**Public Interest Has Decreased—First Class in Household Science Will Meet Tonight.**

Evening classes in vocational subjects begin this evening in High School building. The first classes will be in Household Science. The citizens are not taking so much interest this year as they did the previous year and it is believed that if the classes began a little later in the fall, the attendance would be larger.

**Household Science.**  
As yet only about eight or ten persons have tendered applications, thus showing that less interest is taken in this department.

Instruction will be given in the Domestic Science Department with Miss Gillis in charge.

The school board expected a large attendance and were looking for an extra Household Science teacher to assist in the work. Fortunately one could not be obtained as she would have been left on the hands of the board, there not being enough work for two, unless the classes become larger.

**Commercial Course.**  
The Commercial Class as yet is also comparatively small compared with that of last year. About a dozen applications have been received. The first class in this course will meet Monday evening in the charge of Mr. Fred J. Patterson of the High School staff, assisted by Mr. Clifford Creed.

The Commercial Course will be given Monday and Thursday evenings and Household Science on Tuesday and Friday evenings.

## ISOLATION HOSPITAL WAS DISCUSSED

**City Council Committee Conferred With the Board of Health—Plans to be Prepared.**

The Board of Health and a special committee of the City Council met jointly last night and discussed the matter of the erection of an Isolation Hospital Building in Fredericton. The committee from the City Council was composed of Ald. Baxter, Ald. Barker and Ald. Burnett. This committee agreed with the Board of Health that an Isolation Hospital to replace the antiquated structure near the Municipal Home was necessary. The cost of a suitable building however is greater than was anticipated. It is probable that the city authorities will have plans prepared and if it is deemed advisable assess for it next year and proceed with the erection of the structure in the spring.

**Typhoid at Nasonworth.**  
The report of City Analyst H. H. Hagerman showed that the condition of the city water-supply was excellent. Acting Health Officer A. C. Fleming in his report called attention to the fact that a number of cases of typhoid from Nasonworth, Parish of New Maryland, had been taken to Victoria Hospital in this city for treatment. The Board decided to ask Dr. R. H. McGrath, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, to look into conditions at Nasonworth.
