LABOR DAY VISITORS AT THE EXPERIMENTAL STATION

Establish district representatives. The idea had been put forward by Mr. Reek, the deputy head of the department, an advanced agriculturist who had been selected for the post because of his exceptional qualifications. Mr. Reek had a technical as well as a practical knowledge of farm work and had already instituted several important reforms in the department. For district representatives it was proposed to appoint three year graduates of agricultural colleges and place them in charge of groups of counties. In some districts of the province they would have Acadian assistants. These men will be a connecting link between the farm and agricultural societies and the agricultural department. He was hopeful that the organization would be completed by next spring.

Sheep Raising.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale made reference to the fact that the department owned a ditching machine, a cloyer puller and a lime rock crusher. These machines were now being used for demonstration purposes and had been found very useful. He next referred to the subject of shepp raising and after referring to the present high price of wool declared that New Brunswick must produce more sheep. He pointed out that sheep could be cared for with very little trouble and no animal can be raised on the farm so much profit. He referred to the dog law passed at the last session of the Legislature and stated that if it did not do away with the dog menace, more drastic amendments would be provided in the future. He remembered when lambs sold for \$1 and \$2, whereas at the present time they are worth \$12. They were going to try and put 1,000 sheep on the farms of the province this year including 50 or 60 pure bred males.

The speaker referred to the high price of sugar and called attention to the fact that tons of honey are going to waste in this province each year. By keeping bees this honey can be gathered without expense to the farmer. It is the intention of the government he said, to give encouragement to this

industry. He spoke of the distribution by the department of 30,000 bushels of seed last spring and felt sure that it had been the means of accomplishing much in the way of greater production.

In conclusion the minister said he was pleased to meet the farmers of the province and he hoped from time to time to receive suggestions from them, and he could assure them that he would do all in his power to advance the great agricultural interests of the province.

Other speakers included Mr. B. L. Ensley of the Dominion Agricultural Department, Mr. W. Saxby Blair of the Kentville Experimental Station, and Mr. G. C. Cunningham, Dominion Etymologist. Mr. Blair brought hearty greetings from the farmers of Nova Scotia.

At the conclusion of the meeting there was demonstration work by Mr. Thomas Hetherington, Livestock Superintendent, on cattle judging, by Mr. Ensley on the use of fertilizers, by Mr. Cunningham on potato diseases, and by Mr. Blair on orchard work. The visitors departed for their home shortly before six o'clock thoroughly satisfied with their day's outing.

Montreal, Sept. 4. — On being asked to make a statement in connection with the proposed acquisition of the Canadian Northern Railway by the Canadian Government, Lord Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, made the following reply.

"I wish to deny most emphatically the statement published in a number of newspapers, and evidently inspired, that the Canadian Pacific Company is offering organized opposition to the

cific is the same old threadbare ruse to which resort has been had on more than one occasion during the past thirty years when railways schemes of one character or another were being considered by parliament.

"It is true that the acquisition of the Canadian Northern by the Canadian Pacific was discussed by representatives of the parties concerned but the discussion was at the suggestion of members of the Dominion cabinet.

"After a time it was evident that no
