GERMAN PIRATES SUNK MANY SHIPS

London, Feb. 2.—Official information received concerning the sinking of the steamer Euphrates show that the probable first victim of the new submarine policy of the Central Powers was a Belgian relief ship. The Euphrates had carried a large cargo of relief supplies from the United States, and was homeward bound in ballast when she was torpedoed. Several members of the crew have been rescued and have arrived at an outlying port.

The sinking of the Euphrates was announced by Lloyds on Feb. 1. The sinking of the following steamships also was announced today by Lloyds:

Essoite, British, 589 tons; Algorta Spanish, 2116 tons; Violet, British trawler; Marcelle, Belgian trawler, sunk by gunfire, crew landed.

The Norwegian steamer Jerv, of 1112 tons, has been blown up. One member of the crew was lost and the others were landed.

Mrs. J. Stewart Neill, accompanied by her sister, Miss Kathleen Logan, who has been visiting her, has gone to St. John, where Mrs. Neill will visit at her old home.

GUNNER JACK ALLEN WOUNDED IN TWENTY PLACES

Silver Plate Inserted in Skull—May Arrive Home This Month.

Mr. Wesley Allen this morning received a cablegram from his son, Gunner Jack Allen, stating that he was in hospital in England, but might be able to come home at the end of the present month. The message stated further that he was wounded in twenty different places and some of the shrapnel was still in his body. One piece was in the head above the ear, and a piece of the skull had to be removed and a silver plate inserted.

On account of his injuries Gunner Allen is subject to attacks of dizziness, even falling upon the street in them. He left Fredericton with the 24th Field Battery.

To Open March 15th.


Proclamation calling upon the Legislative Assembly to meet on Thursday, March 15th, was published in an extra edition of the Royal Gazette published yesterday.


