by the dealer from whom it was taken. In butter-fat the milk in all cases was above the standard. The improvement since the Board of Health required milk dealers to be licensed and milk and cattle inspected, has been marked.

SPY'S APPEAL IS REJECTED
