his home, suffering from pneumonia.

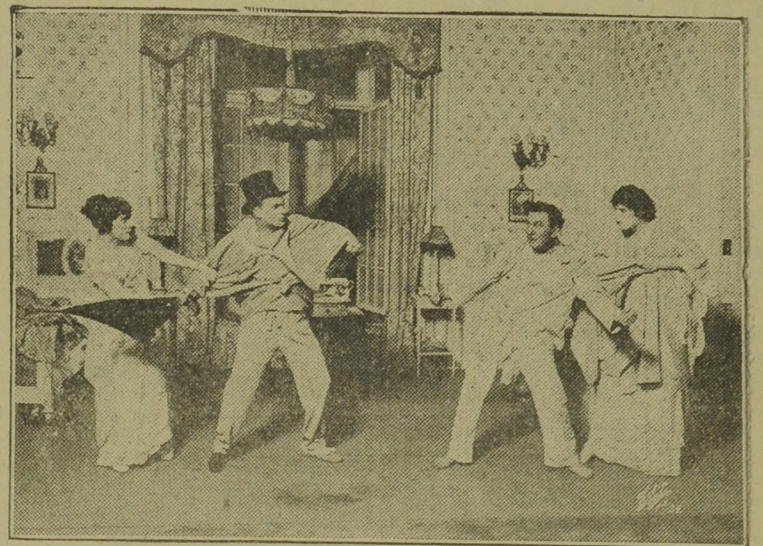
Elinor, the little daughter of Mr.
