The following act relating to Pu blic Hopsitals was passed at the last ession of the Legislature:

CAP. XXXVIII.

An Act relating to Public Hospitals, and to the Saint John County Hospital.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Assembly, as follows:


1. The governing body of any public hospital receiving a Government grant may receive into such hospital, for medical and surgical treatment, patients being non-residents of the City, Town or County in which such hospital is situated, and may charge and collect from all such patients such fees for board, maintenance and treatment as may be agreed upon between the said governing body and such patients; but in case any such non-resident patient applying for admission into any such hospital for treatment from any City, Town or County in New Brunswick, shall be unable or shall claim to be unable to pay fees for board, maintenance or treatment in any such hospital, the said governing body may admit such patient for treatment and all charges for his board, maintenance or treatment shall be paid, on demand, to the said governing body by the Treasurer of any City, Town or County in which such patient had a settlement at the time of his admission to said hospital, from any moneys belonging to said City, Town or County except

County School Funds. 2. The governing body of any such hospital, within ten days after admitting any non-resident patient, unable to pay, or claiming to be unable to pay board, maintenance, or for treatment, shall notify by letter through the ordinary course of the mail, the City or Town Clerk, or County Secretary, where such non-resident patient has a known settlement, of the admission of such non-resident patient into said hospital for treatment, otherwise no notice need be given. Every claim against a City, Town or County, when made, and every such notice given shall contain the name and present or last known address of such patient, age or apparent age, birth place, his domestic relations, when known, nature of illness, and in case of death, date and cause of death, and in every case of discharge as incurable of a non-resident patient who is unable or claims to be unable to pay as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the governing body of the hospital so discharging such patient to notify the governing body of each hospital to which this Act applies, of the fact of and reason for such discharge, and no hospital afterwards treating such patient for the same disease shall be entitled to make claim against any City, Town or Municipality for the board, maintenance or treatment of such patient.

3. The said cost of maintenance, board and treatment, may be collected by any City, Town or County which has paid said cost, as if the same were a tax, levied against such patient in the same manner as general rates and taxes are collected; and the same may be collected by any City or Town Clerk or by the County Secretary, by an execution is-

sued by the Clerk of any City or Town or by the County Secretary, to the Sheriff of any County in New Brunswick, and the Sheriff, upon receiving said execution, shall proceed to enforce the same against any property belonging to the said person, or to which he may be entitled or possessed, in the same manner as executions issued out of the Supreme Court of Judicature of New Brunswick may be enforced, and the Sheriff shall make all necessary conveyances of any property so sold, and take all necessary proceedings to put purchaser thereof in possession.

4. The said City, or Town Clerk, or County Secretary, immediately after receiving said notice from the said governing body, shall notify the overseers of the poor where said patient shall have a settlement, and thereupon, on receipt of such notice by said overseers, it shall be their duty to determine whether said patient is able to pay for his board, maintenance or treatment, and in case of any nonresident patient being unable to pay said cost of board, maintenance or treatment, such City, or Town Clerk or County Secretary shall order the amount of the same to be assessed on the City, Town or Parish where said person has or had a legal settlement.

5. Any dispute arising under the provisions of this Act, shall be heard and determined on oral testimony or by affidavit, in a summary manner, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature, either by summons or on ten days' notice, and such summons or notice shall set forth the grounds of complaint; and the finding of said Judge shall be conclusive, and deemed to be a judgment of the Supreme Court, and may be enforced in the same manner as judgments of the said Court may be enforced, the costs in such dispute not being taxed at a greater sum than twenty-five dollars, including counsel fee, together with disbursements necessarily made. 6. The fees chargeable to Cities, Towns or Counties for

the board, maintenance and treatment of non-resident patients shall be that of the average cost per diem per patient to said Hospital for all the patients treated at or in said Hospital for the current year or year immediately preceding the date of admission of such non-resident patient for treatment in said. Hospital.

7. It shall be the legal duty of every person who may convey or escort anyone to any public hospital for the purpose of being admitted into the said Hospital as a patient, before leaving the said Hospital premises, to notify the superintendent or other person in charge of the Hospital for the time being, of the presence of such intended patient in the Hospital.

8. Everyone offending against the last preceding section shall be liable to pay, on complaint of the superintendent of any such Hospital, on a summary conviction, before any Police or Stipendiary Magistrate, a sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars, and in default of payment thereof, to a term of imprisonment of not more than three months.

9. Sections 10 and 11 of 3 George V., Chapter 63, are hereby repealed and Sections 1 to 10 inclusive hereof, mutatis mutandis, are hereby added in lieu of said sections 10 and 11 of said Chapter 63.

10. No person shall be admitted as a patient into the Saint John County Hospital as a resident of the City and County of Saint John, unless he shall have resided two years continuously in said City of Saint John, or in one of the Parishes of said County of Saint John, previously to date of his application for admission.

11. For the purposes of this Act, the last legal settlement shall be continued until a new settlement is secured

12. Chapter 179 of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, 1903, "Respecting Settlement of the Poor," shall so far as applicable, apply to this Act.
