HUNS THREATEN SHARP REPRISALS

Copenhagen 28.—via London.—Announcement was made before the reichstag main committee in Berlin today that Germany will adopt the sharpest reprisals if German prisoners are embarked on hospital ships of the allies and expressed to the danger of torpedoes.

The sinking by the Germans of the British hospital ship Lanfranc last week caused the death of fifteen German wounded who were being transported to England. The British admiralty announced that inasmuch as the Germans were sinking hospital ships without any regard to international law the distinctive markings of these vessels had been removed and furthermore that virtually all the hospital ships had on board German wounded who would be exposed to submarines. The French government announced that on account of Germany's policy German prisoners would be embarked on French hospital ships.

SUBMARINE COMMANDER IS NO MORE

Copenhagen, via London, April 28.—Lieut. Commander Petz, one of the most successful of the German submarine commanders, has perished in his submarine. The newspapers of his home town, Koenigsburg, carry an official death notice, although the Admiralty has said nothing of the loss of his boat.

Commander Petz was mentioned in despatches in February as being in charge of a submarine which destroyed 52,000 tons of shipping in one day.

BELGIAN DEPORTATIONS.

Cardinal Mercier Says Stoppage Is Due to Intervention of Pope.

Rome, via Paris, April 28.—Cardinal Mercier, in a letter to the Pope, published in the "Osservatore Romano," says that the stoppage of deportations from Belgium is due solely to the intervention of the Holy See.

The Cardinal adds that the repatriation of those already deported has been limited up to the present and that those sent back usually belonged to classes who are of little use in German factories.

RUSSIAN OFFICIALS HAVE BEEN REMOVED

Petrograd, via London, April 28.—As a result of the visit of the war minister, M. Guchkoff, to the southwestern front, 23 generals, including some division commanders, have been replaced. On all fronts not fewer than 114 officers holding headquarters commissions have been removed.

Workmen in munition factories, who were sent to the front under orders issued under the Romanoff regime for participation in strikes, are being recalled. The ministry of finance has enlisted the service of Gorky, Androff and other writers, for propaganda work.

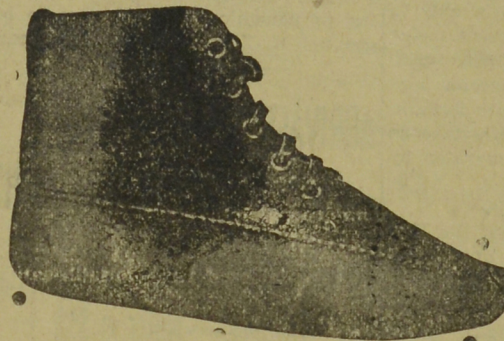

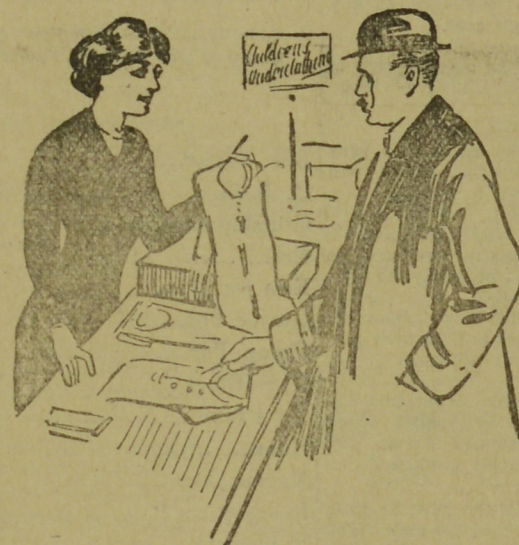
